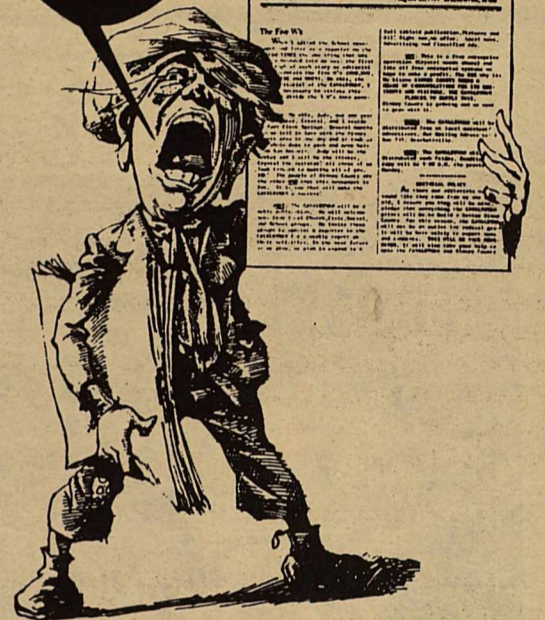

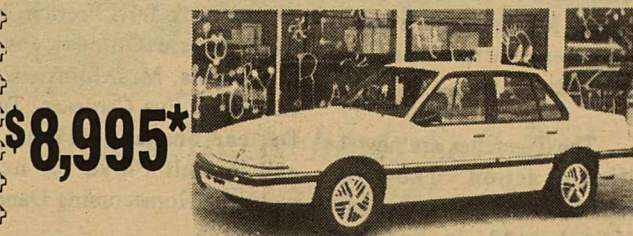

Ingram Warriors Rain on Tigers Homecoming

Brackettville - The Tigers faced the Ingram Warriors in their annual Homecoming game last Friday evening. Brackett fought hard, but couldn't pull off the upset as they fell 8-23.

The intensity was high throughout the entire first period with both teams playing their hearts out. Ingram put the first points on the board at the 8:59 mark in the opening period as James Mayberry booted a 27 yard field goal for a 3-0 lead.

Ingram quarterback, Jason Arnfield scored two one yard touchdowns in the second quarter. The first came with 5:12 on the clock and was followed with the point after kick by Mayberry for a 10-0 lead. Arnfield crossed the goal line his

second time with only :25 remaining in the first half. The TD was followed with an attempted pass for the conversion, but the Tiger's Lesly Floyd intercepted the Warrior pass and raced 104 yards for the 2 points. The score was 16-2 in Ingram's favor as the two teams headed to the lockerrooms for halftime.

Arnfield wasn't through for the night as his next score was a 70 yard TD pass to Bobby Warren. Mayberry added the extra point putting Ingram up 23-2 with 6:38 in the third.

Brackett scored their only touchdown with 3:26 left in the third stanza, when Michael Flores scrambled 25 yards. The extra point kick failed making the final score 23-8.

Brackett travels to Lytle

The Fightin' Tigers will travel to Lytle tomorrow as they open their district season. The Tigers are 2-3 in non-district action, while Lytle is 1-4.

District 29-AA should be a close and competitive district race. Dilley seems to be the favorite as they sport an undefeated 5-0 mark. The Wolves will travel to Natalia, while LaPryor will go head-to-head with Asherton on the road in the other district matchup.

Lytle is led by senior quarterback Henry Siller (6'0 190). Last week Lytle fell to

Cotulla 8-19. Despite the loss, Siller threw for 177 yards. Last season he connected for 14 TD passes and 1,135 yards. He's hoping to be even more impressive this year. His top lineman is Ruben Martinez (5'11 180). He's also in his senior year. "It should be a very interesting game," he concluded.

The Tigers are coming off an 8-23 homecoming loss after being defeated by Ingram last Friday. "The team with the fewest mistakes will win," concluded Tiger mentor, Steve Kolb.

This tournament was a very competitive event and very tense.

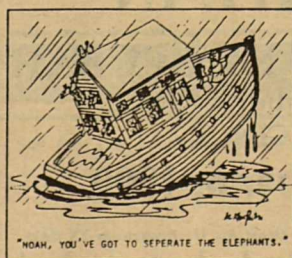

Members met on Thursday to decorate a 4-H float for the homecoming parade and Friday the 4-H club was represented with a trailer decorated green and white with 4-H projects represented on the float.

The County 4-H Awards Banquet will be held on Monday, October 15, 1990 at 7:00 P.M. 4-H members will be recognized for project work and an outstanding friend of 4-H will be honored. The county gold star award will also be presented. Kinney County 4-H families are reminded that they are to bring a side dish and dessert if they plan to attend. 4-H members who turned in a 4-H project record form and new 4-H members will be presented recognition awards.

This week's article deals with beautification in your home landscapes with the state flower of Texas. The bluebonnet is the officially recognized state flower and its use in the home landscape has increased due to technological advances. Dr. Jerry Parsons, Extension vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, contributes to this week's article.

Bluebonnets have been transformed from a single color, difficult to grow wildflower to a multi-colored, very easy to grow bedding plant destined to become a star attraction in flower beds around your home. The common blue colored bluebonnet has been joined by the white, Abbott Pink, and now, for the first time, the Worthington Blue. The

Worthington Blue is less controversial (some people are appalled at any other color other than blue) as it is simply another shade of blue. The Worthington Blue is best described as the color of the sky on a clear day. The color stands alone as a beautiful flower or can be mixed with other bluebonnets to create striking designs. Scarified seed of the Worthington Blue is available from Texas Seed Company, P. O. Drawer 599, Kennedy, Texas 78119.

Many people have been discouraged from the idea of a non-blooming winter bluebonnet plant. From September until April, bluebonnets are hard to sell items to those who desire beauty from flowers all year long. This problem can be solved by interplanting with other fall annuals. Examples of companion plants to bluebonnets include pansies, dusty miller, spring-flowering bulbs (tulips, etc) or ornamental cabbage. Most of these flowering plants will be overgrown by the bluebonnets in March so they begin to expand. At that time, remnants of the interim annuals can be removed, thus allowing the bluebonnets to take center stage.

Plant bluebonnets, as transplants, in rows 24 inches apart. The transplants themselves should be 12 inches apart or less within each row. Then between each row of bluebonnets, or every 12 inches, plant a row of pansies, ornamental cabbage, dusty miller or spring blooming bulbs.

Bluebonnets make a great companion plant for summer blooming perennials such as lantana, mealy cup sage, autumn sage and Michaelmas daisy. These and similar plants can be cut to the ground after first frost and interplanted with bluebonnet transplants. As the bluebonnets fade in late spring, they can be removed as the warm season perennials begin to emerge. In addition, bluebonnets make a great plant for containers such as whiskey barrels and terra-cotta pots. The pot should be filled with a potting mix which drains well then placed in a sunny location. Bluebonnets are ideal low maintenance flowers with which to replace summer color container plants like copper plants, periwinkles, purslane and

others, particularly those around decks, patios and pools which won't be used again until next spring. The following spring as the bluebonnets fade, replace them with your favorite heat-loving annual flowers.

For maximum impact in your home landscape, use large drifts of a single color rather than just a mix of many colors. For example, a line of blue pansies and a line of one color of bluebonnets reinforcing the patio outline makes an ideal setting. Cool colors such as blues make an area appear farther away, while reds and yellows bring the area closer. Buy your bluebonnet transplants by the flat (96 transplants per flat) and you may get a break on the price.

The timing of your bluebonnet planting is very important. Many people wait until they see bluebonnet plants blooming in the spring to begin plantings. It's simply to late to plant transplants in the spring. Fall is the optimum time. As a matter of fact, the sooner in the fall you plant your transplants, the larger the plants will grow in the spring and so more blooms will occur. Root systems of transplants established in the early fall expand more and are able to produce a larger plant when top growth and blooms begin in the spring.

A major advantage of transplant availability is that the homeowner does not have to wait until plants produce dry weed in June before removing old, ugly, dried plants. Actually, you will be able to buy more fast-germinating, reliable seed, as well as transplants next fall. There is a new Extension bulletin entitled "Texas Bluebonnets - Texas Pride" which outlines proper cultural techniques, gives information on the exciting new colors plus a lot of other useful information. 

What a political carnival we are seeing in Washington. It's a sad thing when people elect politicians who have only one perspective; being re-elected. Only ignorance and political rhetoric can fail

TAAS Test Scheduled

Brackett Independent School District will be administering the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests to students in grades 3, 5, 7, 9, & 11. Testing will begin on October 16, 1990. The writing portion will be October 16, 1990, the reading portion will be October 17, 1990, and the math portion will be October 18, 1990.

Parents are encouraged to make sure their children get a good night's sleep before testing and to see that they arrive on time for school the days of testing. Minor Miracles

When behaviors are negative, there are more frowns. When behaviors are positive and are progressing positively towards goals, there are more smiles. Smiles are Minor Miracles.

Minor Miracles teaches the individual to identify his/her goals and learn behaviors that access those goals through intervention in behavior encompassing all ecological spheres. Our goal as behaviorists is to facilitate the acquisition of appropriate behaviors by teaching appropriate behavior while at the same time teaching the individual to accept the responsibility for control and management of his/her behavior.

Minor Miracles operates in a home-school setting, where all staff and individuals mix freely with one another. With this mixing of all people involved with Minor Miracles, we strive to create an artificial, but realistic, extended family. Any staff member at any time may be called upon to work with any of the individuals. To do this, all staff are to a significant degree familiar with all individuals who are working on behaviors with us.

Teaching the appropriate behaviors for individuals to reach their goals is an entirely positive operation. Even though most people with whom we work are considered to have behavioral problems and high rates of inappropriate behaviors, we choose to teach appropriate behaviors. When these appropriate behaviors are incorporated into the individual's life, it is impossible for him/her to exhibit the inappropriate behaviors. Look at Henry for a moment. Henry is learning two new appropriate behaviors, (1) hands and feet to self and (2) express emotions verbally. As these behaviors are exercised by Henry, he no longer has the inappropriate behaviors of (1) cursing others and (2) hitting others. Henry also is rewarded heavily for exhibiting these new behaviors.

Minor Miracles, while on rare occasions having to use restraint for protection of the individual, concentrates the hands-on approach on the positive side also. Hugs, pats, and "nice touches" are taught and used at Minor Miracles. The hands-on approach may also be used if we are guiding an individual through the learning of a new behavior. The ignoring of inappropriate behavior and attending to appropriate behavior, the attempt at appropriate behavior, or

the learning of appropriate behavior makes the use of punishment, negative reinforcement, and adversatives unnecessary.

Minor Miracles may use various modes and methods from basic academics to landscaping in teaching, but whatever the activity, our individuals are learning to (1) recognize and exhibit appropriate behavior, (2) realize and take ownership of their own behaviors, (3) show pride in themselves, (4) show appropriate positive feeling for others, (5) communicate more fluently and freely, and (6) be more proficient in skills that they need to reach their goals.

Tax Practitioner Workshops

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service, is once again offering the Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state of Texas, in the Fall of 1990. In addition to the General and Advanced Workshops, there will be four each of the Partnership Taxation and Estate Planning Workshops, and three each of the Income Taxation of Trusts & Estates and Problem Resolution Workshops. The Agricultural Tax Problems Workshop, which was introduced in 1989, will be offered this year in two locations - San Antonio and Amarillo.

We are also proud to announce a new S Corporation Workshop that is being introduced this year in response to numerous requests for a workshop on this topic. It will be offered in Austin, Dallas, and Houston.

School Trustees Meet

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday, October 8, 1990, for their regular monthly session. The Board postponed action on Career Ladder criteria for 1990-91 pending settlement of a law suit by four professional teacher organizations against the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education concerning the postponement of Level IV of the Career Ladder.

The Board approved procedures for implementation of a District Educational Improvement Council. The Board asked the superintendent to develop procedures for the nomination and election of the council membership and to report on these developments at the November meeting. The District Educational Improvement Council is a mandate from the recent Senate Bill 1, and requires the local school board's to establish an advisory group of professional employees to consult on curriculum and educational programs.

In further action, the Board accepted a low bid for a new telephone system. Mr. McCall told the Board that an expanded system could increase

the ability of school personnel to communicate with parents. The new system will be more efficient and should allow the district to reduce its basic services expense. The bid was awarded to Telephones Unlimited of Uvalde.

The Board also approved participation in the South Texas Purchasing Cooperative. Membership in this cooperative allows some thirty-five small districts to purchase instructional supplies in quantity and save significant amounts of money in advertising, administrative paperwork, and cost of the products purchased. Mr. McCall informed the Board that the Co-Op gives small schools the purchasing power of a big district.

The Special Education Cooperative Operating Guidelines for 1990-91 were presented to the Board for approval. The superintendent noted that most of the changes were minor, but there was a new requirement that special students graduating from Brackett Independent School District have a Transition Plan developed for them. This plan is to help ease the transition of a special student from the school environment into the world of work.

Brackett High Campus Improvement Committee

All junior high school teachers and administrators are involved with the Campus Improvement Committee. This committee is direct growth out of Senate Bill I and is intended to involve the community, students, and faculty in identifying campus needs. The needs are then put into

identifiable goals and objectives. Committees are then formed to find ways to solve the problems that have been identified.

Brackett high school and junior high school teachers, along with several students and parents, have met and certain committees were formed to address the needs

that were found through a needs assessment. The committees will continue to meet in an on-going fashion to continually update needs assessments and problem solving.



Shelly McDaniels wins Scholarship

Shelley McDaniel, the daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Jim McDaniel, recently competed in the Farm Bureau Free Enterprise Beauty and Speech Contest. She took first place with her speech and won a \$1,000.00 scholarship and is eligible to compete for even bigger opportunities.

To be able to compete, all contestants must have completed the 1990 Texas Farm Bureau High School Citizenship Seminar held in San Angelo at Angelo State University in June.

The district competition was held at Tapitio Springs Country Club on Saturday, October 6th. Each contestant had to deliver a persuasive speech concerning free enterprise, ranging from four to six minutes in length.

Since winning the thousand dollar scholarship from the Texas Farm Bureau, Shelley will have an expense paid trip to the Farm Bureau convention in San Antonio. She will compete on November 25-26. Thirteen district winners will be competing in the competition. Six contestants will advance to compete in the contest finals on the twenty-sixth.

The winner of the state contest, which is held in San Antonio, will be awarded a \$4,000.00 scholarship, while the

runner-up will receive a \$2,500.00 scholarship. The four remaining finalists will receive scholarship's of \$1,500.00.

The six finalists will additionally receive a four-day, three-night expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. for the national competition.

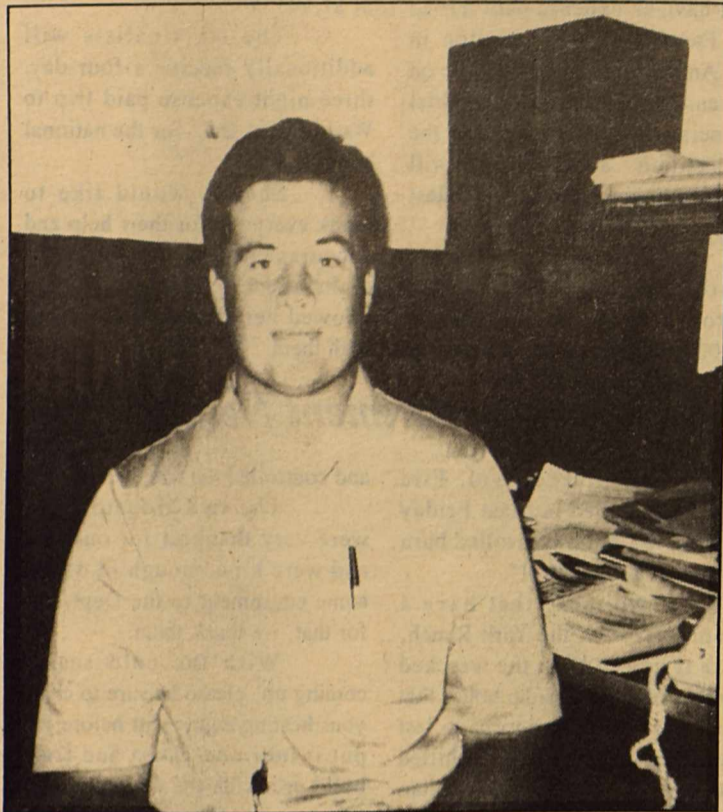
that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Breast Cancer Detection Unit to be at Health Fair


According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.

Old Army Days

Fort Clark, Texas, circa 1921. During these times there was no modern swimming pool, but there was a good swimming hole, as pictured. This of course was the pond created by Las Moras Springs. It appears to be spread out much larger than the present day spring pond, and is in some of the area of the present day swimming pool.

The view in this photo is from the West looking East up the hill to the Officer's Club, which is now the Las Moras Restaurant and Bar. The small building to the left in the background is probably the one which was located directly North, down hill from the rear of the present day Fort Clark Springs Association Administration Building. The asphalt road now encircles a vacant area of ground, of which a building was once located.

During the early 1980's, a friend of mine who was on active duty at Laughlin Air Force Base,
