


Another two car collision occurred Friday, October 26, at 3:30 p.m. at the intersection of U.S. 90 and Ross Street.

Many of the children (and adults) of the community enjoyed the show.



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
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












Tigers Corral Mustangs

BRACKETT - The Fightin' Tigers captured a playoff birth as they defeated the Natalia Mustangs 41-6 Friday evening at Tiger Stadium.

The victory upped Brackett's district record to 3-0, while the Mustangs fell to 1-2.

The Tigers won the toss and elected to receive. Lesly Floyd took the opening kickoff and ran 11 yards before the ball was knocked loose by a Mustang defender as Brackett fumbled giving Natalia possession.

Natalia ran two plays before fumbling the ball back over to Brackett. The Tigers took possession of the ball on their own 31 yardline. Brackett had no problem moving the ball down the field as they put the first points on the board when Adrian Pena ran for a 14 yard touchdown. The PAT kick was blocked as Brackett went up.

Natalia just couldn't hold onto the ball. Their next possession also ended in a turnover, this time Scott Broderick recovered a fumble for Brackett.

The Tigers increased their lead as Billy La Gioia scored on a reverse which covered 34 yards. Steve Clementz ran in the two-point conversion for a 14-0 Tiger lead.

Natalia took the Tigers kickoff and began their only successful drive from their 32 yard-line. Their only six points came on a 7 yard pass from George Campos to Dean Cain. The Mustangs were penalized on the conversion attempt due to a delay of game. On their second attempt they were stopped by the powerful Tiger defense.

Brackett was able to score two more times before halftime.

At the 10:15 mark in the second period, Clay Hunt connected with Frank Rodriguez for a 64 TD pass. George Garcia booted the extra point for a 21-6 lead.

With 1:59 left in the half, Steve Clementz crossed the goal line from two yards out for six points. He ran in the conversion on the fake PAT kick putting Brackett up 29-6 at halftime.

Geovani Wardlaw scored the only points in the second half with two TR4D runs. The first came at the 9:11 mark in the third quarter on a one yard run. His second touchdown came only thirty seconds into the final stanza, when he raced 30 yards rounding out the score to 41-6 for the Tiger victory.

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Word Studies By Ken Curry

"And the Lord God commanded the man, saying, 'From any tree of the garden you may eat freely; but from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat from it you shall surely die'" (Gen 2:16-17). In translating the Hebrew Old Testament into English, the work "surely" was added because the last clause contained two forms of the Hebrew word "die", thus "surely" was added for emphasis, much like the current television commercial that says the product will "kill roaches dead". Butter translation from the Hebrew would be, "in the day that you eat from it, dying, you will die," thus indicating two distinct deaths. In fact, the Bible clearly identifies seven different types of death.

A first type is Spiritual death, which involves spiritual separation from God in Time. In the moment when Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit, they died spiritually, which means their human spirits became dormant, or inoperative, so that their fellowship with God in time was broken. Their spiritual death brought on type two, physical death, wherein the human soul departs from the body (in the case of a believer, the human soul AND human spirit). Every person is born physically alive,, but spiritually dead and is subject to physical death. If a person accepts by faith god's plan of salvation,, that person's human spirit is regenerated, or made alive by the Holy Spirit (Titus 3:5) so that fellowship with God in time and understanding of Bible doctrine is now possible (I Cor. 2:14). A person who rejects God's plan will be subject to the Second death - eternal separation from God (Rev. 20:11-15).

A fourth type is Positional - Christians are identified with Christ in His death (Rom. 6:1-11, Col. 2:20). A fifth type is Operational - "...faith without works is dead (nonproductive)", (James 2:26). A sixth type is Temporal death. It only applies to a Christian who in a point of time is :carnal", i.e., controlled by his old sin nature, as opposed to being controlled by the Holy Spirit (Gal. 5:19-21 contrasted with 5:22-23; also Rom. 8:6). a seventh type is Sexual death - (Rom. 4:19 & Heb. 11:12) describe how Abraham and his wife Sarah were past childbearing age when they received the promise of a son.

Gardening Tips By Archie Woodson

Fall is here and the treat of frost is near. It's time to start making plans to protect your tender patio plants.

Here are some steps to make the transition form bright light outdoors to low light indoors more successful. First, you need to slow down the growth of your plant by cutting back on feeding and watering. Second, start moving the plant gradually into areas of lower light. You may want to trim and reshape your plant at this time to accommodate less room indoors. Pick a place indoors with the best available light and keep this area above 45 degrees.

Don't forget to check for insects and disease before bringing your plants indoors as these problems can really multiply in warm, close quarters.

The English Committee, a subcommittee of the High School Campus Improvement Committee, has met and has come up with and adopted the following goals which

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
will go into the campus improvement plan and be an on-going development for school wide writing skills.

 Be prepared to discuss your child's reaction to school, health or emotional problems, hobbies or special interests, homework habits, and the type of discipline that works best at home.


• Afterwards, discuss the conference with your child, pointing out strengths first.


 Follow through immediately on any plans you and the teacher have discussed.

Mrs. Lueniz E. Colbert, an old, old Cherokee-Choctaw barn near Anthers, Oklahoma was taught by her Mother to make bean bread the following way:

Soak corn grits overnight in warm water. Drain, pound into a meal, sifting out the husks. Cook red pinto beans until done and add to the meal while boiling to scold the meal. Add salt and crumbled fried fat meat. Use about 1/2 meal and 1/2 bean mixture. The dough should be stiff. Form into buns about the size of a medium size potato and wrap in corn husks and tie. Cook in boiling water for 1/2 to 3/4 hour or until done. Serve hot! Ump, Ump, thats larrunpin good!!






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Community based care for the mentally ill -more money is not the only answer

Although 75 percent of Texans with severe mental illness are ignored in this state, additional funding is not the only solution to improving mental health services according to the statewide Commission on Community Care of the Mentally Ill.

In its report, Texans with Severe Mental Illness, the Commission found that approximately 15 percent of all Texans suffer from some form of mental illness, and only one in four who are seriously mentally ill receives any type of treatment.

Texas currently ranks 49th in per capita dollars spent on mental health services. Since 1965, when state hospitals began releasing patients back into communities, inadequate funding levels have resulted in the lack of essential community services to assist these people.

Acknowledging that lack of funding is the primary reason that community services are not adequate, the report emphasizes

that funding itself will not resolve the problems. "Also needed," it states, "is a concerted effort on the part of planners and service providers to use monies effectively to increase the availability and quality of services.'

The Commission, sponsored by the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health, spent three years studying how best to meet the needs of Texans with severe and persistent mental illness. The panel sought to determine the most effective means of shifting responsibility of care and treatment from large institutions to individual communities.

The 15-member panel recognized that community based treatment must become more effective to meet the challenge of serving persons with severe mental illness. In designing better treatment options, special programs should be developed to assist minority populations, the homeless, the elderly, drug and alcohol abusers and members of the prison population, in addition to improvements within state institube developed or expanded to enable persons with mental illness to lead satisfying lives within the commu-

Issues such as improved training for mental health care providers, expanded use of new technologies, and increased cooperation among human service agencies are addressed within the report. Specific recommendations also are included to assist individual communities in developing improved local pro-

The Commission on Community Care of the Mentally Ill is one of three commissions created by the Hogg Foundation to study how mental health services can be improved for all Texans in need. Commission members represent professionals in the public and private sectors, volunteers and family members of persons with severe mental illness. Home Administration (FmHA), an partment of Agriculture, has

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selected the Farm Safety for "Just Kids" program as its public service project for 1990-91, through its Wellness Program's Public Safety Campaign, according to Edmund L. Persyn, Jr., FmHA County Supervisor for Uvalde, Edwards, Real, Kinney and Val Verde Counties

Farm Safety for "Just Kids" is a non-profit organization dedicated to educating parents and children about farm injury prevention. This organization stresses raising awareness levels regarding on-farm hazards. Each year, farm accidents result in the death of 300 young people and 5,000 serious injuries. The primary age group effected is 5 to 14 years old.

Persyn stated, "FmHA's involvement in the program will enable Farm Safety for "Just Kids" to reach a national audience for the first time." Educational material including a film, safety fact sheet, warning decals and children's workbooks will be distributed by FmHA personnel throughout Texas. Over 13,000 FmHA mployees, nationwide, will help spread the farm safety message to schools and the general public.

A Cornell University study reveals that children bear the brunt of farm accidents when the injury rate is adjusted to account for the time each worker is in the workplace. In 1988, 35.6 percent



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

Texas Agricultural Extension Service

4-H News

All county youth are reminded that although it is not to late to join the 4-H Club, deadlines for having animals on feed are fast approaching to be eligible to show at this county livestock show in January. Also, the foods and nutrition program is in full swing and you may not have an opportunity to participate if you wait any longer this year.

Feral Hogs

News from Overton, Texas is the new challenge to hunters in that area. When the Texas deer season begins for rifle hunters next month, more of them will be looking for first-time encounters with another game animal, the feral hog.

Billy Higginbotham, wildlife and fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says feral hog numbers have increased tremendously throughout most of

Texas during the past few years. The numbers, Higginbothan says, are high enough that some landowners are using the hogs as a bargaining point in hunting leases. Hunters should be able to combine feral hog hunts with their traditional deer hunts in most hoginhabited areas, where both seasonal leases and day hunts are available.

Many experienced hunters have said they find a hog hunt challenging because the hogs are smarter and more elusive than deer. Hogs are basically a wet habitat animal, although they have adapted well to drier climates of south and south central Texas.

In wet years, they move out of bottomland and bogs into the upland sites. But, under heavy hunting pressure, they move deeper into remote areas and become nocturnal.

There is no regulated hunting season for feral hogs. Hunters should, however, inform local game wardens if they plan to hunt at night or use methods that may be mistaken for deer or other regulated hunting.

Dr. Dale Rollins, Wildlife Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at San Angelo, reports that specialty groups such as bow hunters, black powder hunters and pistol clubs are interested in hog hunting and this has created a ready market for hogs in some areas and probably become more common.

Walter Carter, manager of the Broseco Ranch in Northeast Texas says they have thousands of feral hogs on the ranch. Their operation is beef cattle and they would like to completely rid the ranch of the hogs. The ranch provides ideal habitat for the hogs and the ranch's commercial hunts have included hogs for several

Carter says they have several hundred hog hunters each year. Bow hunters are particularly interested in hog hunts following deer season. This usually gives them several more months of

One Nacogdoches County ranch is selling hog hunts with a different approach. The ranch

traps hogs on lands where they are a nuisance and move them to the ranch where they are fed yearround with automatic feeders. Bow hunters are the major market and they have been contacted by other hunters as well.

Higginbotham says that hog is excellent to eat and easy to prepare. The same sanitary practices should be taken when processing feral hogs as with venison. Sausage is one of the favorite dishes, but the meat can be prepared using any pork recipe.

Kinney County ranches who have an abundance of feral (wild) hogs should consider incorporating them into their commercial deer hunts.

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






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

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

Natural gas-considered our safest alternative fuel-is the only fossil fuel that burns cleanly enough that we routinely use it in our kitchens. Yet this same fuel can be used to power the massive bus behemoths that move millions of commuters through our cities daily.

Currently, 30,000 cars, trucks and buses run on natural gas in the United States. Worldwide, a half million vehicles in 38 countries are fueled by natural gas. Natural gas-fueled vehicles achieve up to a 90 percent reduction in carbon monoxide emissions, up to a 20 percent reduction in nitrogen oxide emissions, and an 85 percent reduction in reactive hydrocarbons in comparison with those of gasoline and diesel vehicles.

Five percent of the total natural gas-powered fleet in the U.S.—some 1.500 vehicles—is operated by Consolidated Natural Gas Company, Pittsburgh, The company recently introduced a mass transit bus powered by clean-burning natural gas. The bus, manufactured by the Flxible Corporation of Delaware. Ohio-the largest manufacturer of transit buses in the U.S.—will be tested in 1990 in regular commuter service in

The conversion of eight million fleet vehicles-five percent of the nation's total transportation fuel market-to natural gas would require about a trillion cubic feet of gas. This would result in saving 500,000 barrels of oil imports a day, translating into a reduction of about S4 billion annually in foreign energy

Around the country, natural gas is selling for the equivalent of about 40 to 80 cents a gallon, compared with gasoline prices of 95 cents to \$1.15 per gallon. A natural gas car can be refueled in five minutes. A natural gas vehicle's top speed is the same as that of a gasoline-powered vehicle.

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

Oh Where Oh Where, Has Herman Gone? A few years ago the "Herman" craze, (nobody seems to know exactly how it got its name), sweeped the country like a chain letter. Frinds, who nurture it pass it on to there friends, usualy accompanied by a coffee cake and the recipe. What is "Herman"? It is a dough "cultured" dough you add to new dough to give it distinctive flavor and texture it wouldn't otherwise have. But unlike other starters that require constant feeding, stirring and using, this one dosn't make a slave out of you. You replenish "Herman" only after you use it. And if thats longer than 14 days, put it in the freezer untill you're

"Herman"

3 Tbl. sugar 1 envelope active dry yeast 1 tsp. salt 2 cups warm water (105 115

2 cups flour

degrees)

In large bowl mix flour, sugar, yeast, and salt. Gradually stir in water; beat or wisk until smooth. Cover with towel; set in warm (80-85 degree) draft free place, the kitchen or other warm room in summer, or in cold weather on top of a well insulated heater. Stir 2 or 3 times a day for about 3 days or until starter is bubbly and produces a yeasty aroma. Transfer to a larger bowl,

large jar or plastic container. Cover partially (tilt lid or punch holes in plastic cover); refridgerate. Makes about 1 1/2 to 2 cups starter, depending on thickness. It can be creamy or as thick as dough because of room conditions, the age of "Herman", and other varia-

Care and Feeding of "Herman"

The starter should be used within 14 days and replenished and fed immediatly after each use. To feed "Herman" stir or whisk in 1 cup each flour and milk and 1/2 cup sugar; mixture need not be completely smooth. Wait at least 24 hrs. befour using again. If you don't plan to use the starter with in 14 days, cover tightly and freeze. Freezing slows the fermentation, so let stand at room temperature several hours or until thawed and bubbly before re-using.

"Herman" Coffee Cake

1 cup flour 1/2 cup sugar 1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp each soda & salt 1 cup "Herman" 1/3 cup oil 1/2 cup raisins 1/4 cup chopped nuts

In large bowl mix flour, sugar, baking powder, soda & salt. Add "Herman", oil, eggs, raisins and nuts; stir to mix well. Spread

in greased and floured 8 or 9 inch square pan, sprinkle with topping, (below). Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 30-35 minutes, until tests done. Cool slightly in pan on rack. Cut in squares. Best served warm. Serves 9.



A normal blood pressure reading is one of 120/80 or lower. One of 140/90 is considered the upper limit of normal. Anything over that can be considered dangerously high blood pressure.

Fort Clark Residence, Mr. & Mrs. **Buckles Returns Home**

Ron and Lorene Buckles of Fort Clark Springs returned on October 26 from 10 days spent on a volunteer mission to repair homes damaged by Hurricane Hugo on the island of St. Croix, Virgin Islands.

The Buckles were part of a team of 16 persons who, under the auspices of the VIM (Volunteers in Mission) program of the United Methodist Church paid their own expenses for the trip and worked as volunteers during their

Winds of up to 200 miles per hour and tornadoes stripped all leaves from the trees, roofs from most homes, and destroyed some homes down to their concrete slabs. Much repair has been

accomplished but many homes still have their roofs covered with plastic tarps. The eight men of the work team replaced a corrugated tin roof on one such home while the eight women painted the inside of a three-bedroom home for a crippled lady and went on to assist another widow by installing and floating sheetrock in her home which a contractor had left unfinished.

The problems of the people were complicated by the fact that the island insurance companies were overwhelmed and declared bankruptcy, leaving people's claims unpaid.

Reconstruction work assignments for work teams are handled by an Interfaith Coalition

of religions on the island, consisting of the Christian, Jewish. Moslem and Baha'i churches. This group also channels relief money and repair materials to the most needy.

The island, a U.S. possession, has a population of 20% White, 30% Puerto Rican, and 50% Black. All people suffered many hardships during and after the hurricane, but only three persons died in the hurricane.
