Thursday, September 27 at 8:30 a.m. an Aerostar van was involved in a one-car accident.

The accident occurred 6.8 miles west of Brackettville on Highway 90 west. Marco Alberto Flores, driver for Barnes Eye Centers of San Antonio, ran off the right side of the

roadway. The driver over-corrected as he brought it back onto the roadway and it rolled over one time then came to rest on the west bound shoulder on its wheels. The Driver was wearing his seat belt and remained in the vehicle. Mr. Flores had minor cuts from the glass.

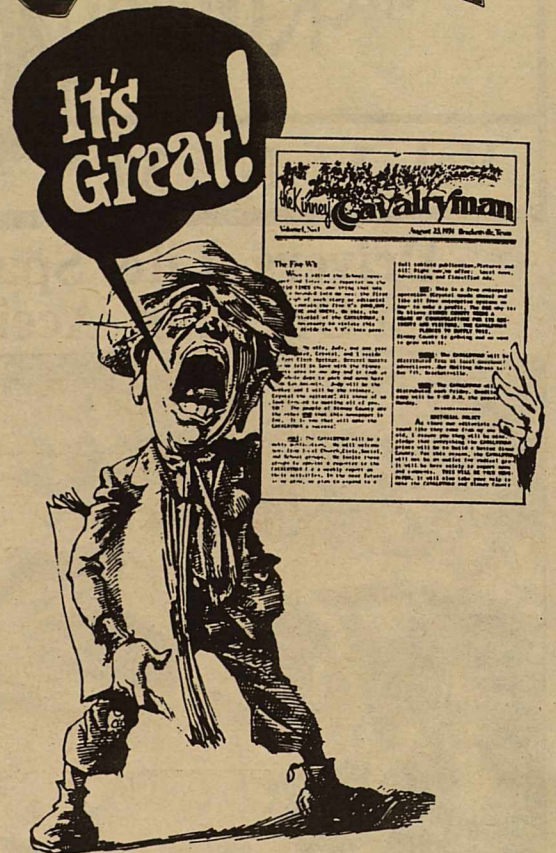

For the past several years Brackettville has been treated as an unwanted stepchild. Fern Dyer should have been chosen Post Master years ago. We have had to put up with incompetent, insensitive, personnel managing the Post Office. An O. I. C. who was arrogant and insensitive to customers was sent here. He was followed by a Post Master who imposed on and mistreated his help. Had it not been for others doing his work the office would have been on the rocks. This was followed by an O. I. C. who stirred the animosity of most of the patrons. She was a person who really knew little of what she was supposed to do and who never filled her 40 hour week. So, Brackettville will continue to be treated like dumb, driven cattle by a government protected monopoly that basks in its on aura of arrogance. Well, what goes around comes around and someday irresponsibility will cash its dividends and in time, Fern Dyer will be given her just reward.

## Lodge Building Dedicated By Bruce Clements

The principal speaker will be the past Grand Master of Masons of the Grand Masonic Lodge of Texas, the Honorable Graham H. Childress. Other guest speakers are state and local officials.

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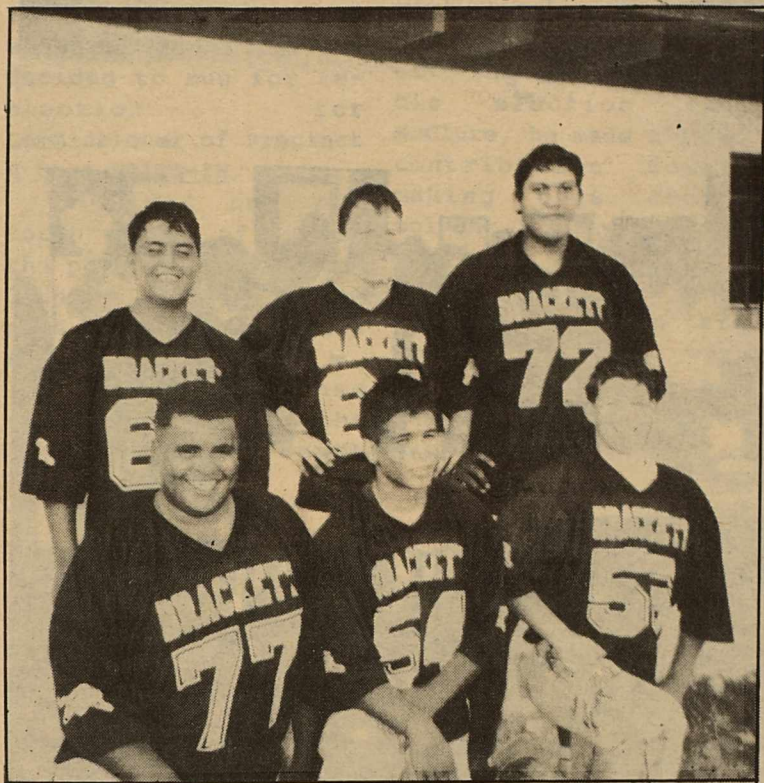

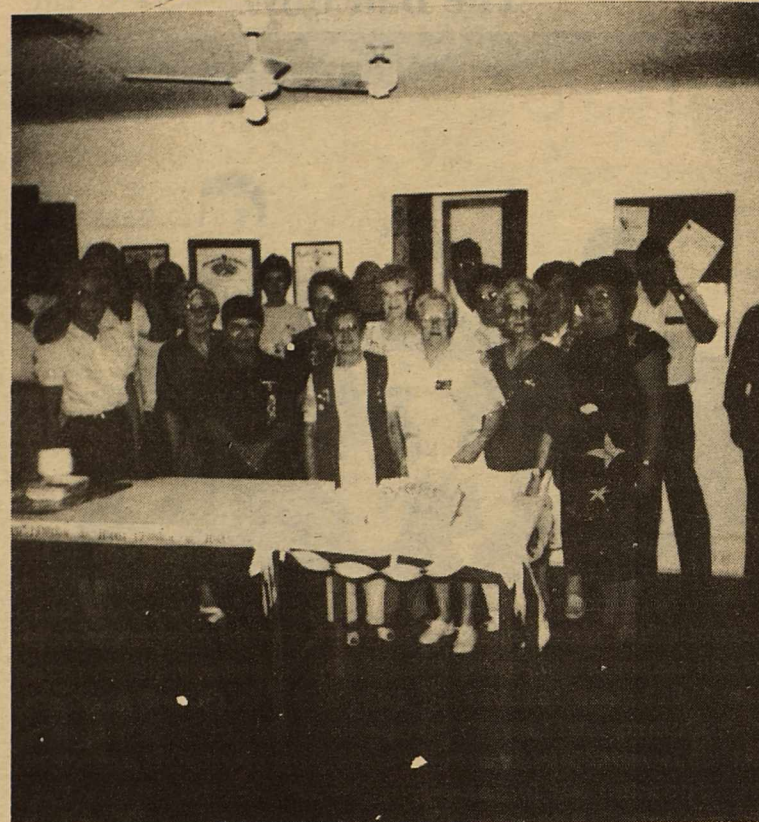

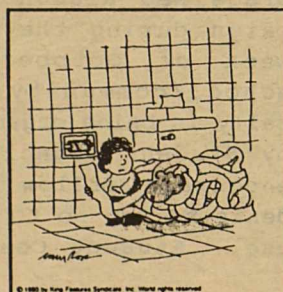
The men were celebrating their birthday a little early as the Post won't be six until October 13th. The Ladies Auxiliary was four September 24th.

Everyone had a great time and are looking forward to the coming year.

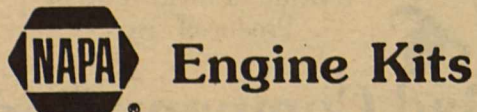

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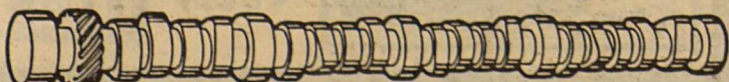

### E.M.S. News

Kinney County E.M.S. employees spoke to Mrs. Meeks and Mrs. Bonner's 6th grade Health and Science class last Friday afternoon. The presentation was intended to tie together material on the cardiovascular system the students had studied earlier in the week.

The students were given statistics regarding the number of deaths that occur each year as a direct result of heart

attack. They were taught the difference between a "HEART ATTACK" and a "CARDIAC ARREST". It was explained that when a heart attack occurs and cardiac arrest results, quick intervention by family, bystanders and E.M.S. personnel may save many lives.

A demonstration of C.P.R. and an explanation of why and how it is used to save lives was followed by a question and answer period.

The students asked many questions that were both inquisitive and intuitive, indicating a genuine interest in the subject.

A great deal of emphasis was placed on the need to know your local E.M.S. phone number, and how C.P.R. done improperly or by untrained persons could be harmful.

At the end of the presentation the students were allowed to demonstrate a little of what they had learned by

practicing on C.P.R. Annie.

## "The Oak" Help Stop Litter

This is the welcome mat Brackettville rolls out to welcome visitors and friends coming in from the Rocksprings Highway.

"The Oak" in all its beauty has been seen by all of us and obviously seen closely by

some of our residents. Yet nothing is done to cleanup the filth.

A local organization attempted to adopt this area but their offer was declined and they were told this area is the responsibility of the

responsibility of the

Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Daniel Kral, Supervisor of Brackett Texas Department of Public Highways and Transportation, says this area is cleaned 2 or 3 times a year, which is more often than other areas around the City. Kral said they had a trash can at "The Oak" but people use it for their personal trash. The overflow of trash caused more litter than was previously there. Mr. Kral said he would see about getting a "No Littering" sign put up and will also try the trash can again.

Chief Deputy Sheriff David G. Luna said it is very hard to enforce the littering laws. In order to ticket someone or make them police the area, you have to actually see them throw the trash and of course, no one litters when a patrol car is driving by.

Luna and all other law enforcement officers are distressed by the littering, but their hands are tied unless we all work together to combat this problem.

This is where we, the concerned citizens, can help. If we witness anyone littering report it to a law enforcement officer. The officer must know the name of the person or a license plate number. When we call in the reports the officer can then take over and will gladly have the culprit police the area.

The Texas State Department of Highways and Transportation is going to do its part by putting up a sign and a trash can. Chief Deputy Sheriff Luna is eagerly awaiting the chance to make the litterers cleanup their own litter. Now it's up to us to join with them and report those litter bugs.

Ultimately, the responsibility of keeping "The Oak" and other areas clean falls on the

beer drinkers themselves. Try putting the cans and bottles and cartons and bags, etc... in the back of your vehicle. You will be surprised at how easy it is to do. And if you don't... Lookout, you never know who might be watching.

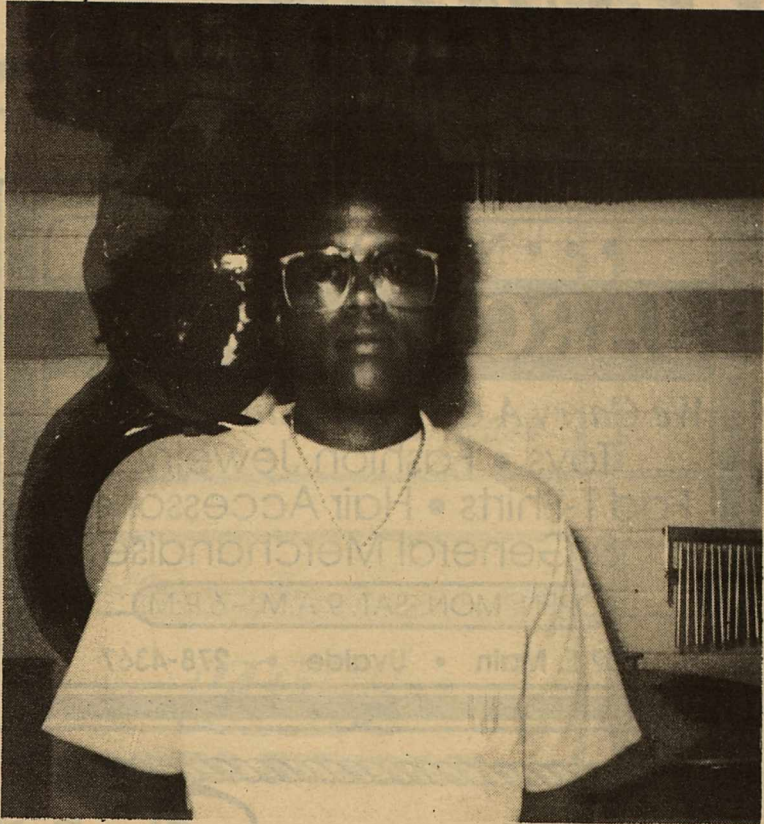

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

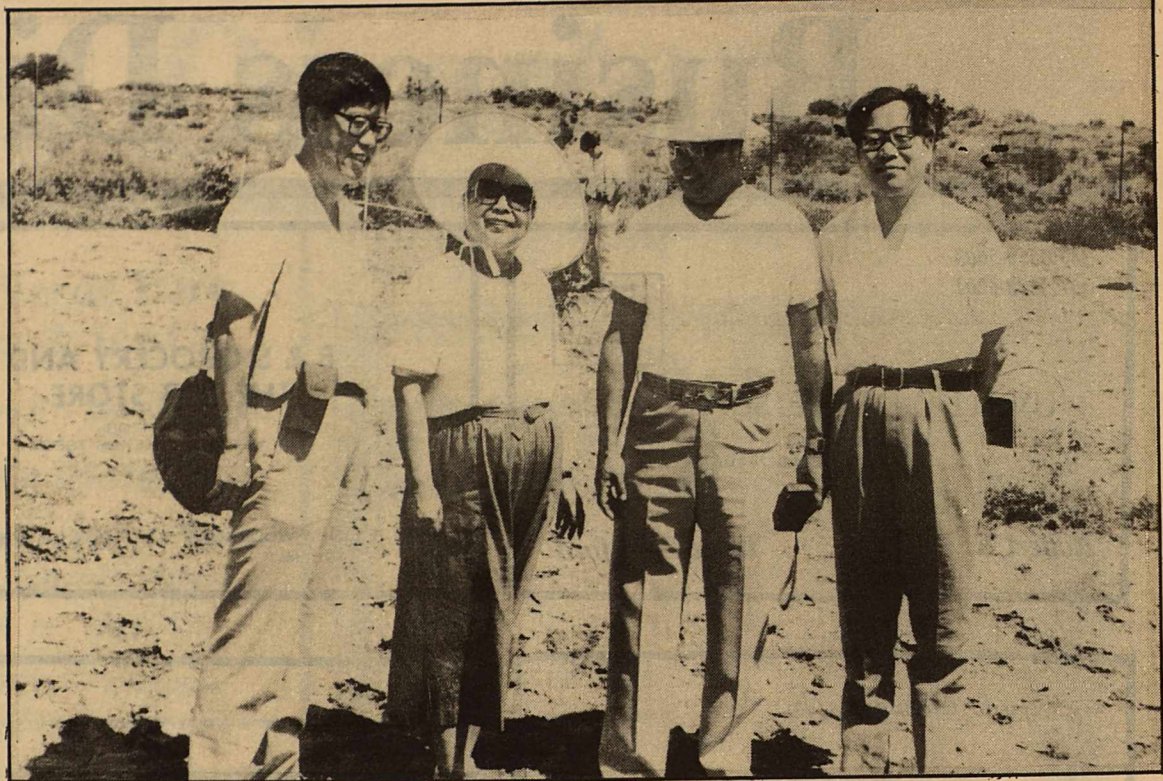

all wish the Templetons and Dan Shi the best of luck in their singing careers!



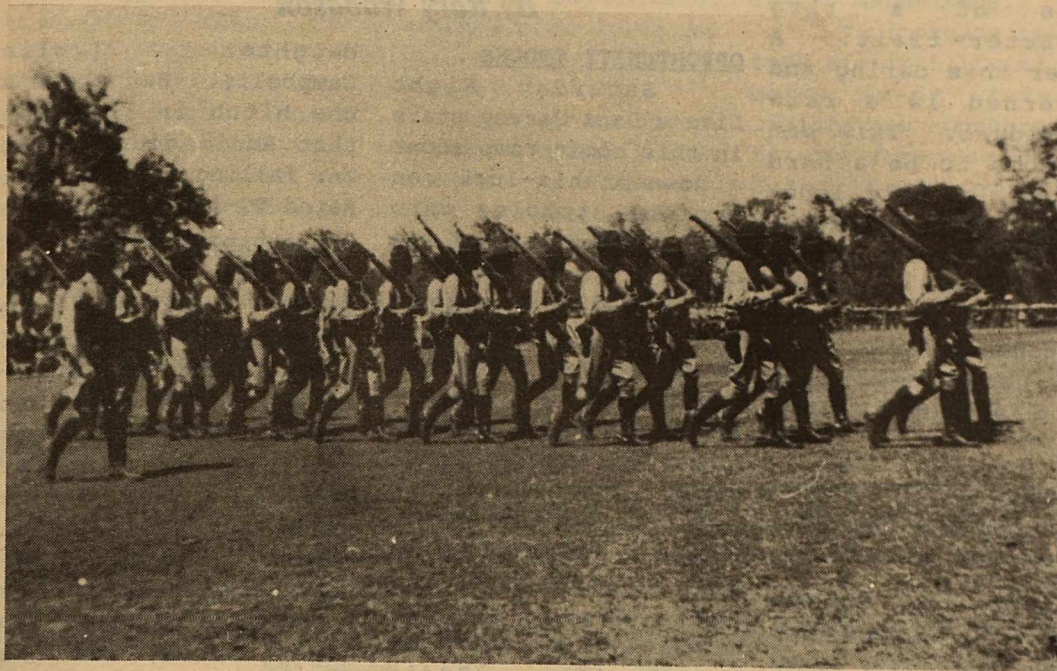

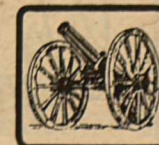
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## Something Good From Jones Elementary

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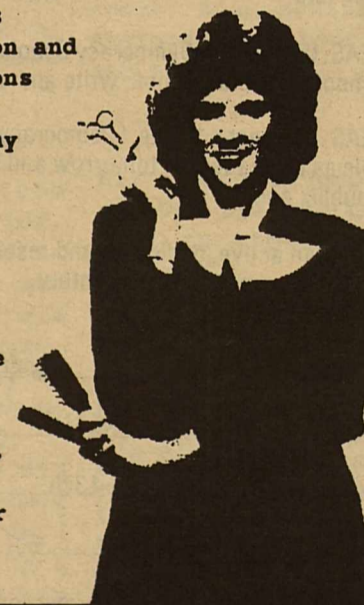
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### Quality Health Care Must Be Accessible, Affordable

"Happiness lies, first of all, in health," said George William Curtis, who recognized that good health is one of the most precious gifts we enjoy. Unfortunately, for too many families in our Senate District, health insurance and care are unaffordable and inaccessible. This is partly because our district includes six of the seven poorest counties in Texas.

Because Kinney and McMullen counties, for example, have no

practicing physicians, residents must drive far distances for medical treatment.

Because no obstetrician or gynecologist practices in Atascosa, Dimmit, Frio, LaSalle, Live Oak, Starr, Wilson or Zapata counties, pregnant women often seek care elsewhere. Sometimes they have to move to another city temporarily for labor and delivery, in some cases leaving loved ones behind during what should be a most beautiful and loving

family experience.

To increase health care availability to our most needy Texans, legislators appropriated to the Department of Human Services \$8.2 billion for the 1990-91 biennium. Of that total, approximately \$3 billion was for state health care services, which comprise 36 percent of the annual DHS budget.

We expanded the Medicaid Program to allow reimbursement for services provided by physical therapists,

psychologists and respiratory therapists, as well as diagnostic services provided by optometrists.

Legislators also passed H.B. 1118 by Rep. Jack Vowell, R-El Paso, and Zaffirini, permitting recipients of medical assistance to select licensed psychologists to perform health care services.

Rural hospitals with 100 beds or less and urban hospitals which treat a disproportionate number of medically indigent patients also received additional funding.

Legislators raised the Medicaid eligibility cap by appropriating an additional \$23.4 million to allow pregnant women and infants with incomes at 130 percent of the poverty level to qualify. What's more, last June Congress raised the cap to 133 percent of poverty. With that change, a single woman whose annual income is no more than \$9,764 qualifies.

To resolve the Medicaid crises at DHS, legislators in June approved an additional \$45 million appropriation for DHS. In August the Legislative Budget Board transferred \$169.9 million in state and federal funds.

We addressed the shortage of health care workers in rural areas by passing S.B. 1351, by Sen. Steven Carriker, D-Roby, and Rep. Charles Finnell, D-Holliday, which I co-sponsored. This created the Outstanding Rural Scholar Program to attract more health care workers to rural areas.

Students selected for this program will qualify for loan forgiveness plans covering 50 percent of their tuition, fees, supplies and living expenses. The principal and interest of one year's loan will be forgiven for each year of work in a medically needy area.

Since prevention is so critical to good

health, legislators passed S.B. 1527, by Zaffirini and Rep. Bill Carter, R-Fort Worth, establishing an office for the prevention of mental retardation and development disabilities.

Studies show that half of the 400,000 cases of mental retardation in Texas could have been prevented by providing better prenatal care and by educating women about the damages that unborn children can suffer when their mothers-to-be abuse alcohol or drugs.

The South Texas Health Research Center at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio received a \$1 million appropriation for a two-year program that focuses on prevention, upgrading health care provider education and analyzing health trends in South Texas.

One of their studies seeks to determine whether biological differences or demographic and socioeconomic differences cause increased complication rates for Mexican Americans with diabetes.

In Eagle Pass and Laredo, the program provides continuing education courses in laboratory medicine to improve the ability of nurses and other non-laboratory trained personnel to identify bacterial, parasitic and viral agents of infectious diseases.

Our goal should be to provide quality health care for all Texans. As Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "The first wealth is health. Sickness is poor spirited, and cannot serve any one."

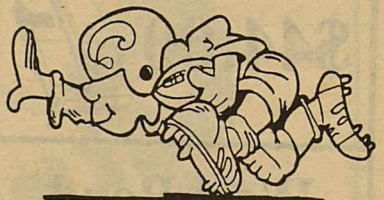
## Tigerette Volleyball

**Gardening Tips**

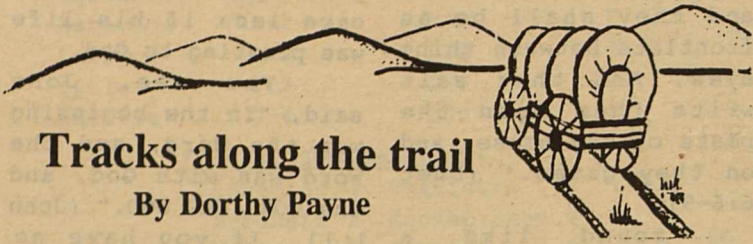

Now that the weather is cooling off, it is time to plant trees, shrubs and roses. If you attempt planting in the hot summer months, your plants will scorch, lose its leaves and probably will not come back out.

Planting now when the weather is cooler gives your plants fall and winter to establish a strong root system before its growing period in spring.

When planting, remember to dig hole at least twice the size of the container it is in. At this time you need to add copperas and soil sulphur (a natural fungicide) to the soil. this will prevent iron chlorosis and cotton root rot.

Water your trees by letting water trickle on it for 24 hours once a week. If you only water trees when watering the lawn, your trees will develop a shallow root system, which can lead to numerous problems such as roots coming up under sidewalks and cracking them and the tree can even be blown over by a strong wind.

In the wildest and most lawless time of the old West, it was often times hard to tell which side of the law a man and his gun were really on. It was just a toss-up whether the gunfighter Wyatt Earp was either one of the heroes or one of the villains in the famous shootout at the O.K. corral.

Wyatt Earp was born in Manmouth, Illinois on March 19, 1848. He moved to California in his early years and worked at many different jobs on the Great Plains. He was once a stagecoach driver, buffalo hunter and for a small time, a gambler.

In 1874, he was hired as a peace officer in Wichita, Kansas. In 1876, he moved again to Dodge City where he became a friend and crony of Bat Masterson, a sheriff and gambler. Sometimes Earp was a trigger-happy deputy and sometimes a faro dealer.

Again Wyatt Earp moved to the Cattle town of Tombstone, Arizona in 1878. Tombstone was a rip roaring wide open town. Earp teamed up with his brothers as free-wheeling peacekeepers and gamblers.


Wyatt and Ike Clanton's gang got into a rawl which ended up in a gunfight at the O.K. Corral on October 18, 1881.

The hard drinking Doc Holliday joined up with the Earp brothers.

It just lasted one minute. After the shooting, three of the Clanton gang fell dead and both Wyatt brothers were wounded.

According to legend it was called a victory of law and order; at the time the town nearly lynched Earp and Holiday. The gunfight put the Earps out of business.

Earp went back to Los Angeles where he died in 1929. Wyatt Earp spent many peaceful

The aroma of sizzling bacon drifts through the morning air, calling the men to a big country breakfast of steaming hot coffee, and platters heaped with bacon, sausages and eggs, while huge baskets of home made buttermilk biscuits sit waiting for the sweet butter and home made jams, or maybe a generous ladle of

cream gravy. While the dew is still on the ground and the morning air is crisp clusters of men dressed in camouflage hats and jackets begin to pile into pickup trucks and jeeps to celebrate an age-old ritual. IT'S HUNTING

By dusk weapons are cleaned and the game is dressed, the hunters change from the now grubby camouflage to their old faithful well worn jeans and soft flannel shirts. The best part is yet to come,, when friends and family sit down to a fall feast of wild game.

Recipes and cooking methods for wild game vary as much as the hunters themselves. While I can share only a couple of recipes here with you, take time to swap recipes with your hunting friends and neighbors. Let your imagination go and try creating your own new recipes.

**BARBEQUE GRILLED WHITEWING DOVE**  
Submitted by Bryson Knowles of Uvalde

This recipe is quick, easy and um um good.

The number of birds and other ingredients are determined by the number of persons to be served and the size of there appetites.

Clean and bone the breast meat of each bird, wrap each breast around a whole jalapeno, wrap each with a slice of bacon and skewer to hold together. Roast skewered over coals 10 to 15 minutes.

**DOVE IN MUSHROOMS**  
20 dove breast flour cooking oil 1 cup mushrooms 1/4 lb. butter

Soak dove breasts in salt water for at least 6 hours prior to cooking. Remove doves from water and drain. Flour

dove breasts and brown on all sides in hot oil. Line a glass baking dish with heavy duty aluminum foil. Place each dove in dish with breast up. Poor mushrooms and mushroom liquids over doves. Slice butter over top. Seal foil around dish. Bake in 350 degree oven for at least 1 hour and 30 minutes. You can leave these in a warm oven after cooking for at least another hour if needed. Yield: 4 servings.

### DUTCH OVEN DOVE

1 stick butter  
24 whole dressed doves  
black pepper  
juice of 6 lemons

Melt butter in large dutch oven (I use heavy cast iron). Pepper doves liberally on all sided. Brown in butter over medium high heat. When well browned, pour

lemon juice into a large tumbler and fill with water. Pour over birds and cover immediately. Cook 1 1/2 hours in 350 degree oven. Remove lid and simmer 10 minutes longer. This will serve 6 to 12 people.

Usually served with long grain and wild rice, a tossed green salad and dinner rolls.
