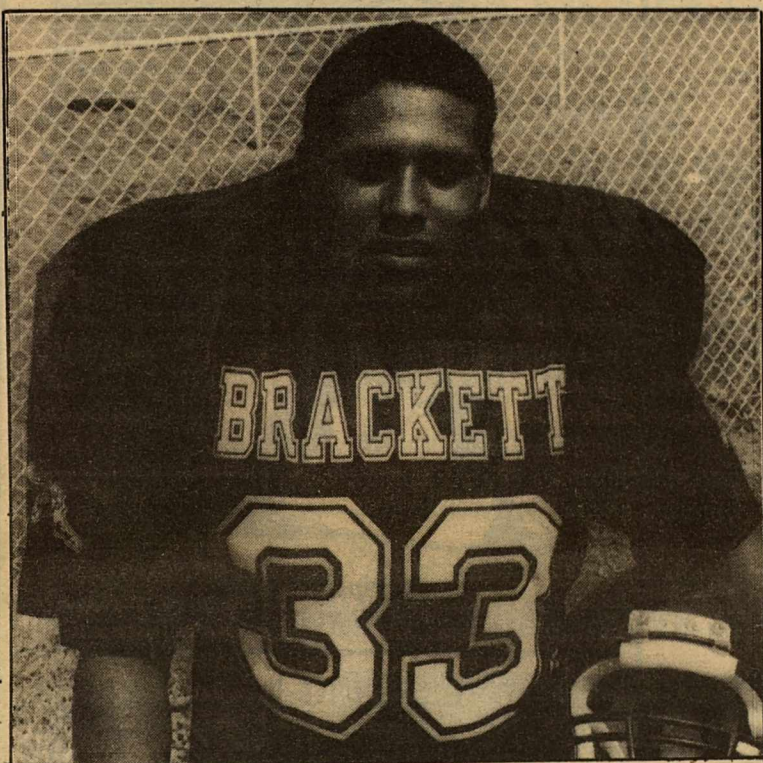

There was damage to the vehicles involved, but no injuries sustained.

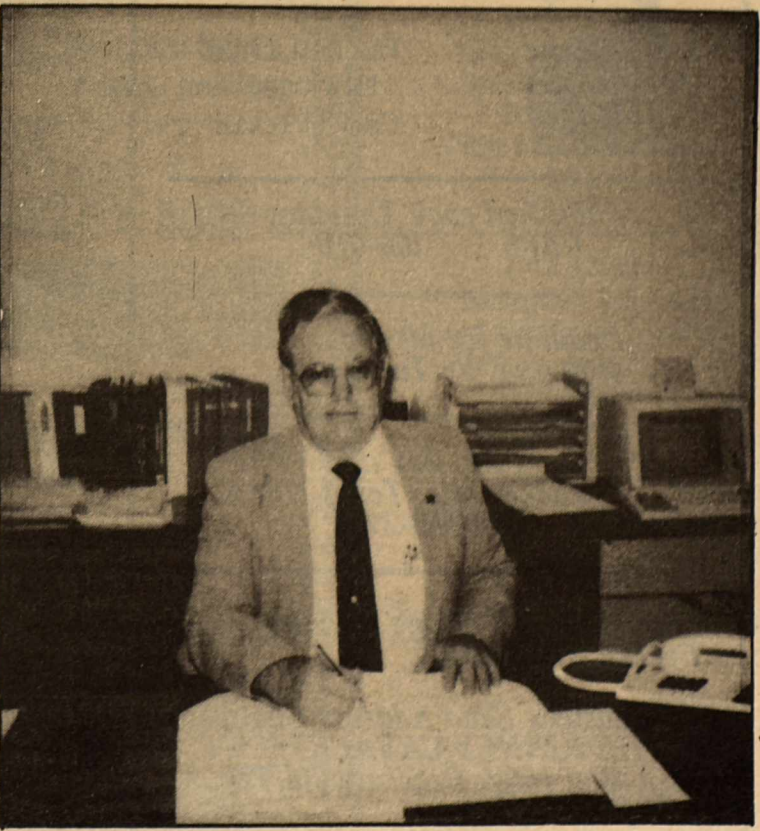
Fort Hires New Manager

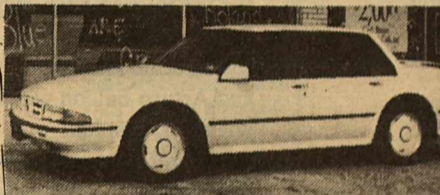

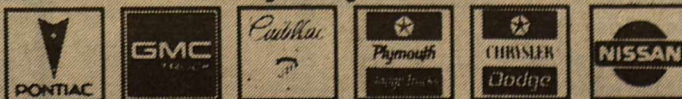

Tigers Spoil LaPryor Homecoming

LA PRYOR - The Fightin' Tigers traveled to La Pryor last Friday evening to face the Bulldogs in district 29-AA football action. After 48 minutes in the heated battle, the Tigers came up on top 21-8.

The Tigers began their first drive on their own 18 yard line. The backfield duo of Steve Clementz and Michael Flores provided the Tigers with the necessary rushing yardage as Brackett easily moved the ball down the field. Flores put the first points on the scoreboard at the 4:59 mark in the opening period when he crossed the goalline from 7 yards out. George Garcia kicked the extra point giving Brackett a 7-0 lead.

The second quarter turned out to be a defensive battle. La Pryor was creative with their

unusual offensive attack, but were unsuccessful in putting any points on the scoreboard.

Clementz scored for the first time at the 7:27 mark in the third stanza on a 4 yard touchdown run. The PAT kick was unsuccessful as Brackett increased their lead to 13-0.

Brackett scored on their next possession when Geovani Wardlaw had a 12 yard TD run on a sweep. Clementz ran in the conversion putting Brackett up 21-0.

La Pryor's only touchdown came with :07 remaining in the third quarter, when quarterback Ramiro Salazar plunged into the endzone from 2 yards out. He connected with Hector Esquibel for the two-point conversion making the final score 21-8.

Tigers Go For District

BRACKETTVILLE - The district 29-AA high school football crown will be decided Friday evening as the Brackett Tigers (6-3) host the unbeaten Dilley Wolves (9-0). Both teams have yet to loose a district contest.

All the preseason polls showed that the Dilley Wolves were picked to finish somewhere in the middle of the race, but no one expected the Wolves to go unbeaten through the first nine weeks of the season. Their only remaining game is against Brackett, and even though they're favored the game won't be taken lightly. "If anyone can shut us down, it's Brackett," said Dilley Head Coach Kelly Shull.

Brackett's powerful running game will be put to a test when they face the Wolves defense. Dilley has given up only 26 points this season in 9 games averaging an amazing 2.9 points a game. Shull said Dilley puts forth a "total team effort defensively." The Tigers are led by senior runningback Steve Clementz (5'6 170). He has rushed for 1,011 yards in 216 carries this season and has scored 11 touchdowns. Michael Flores will start at the other runningback spot, while Lynn Floyd will be at quarterback for the injured Clay Hunt. Tevin Senne will be at wide receiver, Frank Rodriguez is at tight end, and Arturo Falcon will start at the wingback position.

Rogelio Herrera and Mark Dimery will start as offensive tackles, while Scott Sims and Angel Jaso will fill the guard spots and Peter Perez will snap for Brackett.

Oney Ramirez leads the aerial attack for the Wolves. His primary receivers are Johny Equia, Saul Obregon, and Billy Ochoa. Fullback Manuel Rodriguez is featured when Dilley keeps the ball on the ground. Tiger coach Steve Kolb said his main concern is stopping the big play: "At any time, they can break loose for a touchdown." Kolb also added that Brackett must improve their kicking game and their offense must be able to generate good field position.

Opening kickoff is scheduled for 8pm Friday evening at Tiger Stadium in Brackettville.

Sports Bits

The Fightin' Tigers will be playing for the district championship as they host the Dilley Wolves Friday night. Win or loose they will begin playoff action next week. Depending on the outcome of several games this weekend, the Tigers will play either Wimberly, Poth, or Marion.

Steve Clementz will have a chance to put his name in the record books. He is quickly approaching the all-time individual rushing record at Brackett High School. Clementz has rushed for 1,011 yards this season. The record was set in 1977 by Moses Benitez. Benitez managed 1,162 yards in a single season. Clementz is only 151 yards shy.

The Brackett Tigerettes were shining Tuesday as they scrimmaged with Nueces Canyon. The two teams will scrimmage again next Tuesday at Tiger Gym. That will be their only preparation before the Big Mac Classic in Del Rio, which will begin one week from today. Brackett's first game will be at 5:30 next Thursday against Laredo United North. In the next round they will face either San Angelo Central or Laredo Nixon. San Angelo Central is the defending champion. Other teams participating in the three day event are Midland Lee, San Antonio Edison, Laredo Cigarroa, San Antonio Sam Houston, South San - San Antonio, Carrizo Springs, Midland High, Eagle Pass, San

Angelo Lakeview, Laredo United South, Laredo Martin, and Del Rio.

Tigerette Basketball

BARKSDALE - The Tigerettes are roaring and ready for their upcoming basketball season. Last Tuesday they traveled to Barksdale for a scrimmage against Nueces Canyon.

The two teams began by polishing their offense's while going through halfcourt drills. After everyone was warmed up, they began scrimmaging fullcourt.

sophomore quarterback Lynn Floyd.

Lineman Rogelio Herrera and Scott Broderick suffered minor knee injuries, while Adrian Pena had a pulled groin. All three are listed as probable for the game.

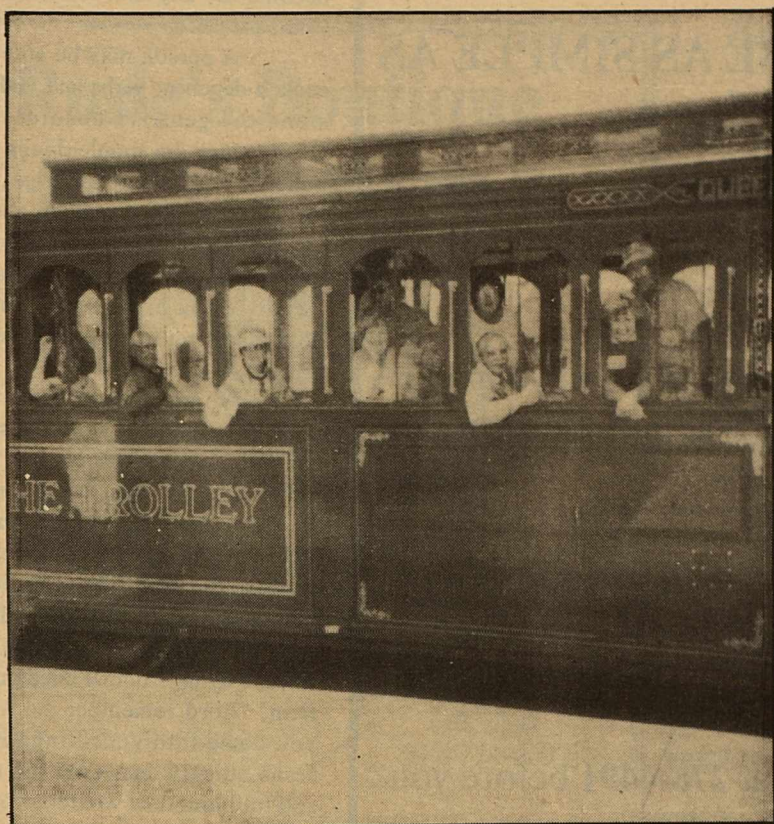

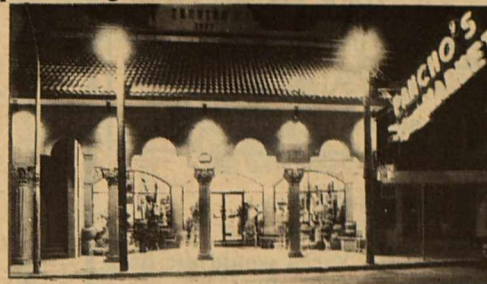

Word Studies

A most interesting Bible doctrine is that of dispensations. The idea is that there are clearly defined periods of time, or ages, in the Bible that differ in God's revelation of Himself to a man and his purpose for man. A unique dispensation was the time Adam and Eve spent in the Garden of Eden. The Scofield Reference Bible calls this time the Age of innocence, when man was sinless. From the expulsion from Eden to

the Flood, we might call the Age of Human Conscience, since there was no written law from God. From the Flood to the time of Babel might be called the Age of Human Government, since all the people were in the same place and spoke the same language. From the calling of Abraham to the Day of Pentecost, we may speak of as the Age of Israel. Our present dispensation we might call the Church Age. From the future Rapture of the Church to the Second Coming of Christ, the

Bible itself identifies as the Tribulation period. Following the Second Coming will be the Kingdom Age, with Christ ruling the earth for 1000 years (Rev. 20:4-7). After the last dispensation time will end and eternity will begin.

What we name the various dispensations is not as important as that we recognize the differences between them. Some revelations from God apply to all dispensations, i.e., the promise of the redeemer/savior given to Adam and Eve in the Garden (Gen. 3:15). However, many revelations and laws from God only apply to the dispensation in which they were given, or if prophecy, might apply only to a future dispensation. For example, one of the Ten Commandments was to keep the sabbath holy; this has no application at all to the Church age and we don't observe it. The Prophecy given by Christ in Matt. 25:31-46 has no application today, but will have future application in the coming Tribulation period.

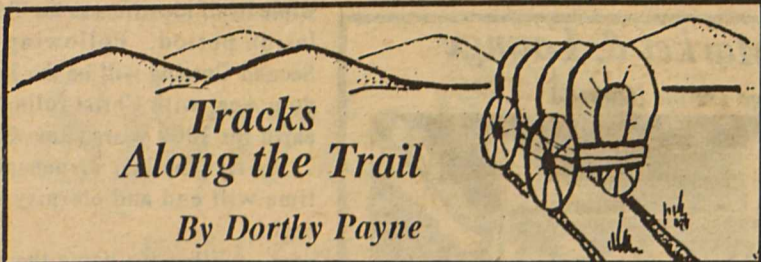

Pioneers called the Yucca "bear grass" or "soap weed". The botanical name is "Yucca glauca." In Mexico, the plant is called, "Candles of the Lord" which describes the plant better.

The yucca called "bear grass" belongs to the Lily family and is kin to the onion family.

The blossoms at the top is used for food. The petals are picked one by one, soaked in brine, rinsed and cooked in a better like eggplant is fried.

Cactus candy is made with Yucca and is delicious. Shoes are made from the fibers, also ropes, mats, baskets and rugs.

The Pioneers used the

plants to make soap. Without the Pronuba Moth the Yucca would die out. The female moth gathers the Yucca pollen from the blossoms, rolls it into a ball and then flies to another plant and pats it onto the stigma, then lays her eggs onto this ball.

Some of the eggs are eaten by caterpillars and other insects, but enough seeds survive to mature.

Some value the Yucca for its many uses, and some admire it's beauty, but most agree that the Yucca deserves to be called "Candles of the Lord".

Reflections

What's the greatest city and the grandest life you've ever heard about? The Bible speaks of "The City of God" and the life that is ever lasting. Can anyone match this?

The door into God's presence is open to all. The one requirement that is universal is faith or trust in Jesus Christ as the Lord and Savior. The Bible says all the prophets gave witness to Jesus. He himself said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no one comes unto the Father except through me."

What about the person who is upright morally, but has no faith in Jesus? Is that one's conduct a passport that opens heaven's doors?

Look for a moment at

Paul. Before his conversion to Jesus, he had a life that was "blameless." After getting God's righteousness in Christ, he counted his previous pride of life as "garbage." The Old Testament declares that "all our righteousness - - apart from God's imputed purity - - is like filthy rages in God's sight." We need more than personal goodness to get inside the gates of glory.

Of course, a Christian gives evidence of his faith by his works. We are saved and energized by Christ to produce good works (Ephesians 2:8-10.) However, if salvation came by "The good life," then Jesus died in vain.

Education gets a lot of emphasis in every generation. We need to study and learn. Students need to take advantage of every opportunity to comprehend more. And yet, one's I.Q. or skills never

become the key that lets us into God's presence.

A person may be able to explain deponent verbs and understand the genitive absolute in Greek which are simple things for one who knows that language. A math student may know all about logarithms and an attorney may be expert in jurisprudence. But those "wrinkles on brain cells" don't hold the secret to a personal relationship with God.

Some people feed the poor, visit the sick, work to "save the environment," clothe the shivering masses, and show compassion in a dozen other ways. All of this, however, never removes the need for the spiritual birth which guarantees eternal life.

When Jesus hung on the cross, a dying criminal cried out to Him, "Lord remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus quickly answered the man and told him they would have life together in Paradise.

Is this all there is to the Christian life? No., but it's the doorway. We can trust the Lord and then find that "the sky is the limit" in everything we do in His name and for the Lord's glory. You can't beat a deal like this!

The truth of life through Jesus Christ is not a "Johnny-come-lately" idea. From the outset of human history, God has declared His holiness, His righteousness. God showed through all the Old Testament sacrificial system and through all the prophecies of the coming Messiah that there is one way open to eternal life. This is the Gospel.

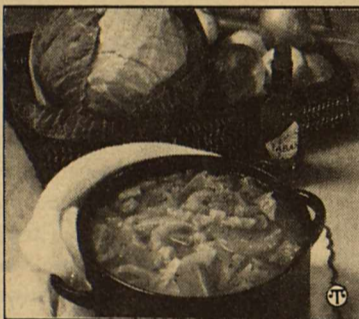
Old World Comfort Soup

- 2 medium carrots, chopped (about 1 cup)
- 2 turnips, cut in julienne strips (about 2 cups)
- 4 sprigs parsley

- 3/4 cup raisins
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons caraway seeds
- 1 teaspoon Tabasco pepper sauce

In large kettle or soup pot combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Cover. Simmer 1 1/2-2 hours, stirring occasionally. Remove ham bone; cut off meat and return to pot. (Discard bone.) If desired, serve with additional Tabasco pepper sauce.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service
By Alan L. McWilliams

Several weeks ago I wrote an article describing the long-range program planning process that I and other county residents have worked on to identify critical issues and needs for Kinney County in the next four years. This was also done in every county in the state of Texas. Water quality was the number one issue identified in a majority of counties. Our county selected water quality and quantity as well.

Water quality projects that address agriculture-related concerns are currently being sponsored in 45 states by the United States Department of Agriculture. The Upper Bosque River Hydrologic Unit in north-central Texas is on of the agricultural watersheds in Texas selected as a water problem area.

The principal goal of the project is to assist farmers and ranchers in voluntarily applying conservation practices that will help protect or improve water quality.

The Upper North Bosque River Water shed contains 229,760 acres in Earth, Hamilton and Bosque Counties. The primary objective of the project will be to assist dairies in installing animal waste management systems and applying the best management practices needed to significantly reduce or prevent the potential for pollution of surface and ground-water.

Accomplishing rapid, voluntary producer adoption of recommended practices and systems through extensive and focused educational, technical and financial assistance programs is the overall goal of the project.

Four agencies responsible for the project include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

A five-year plan will take the project though fiscal year

1994. Informational and educational programs developed throughout this period will benefit not only local producers, but will extend to other regions and resource areas with similar concerns.

When people see a sick tree, the often think that some sort of disease is causing the illness. Actually, a majority of the problems causing trees and shrubs to look sick stem from stress of physical injury rather than disease.

A common symptom of stress or injury is marginal leaf burn, or leaves fringed by dead tissue. This has been a common problem with numerous species of trees and shrubs this fall.

Marginal leaf burns are seldom caused by leaf disease, which usually shows up as random lesions (dead areas) scattered about the leaf.

Leaf burns occur at the leaf tip or along the leaf margin because salts (plant nutrients) accumulate along leaf margins. Anything that causes serious problems. Small unwatered trees and shrubs often die early in a drought period. Large trees show responses to stress more slowly. Some of the marginal leaf burns now being observed relate to last June and early July.

High temperatures cause plants to pump more water and simply compound drought problems. As temperatures exceed 100 degrees F, water loss by some trees and shrubs can equal or exceed the ability of the roots to supply water, even when the soil moisture is not deficient.

Because of extreme Texas temperatures each summer, freeze injury is often overlooked, yet it is also on of the most common and damaging caused of stress.

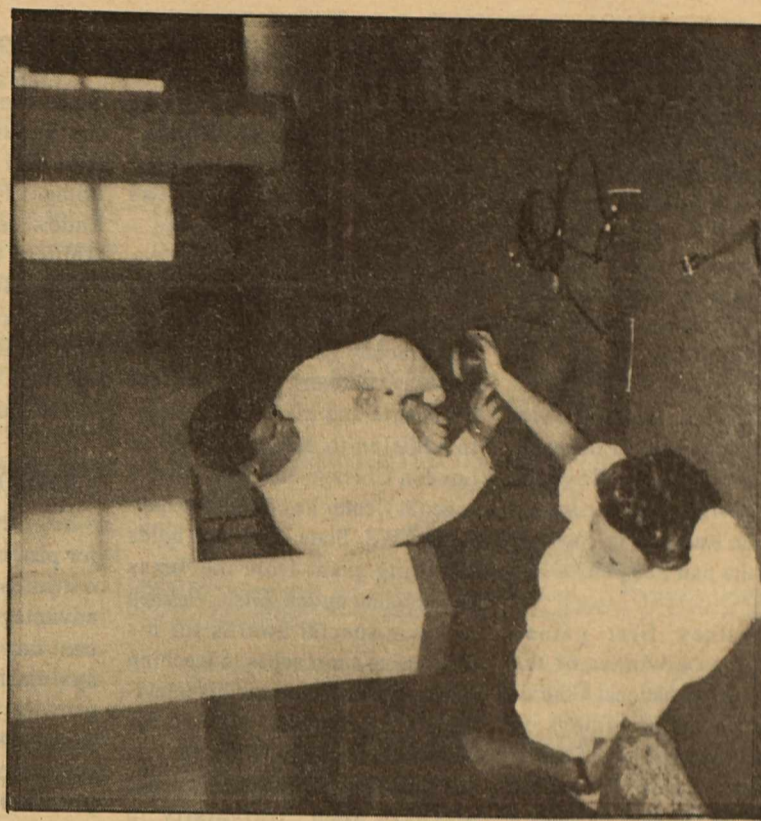


Honorary Parade Marshall in Del Rio

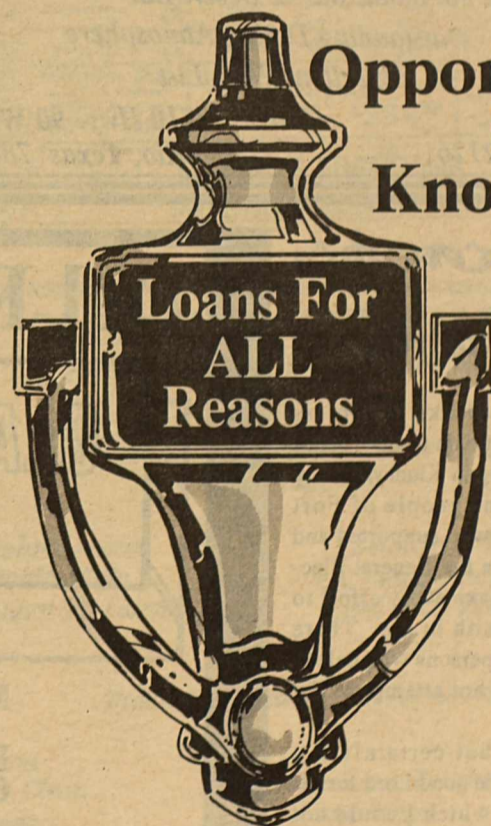

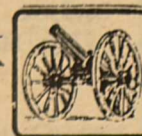

Gardening Tips

November is a good time for planting. Trees and Shrubs set out in early November can take advantage of less heat and abundant rain to establish a good root system for next springs rapid growth. It is important to keep these new members to your landscape moist, and before the temperature drops near or below freezing soak them well as the added moisture will retain some heat and help protect those tender roots. Mulching with pinebark or compost will also act as an insulator and help to retain moisture.

This is your last chance to plant bluebonnets, either seeds or transplants - but the best time to plant pansies, calendula, dianthus, snapdragons and violas.

Cool season crops for the garden include beets, carrots, mustard, spinach, parsley and cold-hardy plants like cabbage, broccoli, kale, kohlrabi and mustard. These hardy plants will survive freezing temperatures even into the low 20 degrees.

band was one of the entertainment features during times when there were no radios, TV's and not even a newspaper current to the day, week, and possibly monthly on western military posts. The bank not only provided entertainment, but was a factor in stirring up patriotism, especially when soldiers morale and spirits were low. Low morale was a common problem on western outposts, especially during the 1800's and early 1900's. There was not much for soldiers to do, when not on a campaign, except to drill, do daily chores, get drunk on paydays, read out dated newspapers or the same books, (those that knew how to read) over and over.

The above photo of the Fort Clark bandstand was taken in the early 1900's, and remained in the same place until the U.S. Government sold Fort Clark in 1946. The foundation still remains in place at the south end of the drill field, across the street from the post commanders quarters (Wainwright House). Picture in your mind, if you will, of old army days when the Fort Clark band gave a concert from this bandstand,, probably on a Sunday afternoon, or evening. During those times, it was something to look forward to!

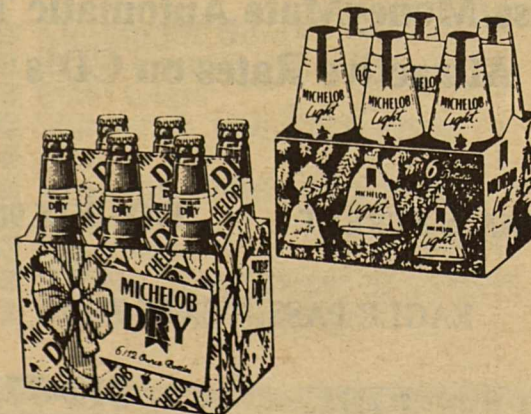
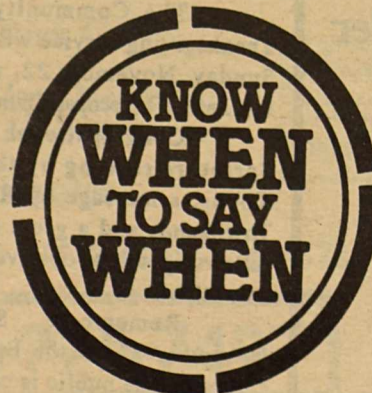

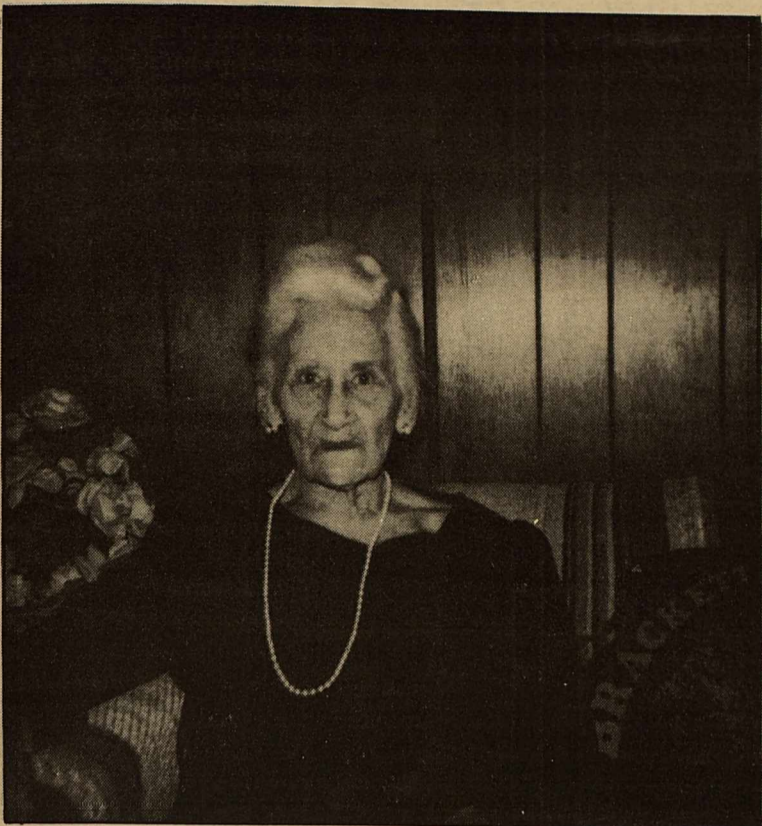

Resolution

A resolution of the City Council of the City of Brackettville, Texas, authorizing the submission of a Wastewater Improvements grant and loan application to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) under the Community Programs Fund; and an application to the Texas Water Development Board for loan funds; and authorizing the Mayor to act as the City's Executive Officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the City's participation in the FmHA Community Programs and the Texas Water Development Board Loan.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Brackettville, Texas and Ft. Clark Municipal District desire to develop viable urban communities, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities; and

WHEREAS, certain conditions exist which represent a threat to the public health, economic welfare and safety for the City of Brackettville and Ft. Clark Springs; and

WHEREAS, Ft. Clark Municipal Utility District has agreed to ask the City of Brackettville to act as the administrator and manager of the existing and proposed Wastewater Treatment Facilities for Ft. Clark Municipal Utility District; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and in the best interests of the City of Brackettville, Texas to apply for funding of Wastewater Facilities to serve both the City of Brackettville and Ft. Clark Municipal Utility District under the FmHA Community Program Fund;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS;

1. That a FmHA application for the Community Programs fund is hereby authorized to be filed on behalf of the City and Fort Clark Municipal Utility District.
 2. That the City's application be placed in competition for funding under the FmHA Community Programs Fund.
 3. That the application be for both grant and loan funds to carry out wastewater treatment and collection improvements.
 4. That an application be made to the Texas Water Development Board for loan funds in the event that funding is not available from the FmHA.
 5. That the City of Brackettville will function as the Administrator for the project which will serve both the City and the Ft. Clark Municipal Utility District.
 6. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Farmers Home Administration Community Programs and the Texas Water Development Board loan funding.
 7. That it further be stated that the City of Brackettville is committing the City to providing Wastewater Treatment for Fort Clark Springs Municipal Utility District for rates to be subsequently negotiated and approved by the Public Utilities Commission contingent upon approval of funding from the Farmers Home Administration or the Texas Water Development Board.

Some Lawmakers Fight To Keep Us Safe

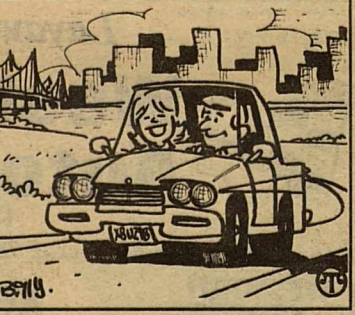
Americans should take note of those legislators in Washington who are working to keep us on the road to safety.

Those members of Congress are against proposals to raise the federal gas tax to finance the federal deficit. They favor keeping tax dollars dedicated to improving America's roads and bridges.

Studies show the U.S. has some 650,000 miles of heavily-traveled rough and worn roads and nearly 231,000 decaying bridges. It would cost more than \$353 billion dollars to bring our roads and bridges up to the standards at which they should be.

Without greater investment in improvements, the nation's road systems—which carry most of our commerce, and provide personal mobility for all Americans—will continue to deteriorate and repair costs will escalate. That's a danger to our personal safety as well as the economy, says The Road Information Program (TRIP), a non-profit highway transportation research organization.

Motorists for the past 34 years have paid a federal gasoline tax which goes into the Federal High-

way Trust Fund. Those funds are then returned to the states to build and maintain our roads and bridges. Raising the gas tax to finance the deficit would increase difficulties states have in raising their own gas taxes for roads and bridge improvements.

Many motorists want to see the federal gasoline tax remain dedicated to safer roads and bridges. They see the gasoline tax as a pay-as-you-go user fee for highway programs, not a tax to help balance the federal budget.
