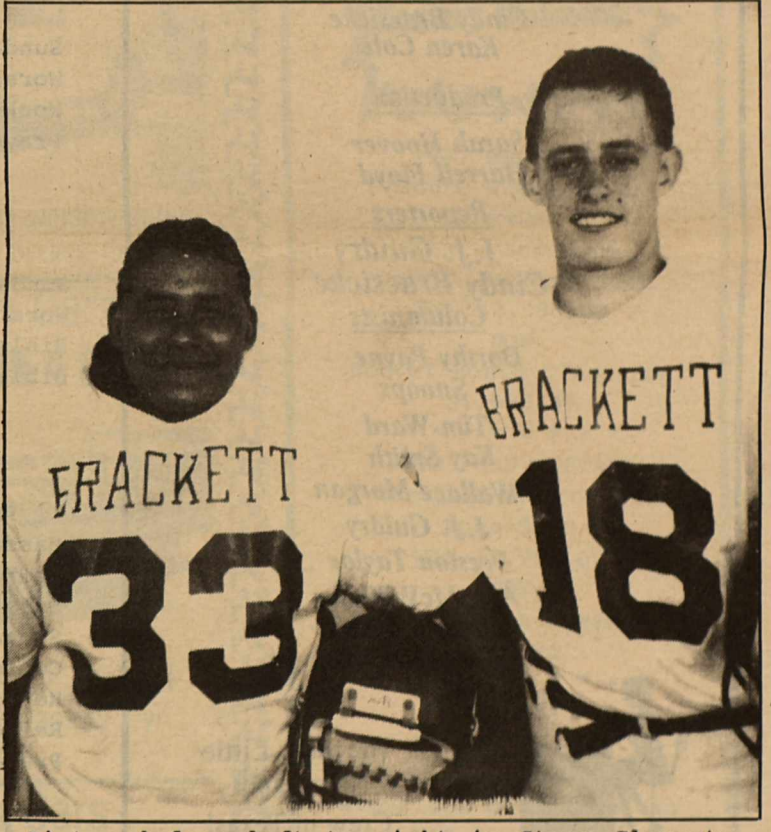
## Volks Walk, Bike & Swim Events a Success

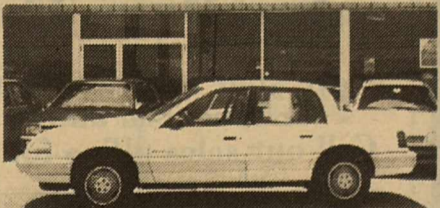

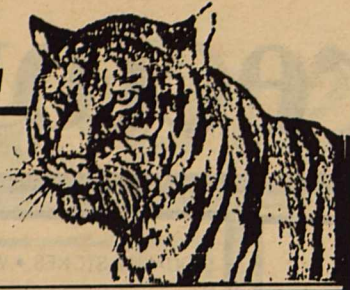

ner, and the courteous manner in which two two waitress served it.





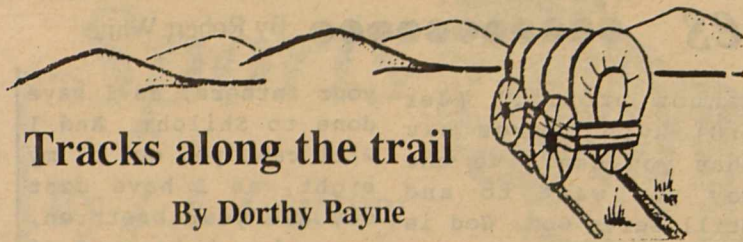

All the records and writing of the women who traveled west in the 1800s show the westward women were always an individual of independence and strength.

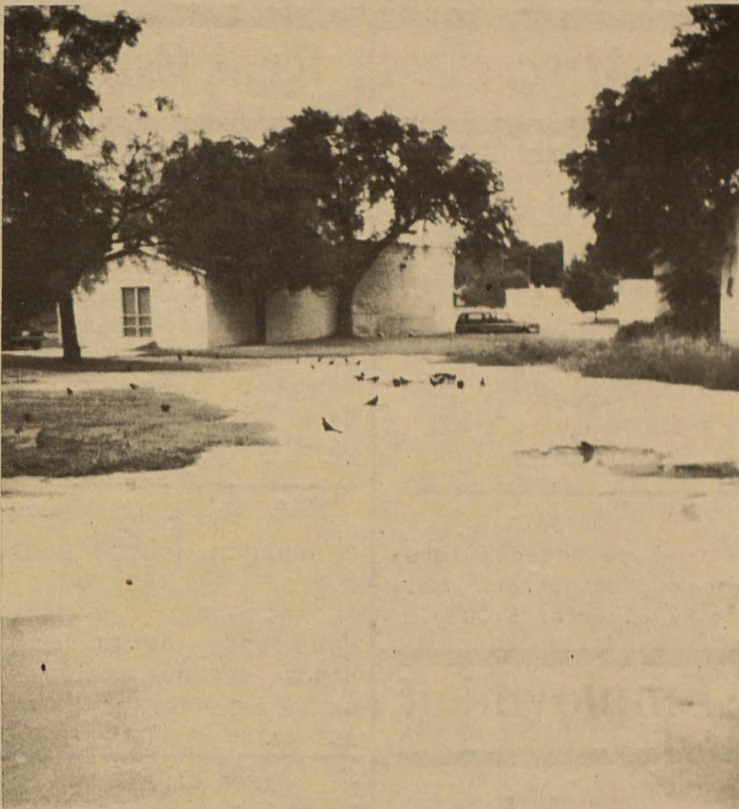

## Health Fair Coming Soon

The Texas Department of Health, Public Region 6 Nursing Division, will administer Influenza immunizations at the Kinney County Health Fair on 27 October 1990, 11:00 to 4:00 P.M.

Influenza immunization markedly decreased the incidence of complications, hospitalization, and death due to influenza, especially in the elderly. Annual immunization is recommended particularly for patients with chronic pulmonary or cardiovascular diseases, those in chronic care facilities, patients with diabetes or other metabolic diseases, severe anemia or renal diseases, immunosuppressive patients, children and young adults on long term aspirin therapy, and for everyone more than 65 years old. It is also recommended for household members and for physicians and other health-care personnel who may have contact with high-risk patients. Because the flu virus mutates (changes), a dose should be received each year for maximum protection.

Lion B. Peter Pohl of the Brackettville Lions Club stated that approximately 30 health services and centers are registered to participate at the Health Fair.

**ORDINANCE NO. 1990-9**  
An Ordinance to set the 1990 tax rate for the City of Brackettville 1990 ad valorem taxes as required by State Tax Law Section 26.05.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Brackettville in conformance to established State Laws met and passed the City of Brackettville 1990-91 Annual Budget; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 26.05 of the State Property Tax Law the City Council has established and set a \$.6432 per \$100 Market Value rate for Ad Valorem Taxes to effectively carry out the 1990-91 budget; and

WHEREAS, the tax rate established does not exceed the 3% or 8% effective tax rate as outlined in the Statutes;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE THAT;

The effective tax rate for the City of Brackettville 1990-91 Annual Budget set at \$.6432 per \$100 valuation of market value.

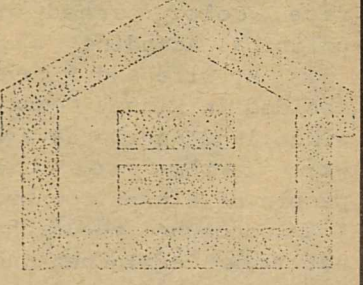
