



Buddy Brandt at the 8:51 mark. Georgie Garcia kicked the extra point for a 7-0 Tiger lead.

A little over three minutes later Nueces Canyon tied up the score when Jason Horner connected with Joe Shipman covering 4 yards. Jason hale added the extra point for a 7-7 score.

Hunt found Brandt again on the Tigers next possession. The duo connected with a 39 yard pass, which set up a 5 yard touchdown by Steve Clementz with 1:35 left in the opening stanza. Clementz's next score was halfway through the second period from four yards out. He then ran in the two-point conversion for a 21-7 lead.

Things started going in the wrong direction for the Tigers just before halftime. With 1:12 left, the Panthers blocked a Brackettville punt as Paul Nevarez picked up a loose ball and scrambled 25 yards for six points. Horner threw to Arthur Nevarez for the conversion. Nevarez tied up the score when he picked off a Tiger pass and raced 89 yards for a TD. The two teams went to the locker room with a 21-21 score at halftime.

The third quarter turned into a defensive battled with neither of the teams scoring. With just six seconds remaining in the third, Mark Dimery recovered a Nueces Canyon fumble just five yards short of the goal line. It took two plays for Brackett to score as Clementz carried the ball in from the one yard line. Garcia added another PAT for a 28-21 lead in the fourth quarter.

Exactly a minute and a half later, the combination of Horner and Shipman was successful again, this time with a 35 yard TD pass. The Panthers attempted to take their first lead of the game with the two-point conversion, but the pass failed as Brackett still led 28-27.






