

Poka Lambro Seeks Partial Deregulation

Under the new Texas Telecommunications Law, member-owners of the Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative, Inc. have the right to vote to become "partially deregulated" from the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas. A ballot seeking partial deregulation was recently mailed to all Poka Lambro members. If the members vote to authorize this, many decisions previously subject to restrictions and approval by the PUC would then be made by the member-elected Poka Lambro Board of Directors.

The primary benefit to the members of Poka Lambro is the vesting of immediate authority to and with the Board of Directors to introduce new services, set the prices for such services, and change rates for other services. All Poka Lambro Members encouraged to complete their ballot and return it to Poka Lambro by December 4, 1995. 






Low Fat Cornbread Stuffin' With Applesauce Is Big On Taste, Light On Fat and Calories

(DM)-Most Americans use the Thanksgiving holiday as a time of reflection for the fullness of life and its many gifts. For many families, a bountiful table, spread with delicious foods, is the culmination of a day for giving "thanks." While all families have their special dishes, served year after year, the perennial favorite is usually the stuffing which accompanies the roast turkey. WITH APPLESAUCE
2 6-oz. packages of Mrs.

- Cubbison's Cornbread
 Stuffin'
- 3 cups applesauce ½ tbsp. chopped tarragon (optional- adds tartness to applesauce)
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
 ½ to 1 cup apple juice or water
 Mix applesauce, tarragon (opt.)
 and cinnamon in a large bowl. Add

the stuffing mix and mix thoroughly. Only add enough liquid to get proper moisture consistency, a half cup should be fine, as the applesauce adds considerable moisture. Prepare stuffing just prior to roasting.

To make stuffing the bird even easier, use a stuffin' sack to make sure that stuffing removal is safe, clean and leaves no waste.

The latest United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) crop estimate was released November 8 with estimated production from the Texas High Plains revised downward slightly to 2.74 million bales.

The previous estimate called for the area to produce 2.75 million bales. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers the revision continues to document the fact that the High Plains crop appears to considerably less than the area's last two crops.

Statewide cotton prospects also dropped to 4.8 million bales. PCG officials note that it wasn't that long ago that USDA's August crop forecast placed the Texas crop at 5.3 million bales and the High Plains at 3.0 million bales.

Adverse weather and severe insect pressure across the state have significantly altered this years prospects.

"If the current estimate holds up we expect this year's crop will be at least 10 percent smaller than 1994 and we could see it drop even further," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "With reduced yield expectations quality will become an even bigger factor in determining what producers receive for this year's crop. Hopefully, we will continue to enjoy favorable weather during the balance of the harvest here on the High Plains."

Johnson adds that despite everything the area should produce a better than average crop that maintains

a very high standard for all quality factors.

Ten Hale County cotton producers who have filed a lawsuit challenging the formation of the High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and the authority of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) authority to conduct eradication activities have withdrawn a recently filed Motion for Injunction and have paid their 1995 High Plains boll weevil assessment.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers the plaintiffs have not withdrawn their initial lawsuit. At a pre-trial conference held Tuesday, November 7 the judge in the case set a trial date of April 1, 1996.



NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this notice: November 15, 1995

- Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869, has filed an application with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change, or attempt to change, the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized herein below.
- The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license that was originally issued in 1975, and has been renewed annually. The most recent license renewal was granted by the Commission on November 30, 1994. An application by the District for renewal of it license for 1996 is now being considered by the Commission.
- The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect the inflow of fresh water into reservoirs J. B. Thomas and E. V. Spence. The period of the permit is to be January 1, 1996 through December 31, 1999.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described by being between an outer boundary, defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin, and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.
- The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, in Howard County, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, southwesterly to Silver, in Coke County; thence, west-southwesterly to Highway 87 at a point approximately thirteen miles northwest of Sterling City, in Sterling County; and thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.
- The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuliform clouds for seeding, using a weather-radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, surface weather observations, and pilot reports. With this information, he will direct an aircraft, equipped to dispense either glaciogenic or hygroscopic seeding material, into the updraft portions of selected clouds at cloud-base level to perform seeding operations.
- Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Water Planning & Assessment Division of the TNRCC (512-239-0770).
- A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, P. O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting the hearing; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and, (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. If at least 25 eligible persons make written request, the Commission shall hold a public hearing on an application prior to issuance of a permit. Upper Colorado SWCD Hints On Windbreak Trees Design and Planting

Windbreaks can save you money on your energy bill all year. Recent studies show that windbreaks can sane 10 - 30 percent on heating bills. The shade produced by one tree can have the cooling effect of five air-conditioners. Here's a few hints on windbreak design and planting.

- 1. Design your layout so that the windbreak is at right angles to the wind. A windbreak should extend at least 100' past each end of the area to be protected.
- 2. While a windbreak can be a single row, 2 or more rows are better. Staggered, multi-row windbreaks allow trees in one row to continue to protect and area if a tree is lost in and adjacent row. Without this overlapping protection, a blank space will act just like a funnel.
- 3. Spacing between trees needs to be 10 15 feet from evergreens, and 20 feet for hardwoods. For best results, don't mix evergreens and hardwoods

in the same row. Faster growing hardwoods can overtop evergreens, and shade them out. The same caution needs to be applied when mixing hardwood species.

- 4. Windbreaks should be at least 100 feet from the nearest buildings so that the windbreak doesn't interfere with the airflow of a chimney. This distance also provides some air circulation between the windbreak and buildings during hot weather.
- 5. When planting, provide holes large enough and deep enough to accommodate roots without crowding. Make sure the roots are spread out, and not turned upwards at the tips. partially fill the hole, and pack the soil around the lower roots. Water, place the remainder of the soil in the hole, and water again. This helps get rid of any large air pockets near the roots.

6. Protect the young trees from weed and grass com-

petition by mulching, using a plastic weed barrier, or tillage.

7. Seedlings need between 8 to 10 gallons of water per week the first year, and at least ten gallons per week later on, depending on soil type and weather. Fertilizer isn't needed the first year.
