

Clay Hunt Makes All Tournament Team

BARKSDALE - The Fightin' Tigers participated in the tenth annual Nueces Canyon basketball tournament last week. All-tournament selection Clay Hunt led Brackett to a second place finish.

The Tigers began action at noon last Thursday against the hometown Nueces Canyon Panthers. The Tigers had easily defeated the Panthers 75-45 two days before, but Nueces Canyon made the necessary changes to provide the fans with a close ball game. Brackett was pressured with strong Panther defense, but still managed a 52-41 victory.

Lesly Floyd and Tevin Senne led the Tigers offensive attack with 15 points each. W. T. Hunt also scored in double-figures with 10 points, while Clay Hunt had seven, Steve Clementz made three, and Scott Sims added two.

Will Baker scored two, and Ben
Carabajal had one.

That evening Brackett faced the Utopia Buffaloes. The Tigers advanced to the finals with a 62-58 win. "It was a hard fought victory," added Tigers high scorer W. T. Hunt. The Hunt

brothers, W. T. and Clay led Brackettville in scoring with 21 and 20 points. Tevin Senne had 15, Lesly Floyd scored six, and Refugio Martinez made two.

In the finals, which were held on Saturday, the Tigers went headto-head with the Knippa Rockcrushers. Knippa took first place with a 66-55 victory.



With a 32-29 lead, Eagle Pass came back with good play in the final period for the 51-39 victory.



Word Studies By Ken Curry

"And I, brethren, could not speak unto you as unto spiritual, but as unto carnal, even as unto babes in Christ" (I Cor. 3:1 KJV). The word "carnal" is a translation of the Greek word "sarkikos", which means fleshly (newer translations use fleshly rather than the. older Latinate word "carnal" of the King James Version). The Apostle Paul in his epistles places Christians into two distinct categories; they are either carnal or spiritual, and they are either babes in Christ or they have grown to be mature Christians. Using the human example of a baby needing milk, so the new Christian needs "milk", which is basic Bible doctrine. Through a steady diet of Bible doctrine, the Christian grows

through adolescence and on to adult maturity. Thus spiritual growth is progressive, and it has nothing to do with the physical age of the Christian. Just as a baby cannot handle complex theological doctrine (Hebrews 5:12-14).

But spirituality and carnality are not progressive. Any Christian, regardless of spiritual development, is either spiritual or carnal at any given moment! A new Christian can be spiritual or carnal at any hour of the day, just as can a mature, adult Christian. In the context of the Scripture quoted above, "spiritual" simply means that the Christian's mind is controlled by the Holy Spirit and is producing the "fruit" of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23); carnal simply means that his mind is controlled by his old sin nature and is producing human good and personal sin. The next study will deal with how to be spiritual and how to be

"But I say, walk by the spirit, and you will not carry out the desire of the flesh. For the flesh sets its desire against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; for these are in opposition to one another, so that you may not do the things that you please" (Galatians 5:16-17). The Apostle Paul is speaking of the internal conflict which every Christian has; whether his mind will be controlled by the Holy Spirit, or by his old sin nature. (I say "mind" here since everything we do proceeds from a mental attitude). Our sin nature produces the mental attitudes produced when the Holy Spirit controls our mind; "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, selfcontrol,,," (Galatians 5:22-23). When we are controlled by the sin nature, we are "carnal" or fleshly; when we are controlled by the Holy Spirit, we are "spiritual." Now, at any given moment of time we are either 100% carnal, or we are 100% spiritual. So, how do we become carnal? It is easy; if we just wait awhile, we will think a sin. At that point the Holy Spirit is "grieved" or "quenched", and we are carnal. I John 1:9 tells us how to be spiritual; "if we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." "Confess" means to name

specifically. Notice that the verse is in two parts; if we name the sins we remember, He forgives those, and then forgives all we don't remember. God too makes it easy for us to be spiritual. Since carnality comes natural, God makes confession of sin the only requisite to being spiritual, and that is an example of the grace of





Old Army Days

Not in the too distant past, this Cavalry unit reminded the new group of settlers to Fort Clark, of days past. This photo taken in 1979, during the weekend of Fort Clark Days, during the month of July, was taken of Company K, 4th U.S. Regiment of Cavalry (memorial), from Val Verde County, Texas. Two of the members in the photo still reside at Fort Clark Springs. A third member who still resides at Fort Clark Springs, had already put his horse away, when the photo was

This group of dedicated cavalry troops were in reality civilians and active duty Air Force By: Wallace L. Morgan personnel. Also included were

three female personnel. Females never served on active duty with the U.S. Army horse cavalry. However, should there be a horse cavalry in the U.S. Army now. there would be the possibility that females would be included. One of the young ladies pictured above, Lance Corporal Mary Hatfield, was and is noe of the better riders then and today. Staff Sergeant Hatfield, USAF, was the guideon bearer for the unit, and did an outstanding job. Raising and lowering the company or troop flag (guideon) while riding a horse during a gallop in the correct manner, and twirling it when the need arose, takes a lot of riding skill and coordination. In addition, when riding thru the sabre targets at a full gallop and using the guideon instead of a sabre, takes more skill.

This unit of cavalry put on a number of mounted cavalry demonstrations at Fort Clark Springs during the late 1970's and early 1980's. These demonstrations included drill, sabre targets, mounted pistol and carbine firing at targets, while at a full gallop, mounted attack of an Infantry unit from Laredo, and parades.

Shown in the photo lined up on the South side of the Fort Clark stables, with the old commissary building in the backgound, are from left to right; Capt. Wallace L. Morgan, Lance Corporal Mary Hatfield, Lance Corporal Bobby Hatfield, Trooper Andy Roundtree, Sergeant Bob Lane, Trooper Brenda Mystka, Trooper William Warrior, Trooper Ed Mystka, Trooper Dale Larson, Trooper Cathy Larson, Trooper Chester Puda, Lance Corporal Bruce Clemments, and trooper Lyn Crim. There were approximately eighteen members of the unit at this time, and at the height of membership there were twenty six members.

Unfortunatly all good things do come to a conclusion or end, and about 1982 there not enough members till active to be able to continue. This unit is registered with the State of Texas as a non-profit organization (Val Verde Cavalry Association), and who knows, perhaps some day it will be revived. The company standard remains with the Commander, W. L. Morgan. Incidently, this unit was Company K, not troop K. The reason being that this unit portrayed a unit of cavalry during the era that the term Troop had not yet replaced the term Company, in Cavalry organization.






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

A Brighter Outlook for South Texas

by Bernard Weinstein and Harold Gross

For five years, the South Texas economy reeled from collapsing investment, rising unemployment, and capacity reductions at petrochemical and manufacturing plants. Per capita income fell from three percent above the national average to 11 percent below. After years of growth, there was a deep sense of frustration at such a turn of events. Today, frustration has turned to hope, as a broad based recovery is underway, and there's an upbeat outlook for growth in the 1990's. Those feelings are justified for a number of reasons:

> * The Port of Corpus Christi is the deepest on the Gulf of Mexico and is the sixth busiest in the nation. Since 1987, the volume of freight passing through the port has increased from 60 tons per year to more than 70 tons per year, and further gains are expected. The Port of Corpus Christi is now a multi-modal facility, and because the port incorporates a foreign trade zone--one of nine in South Texas, the area has attracted 15 new businesses.

* The Enterprise Zone in Victoria has just landed a new 186,000 sq ft plastics manufacturing facility. This \$7 million state-of-the-art plant will soon employ more than 300 people. Enterprise zones across South Texas are witnessing similar growth.

* Over the past two years, horizontal drilling has created thousands of jobs in the South Texas oil patch, with oil and gas production up 680 and 238 percent respectively. Four hundred additional wells are scheduled to be drilled in 39 South Texas counties during the next several months. In addition, the petrochemical industry has launched more than \$660 million of plant expansions in South Texas since June.

* The Rio Grand Valley area is the fastest growing area of Texas, with annual regional growth of about four percent, well above the national average of two and one-half percent. Manufacturing is strong in South Texas and during the last year over 62,000 manufacturing jobs in diversified industries have been created in Texas. Since each 100 manufacturing jobs spinoff 64 new non-manufacturing jobs, the economic growth is apparent.

* Expansion of the "Maquiladora" plants in the lower Rio Grand Valley, the US Navy "homeport" in Ingleside, and the opening of the Texas into economic recovery. The Texas State Aquarium, in Corpus Christi is bringing more than 400 jobs and \$25 million to the area economy.

Recent events in the Middle East are also improving the economic prospects for South Texas. Higher world oil prices will stimulate natural gas production as businesses and homes across the nation change their fuel use patterns. The South Texas region has natural gas in abundance and stands to realize a substantial windfall. For example, in a recent study we determined that \$25 oil would push natural gas production up 20 percent by 1993.

Local chambers of commerce and port authorities deserve praise for their aggressive industrial development programs -even in the face of economic adversity. Central Power and Light Company should also receive high marks for its work promoting industrial partnerships and working closely with communities to bring in new jobs.

Speaking of CPL, an ample supply of electricity at reasonable cost is important to business and industrial development. The addition of the south Texas Nuclear Plant gives the region enough generating capacity for new industrial plants and expansions well into the 21st century, while other parts of the nation are facing power shortages.

South Texas also enjoys a significant electric power price advantage compared to most regions. Rates average two to three times more in New York, California, and Illinois. Regional rates also are competitive with other of Texas and surrounding states. This price advantage should widen.

Many coal-burning utilities are facing rising costs when Congress enacts acid rain legislation, and some regions are paying a premium for oil to generate electric power. What's more, South Texas now relies on a diversity of clean fuels - nuclear, natural gas, and clean coal, which will save billions of dollars in fuel costs and help clean the environment

As we look back on the previous decade, the severe

regional economic downturn may have been a blessing in disguise, because hard times brought the region to concerted action. We are seeing exceptional leadership to make the economy even broader-based. Finally, the prospects of higher prices, and, of course, an ample, competitive power supply base, gives South Texas the economic drawing power it needs. Indeed, we are much more confident of a stronger economy in the years to dome.



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
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
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In 1913 a nationwide furor was created by the secretary of the Society for the Suppression of vice, on an unemployed press agent, over his painting of a young girl about to skinny dip.

The painting "September Morn", by Paul Chabos was unveiled in the Paris Salon of 1912. When reproductions went on sale the next year in 1913, in New York, things began to happen. One copy appeared in an art store window on West 46th Street. It was brought to the attention of Anthony Comstock, the Secretary of the Society for the Suppression of Vice. He was widely known as the enemy of gamblers, brothel owners and other evil doers. Comstock claimed to have destroyed 160 tons of obscene literature and he was noted for his furious raids.

You couldn't miss seeing him as he was five foot ten, weighed 210 pounds and was always dressed in a black frock coat, with a Bible in his pocket. He always wore mutton-chop whiskers, and with blazing eyes.

He walked into the 46th Street shop and ordered the painting "September Morn" taken

When the owner of the art shop came back from lunch, he put the painting back and the battle was on.

Meanwhile, a Hollywood press agent had spotted the picture in the art shop and talked the owner into helping him pull a stunt, which would help the art shop owner get rid of his prints he was trying to sell for 10 cents.

But Comstock didn't bite until Reichenbach went to his office and took Comstock to see the paintings the press agent had hired a group of little newsboys to make fun of the picture.

When the press agent and Comstock arrived, he got the New York Times to run a protesting headline: "COMSTOCK DOOMS SEPTEMBER MORN." The headline caused a big sale of prints, calendars, cigarbands, candy boxes, all with nude paintings on them. Sailors had her tattoed on their chests.

OVERHEATED CLOTHES CAN CAUSE FIRES!!

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety commission estimates that approximately 14,000 clothes-dryer-related fires occur when lint builds up in the filter or the exhaust duct. Under certain conditions, when lint blocks the flow of air, excessive heat build-up may cause a fire in some dryers. To prevent fires:

* Clean the lint filter regularly and make sure the dryer is operating properly. Clean the filter after each load of clothes. while the dryer is operating, check the outside exhaust to make sure exhaust air is escaping normally. If it is not, look inside both ends of the duct and remove any lint. If there are signs that the dryer's temperature control thermostat needs servicing.

* Check the exhaust duct more often if you have a plastic, flexible duct. This type of duct is more apt to trap lint than ducting without ridges.

* Closely follow manufactures' instructions for new installations. Most manufacturers that get their clothes dryers approved by Underwriters Laboratories specify the use of metal exhaust duct. If metal duct is not available at the retailer, check other places such as hardware or builder supply stores. If you are having the dryer installed, insist upon metal duct unless the installer has verified that the manufacturer permits the use of plastic duct.

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


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
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
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

The natural Christmas tree shape of Norfolk Island Pines make these tropical trees ideal for decorating. Be gentle when you attach ornaments that are heavy.


