


Senior Citizens' Center Progressing Slowly

The meeting was called to order with all members present except Commissioner Joe Garza.

A progress report was given on the water crossing on the Tularosa Road. It was decided to complete the third crossing that was already in progress. This will

make three low water crossings that have been put in by the County.

A Job Supervisor was hired to supervise the construction of the Senior Citizens' Center. The Supervisor that the Court hired is Dan Woods of Fort Clark Springs. Mr. Woods is a retired building inspector and is quite versed on the construction business. He will be a great help to the New Judge, Tim Ward since his time will mostly be used for awhile settling in and taking care

of County business at hand.

The only bid that was accepted for the Senior Citizens' Center was for outside doors and windows for \$6,000.00 from Herb's Glass in Uvalde.

A discussion was held on future court agendas. It was decided that the court would like a report at the beginning of each monthly meeting, of all supervisors and office holders.

Kinney County Public Library Awarded Grant

Back in July, the Library applied for a matching grant from Carnegie Corporation of New York for twenty six educational videos for children. At the time, they were told that only two hundred and fifty Libraries would be awarded the grant.

We are happy to announce that our Library was one of the lucky two hundred and fifty to be awarded this grant out of over twelve hundred applications.

Mrs. Mitchell states that she received support letters from the Mayor of Brackettville and the County Judge as well as the President of the Library Advisory Board for this project. These videos will be available for showing in the home from the Library without cost to the patrons. They include such titles as: The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman, Bonnie Consolo, Chicken Thing, The Electric Grandmother and many more.

All these videos have received numerous awards of excellence and would be most useful for Parents as well as Teachers.

Mrs. Mitchell states that

this collection will do much to improve the quality and quantity of educational information which can be provided to our youth by our local Library.



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



The Fire Department has regular training days two times per month. This training is very important. It teaches the men to be better fire fighters and helps keep them safe while they are


protecting your lives and property.





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Are You At Risk For HIV Infection?

The Centers For Disease Control (CDC) recently launched a new phase of its "America Responds to AIDS" public information campaign, responding to research showing many people don't believe AIDS warnings apply to them.

CDC estimates about one million Americans are HIV infected, but most do not know it, and that about 44 to 50,000 people may have become infected in 1989. Although gay men and minority populations have been affected disproportionately, the epidemic respects no boundaries. Anyone can become infected if he or she engages in behaviors that put him or her at risk. Heterosexual transmission currently accounts for only five percent of AIDS cases, but the number of reported AIDS cases attributable to heterosexual transmission grew 36 percent between 1988 and 1989.

The new campaign phase, "Preventing HIV Infection and AIDS: Taking the Next Steps" asks people to assess their chances of being infected. A new brochure, "HIV Infection: Are You At Risk?," lists risk factors.

A good place to start saving precious energy is in the laundry room. The most expensive and energy guzzling step in doing the laundry is heating the water. 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


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

Steve Clementz, Rogelio Herrera, and Scott Sims earned spots on the elite squad. All three were also first team all-district selections.

Senior running back Steve Clementz finished his last season as the all-time leading rusher at Brackett High School with 1,261 yards. He also scored a total of 86 points, including twelve touchdowns and seven two-point conversions.

Rogelio Herrera also played his last year as a senior. The 6'4, 275 pound tackle anchored the Tigers offensive line. Scott Sims was the only Brackett junior making the All-Southwest Texas team. He

PRUNING!

Fruit trees, especially peach trees, should be pruned as late in the dormant season as possible.

Early pruning, before total dormancy, subjects the trees to bacterial canker and could lead to a complex called peach tree short-life. When bacterial canker and short-life occur, trees die shortly after blooming in the spring. Just because the trees have lost their leaves, does not necessarily mean the tree is dormant. During warm falls, such as the one in 1990, complete dormancy may be delayed. By waiting as long into the dormancy season as possible to prune, injury sites are exposed less time to insects and disease before healing begins. In our area, middle to late January should be ample time to insure complete dormancy. Three to






