

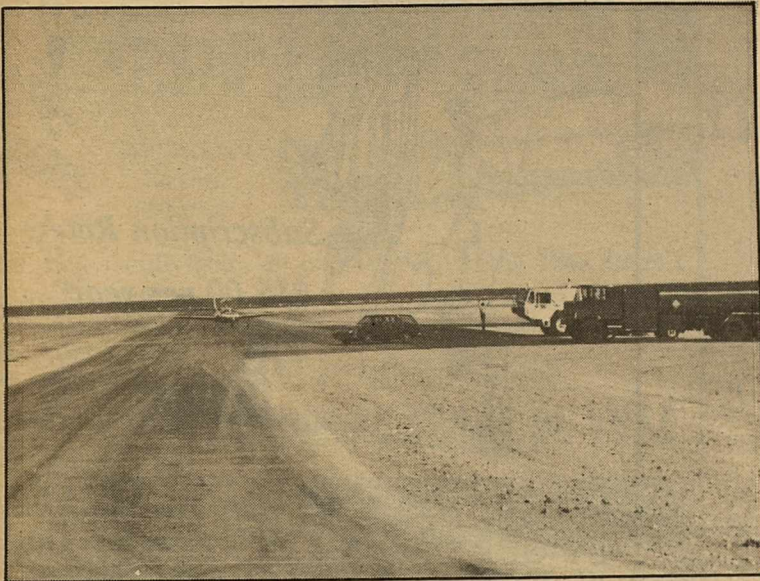

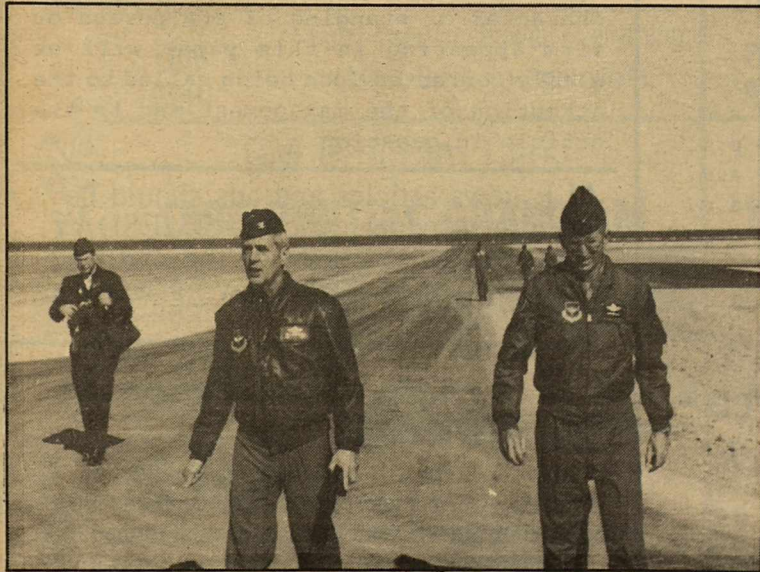

New Air Force Auxiliary Field Holds Opening Ceremony

Flying training students will go "off to see the Wizard" beginning this month--but not in the Land of Oz. This "Wizard" is near Spofford, Texas.

"Wizard" is the call sign for the new T-37 auxiliary field located about five miles west of Spofford. Student pilots in the T-37 phase will practice "traffic pattern work" including approaches, takeoffs and landings in an area with far less air traffic than Laughlin Air Force Base own runways. The T-37 "TWEET" is the primary trainer aircraft that Laughlin student pilots begin with.

"We did traffic pattern work of this type at an airfield in Eagle Pass, Texas", said Lt. Col. Bill Poindexter, Chief of the Operations Division at Laughlin Air Force Base. "We can now accomplish the same kind of training at a lower operating cost. The students don't have to fly as far and we own the airfield".

"The new "Wizard" facility helps solve some problems" said Col. Willard Grosvenor, Laughlin Air Force Base Commander, "Rather than leasing the airfield, as we were in Eagle Pass, this facility belongs to the Air Force. Also, there was a meat packing plant near the Eagle Pass airfield which attracted birds and posed a significant birdstrike hazard. With the new facility, we have moved a high density air traffic pattern to an area where the birdstrike risk is reduced.

A short opening ceremony at the new facility was held at 2:00

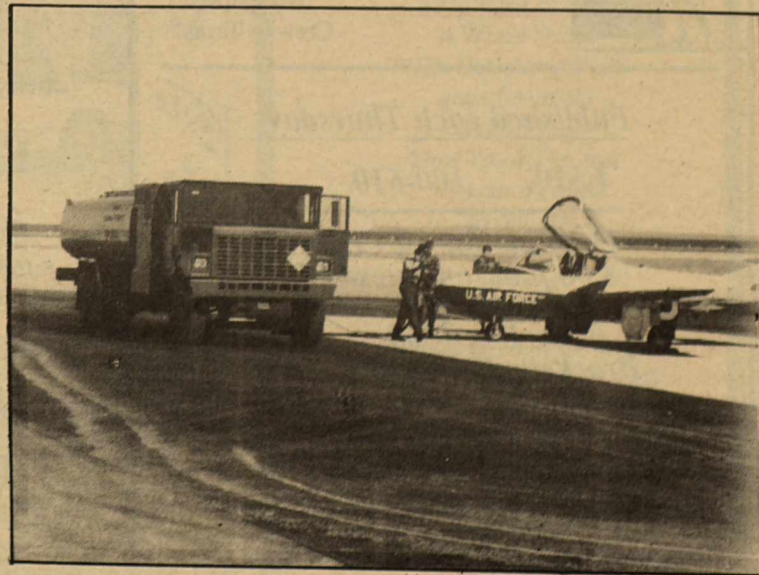

p.m., Tuesday. Civic leaders, including the Kinney County Judge of Brackettville, Texas and the Chairman of Del Rio Military affairs Association attended. Col. Danny Parnell, Air Training Command DOP from Randolph

Air Force Base was the first to land a Laughlin T-37 on the runway. After the landing, Colonel Grosvenor cut the ribbon, officially opening the field.

Flying operations at "Wizard" begin later this month.

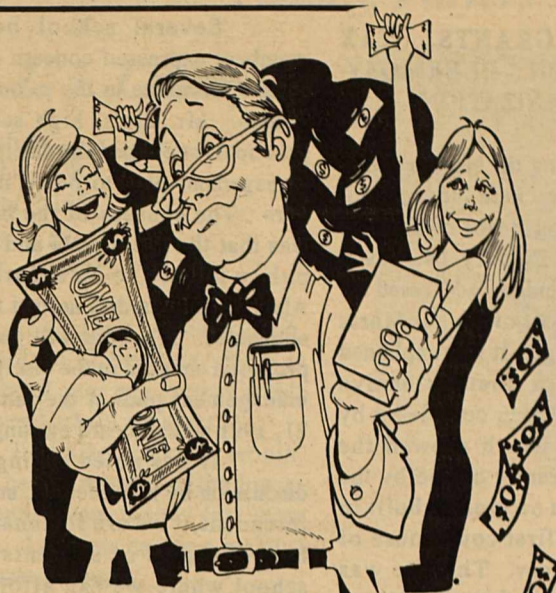

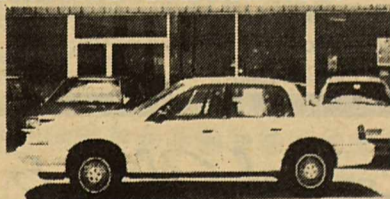

School News

BOARD APPROVES VOLUNTARY DRUG TESTING PROGRAM

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees gave tentative approval for a Drug Testing Program to be implemented at the Brackett Independent school District for the 1991-91 school year. Administration was given instructions to develop specific guideline for the voluntary program and present it to the Board at a later date.

SCHOOL BOARD TO MEET JANUARY 21, 1991 TO CONSIDER BUILDING ADDITIONAL CLASSROOMS

The Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees agreed to meet Monday, January 21, 1991, during a special meeting to discuss plans for additional classrooms. It was brought to the Board's attention by Mr. McCall and Mr. Mills about possible classroom needs for the 1991-92 school year. Projections for the 1991-92 school year for Jones Elementary include three sections of grades Kindergarten through second grade.

BOARD GRANTS TAX EXEMPTION ELEEMOSYNARY ORGANIZATION

During the regular meeting of the Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees on Monday, January 14, 1991, Mr. Bruce Clements addressed the Board on Behalf of the Las Moras Masonic Lodge. It was explained to the Board that extensive research had been completed by the Masons which showed the building currently owned by the organization originally built in 1879 as the first courthouse of Kinney County. The site was recently recognized by the State of Texas as a historical site.

The Board of Trustees unanimously agreed to exempt the Las Moras Masonic Lodge from school property taxes. The exemption was approved due to two circumstances; (1) the building is designated as a Texas Historical site, and (2) the Las Moras Masonic Lodge functions as a eleemosynary institution that donates all proceeds to charitable works.

SCHOOL BOARD EXPRESSES CONCERN OVER LACK OF DISCIPLINE

Several school board members expressed concern over student discipline in the secondary grades. Mr. Sims, high school principal, explained the discipline management plan to board members. The concern of the board was that the dress code and hair policy needed to be enforced. Also, student tardies needed to be eliminated. Mr. Sims will present proposed changes in the discipline management plan at the January 21, 1991 special board meeting.

It was noted during the discussion by Bob McCall, superintendent, "We are fortunate to have the kind of students and school where we can afford to worry about hair length and tardies. Ideally, we want students to dress as if they were going to work. Tardies and absences are a concern because employees won't tolerate absenteeism in the work place." McCall also noted that the persistent problems remained with a very small percentage of students.

Administrators Cook For Staff

The Brackett I.S.D. administrators cooked breakfast for all the Brackett I.S.D. teachers and staff Thursday, January 17. Thursday was a work day on the school calendar where students were not in attendance. Teachers were in attendance all Thursday to complete semester work.

The administrators furnished and cooked ham and pancakes for the staff. It was served in the school cafeteria. The breakfast was a way of saying "THANK YOU" to the teachers and staff for a job well-done.

Del Rio Chamber Banquet

The Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet is scheduled for Thursday, January 24, 1991, at the Del Rio Civic Center. The evening will begin with a social hour at 7:00 p.m. and dinner immediately thereafter. Lt. General Joseph W. Ashy, Commander, Air Training Command, Randolph Air Force Base, will be the guest speaker.

As always, Del Rio's incomparable H.W. "Pete" Monzingo will emcee the evening. Out-going Chamber President, Russ Moreland, will be honored and the 1991 President, John Watts, his officers, directors and committee chairmen will be introduced. The Chamber's Red Carpet Committee Ambassadors of

New Local Representative

AUSTIN - Alpine attorney Pete P. Gallego took the oath of office as the new state representative for District 68 Tuesday, becoming the first Hispanic to represent the seven-county southwest Texas district in the state House of Representatives.

Rep. Gallego, a democrat, was one of the 30 new members of the House of Representatives sworn in during a two-hour ceremony in the crowded chamber. Lawmakers of the 72nd Legislature will meet in Austin for a 140-day session which officially ends May 27.

"I'm honored to represent the 68th District. District 68 is particularly challenging, not only because its size, but also because of its diverse needs and characteristics," Rep. Gallego said. "I'm working aggressively for the people of the district and will continue to do so for the next two

years."

Rep. Gallego is in the process of opening two district offices. District 68 covers the largest area of any House of Representatives district. From Eagle Pass to Presidio, the district includes almost 45 percent of the Texas-Mexico border.

In Del Rio, Miri Sotelo will staff Rep. Gallego's third floor office in the Vale Verde County Courthouse on Pecan Street. Janice Harvey will run the alpine office, 1110 E. Holland, (915) 837-7383, serving the western portion of the district.

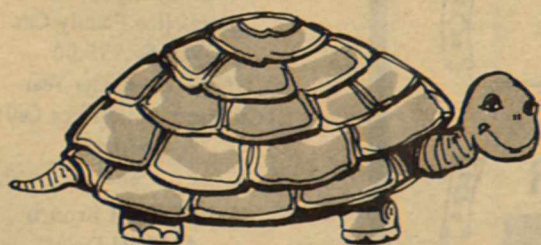

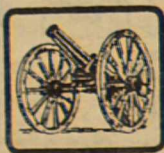

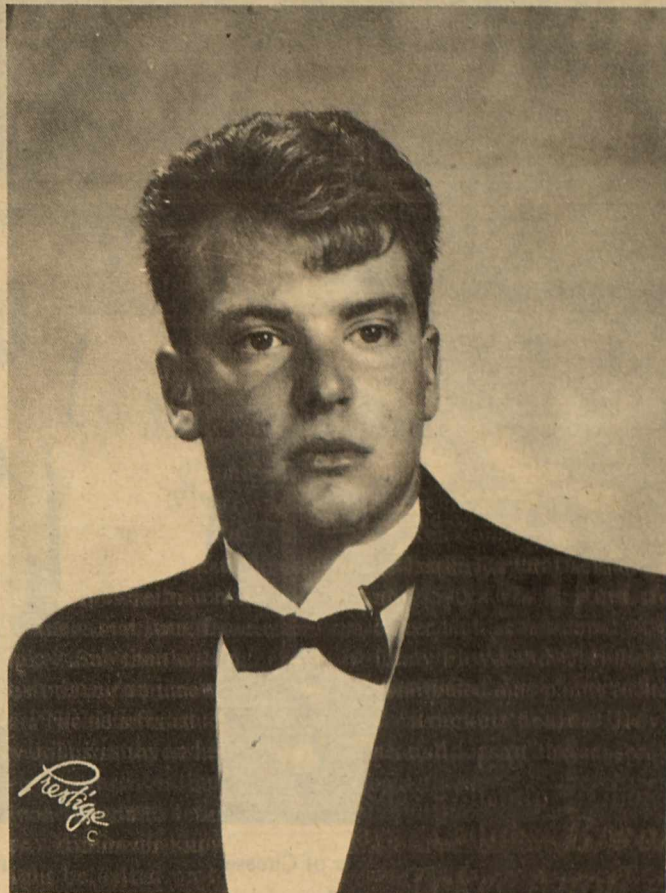

The Brackett Tigerettes took another step in the right direction towards the playoffs as they picked up their fourth district win as they defeated Dilley 51-34.

Theresa Terrazas led Brackett with a career high 25 points. Wendy McDaniel also scored in double-figures with 12 points. Terrazas sank a total of five three-pointers to tie the school record for most three-pointers in a game. The record is now shared by Terrazas and Sheri White.

"We had a slow first half, but

the fourth quarter was the best we've had this year," said Tigerette coach Gregg Nowlin. "We scored more points in the final period than we did the previous three quarters," concluded Nowlin.

The Tigerettes are now 4-1 for the year. They will host Natalia this Friday at "The Jungle." The Junior Varsity Tigers will face Eagle Pass at 5 p.m., then the Tigerettes will take the court at 6:30. The Tigers will follow against the Mustangs at 8 p.m.

Patrick Negrete Joins U.S. Coast Guard

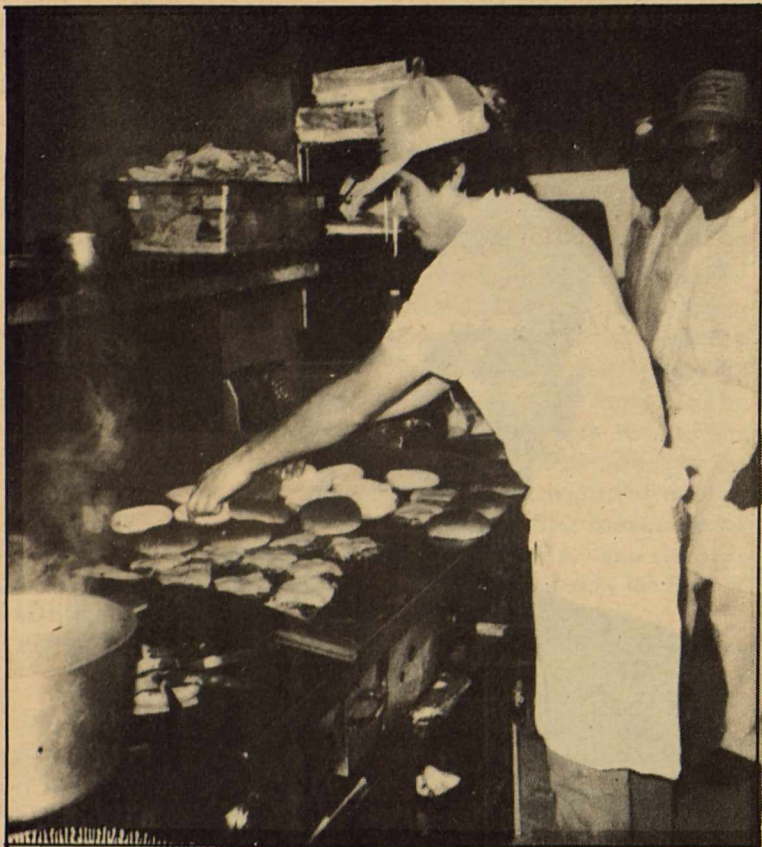

City Council Meeting

The regular City Council meeting was held on Monday, January 14, 1991 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall. A Quorum was present. Mayor Moore called the meeting to order and welcomed all the visitors.

The minutes of the regular and special council meetings and the City and Utility department financial and operational reports were presented and approved.

Mr. Ron Barbutti representative from Groves and Associates, Inc. from San Antonio presented to the Council architectural drawings of the planned replacement swimming pool at the County Park being done by the City on grant funds. The swimming pool that will replace the old County pool is smaller. It is 42 feet wide and 82 1/2 feet in length. The pool will be 3 1/2 feet deep on each end and 5 1/2 feet deep in the center. There will be a gravel bed around and under the pool for a drain field. The plans were accepted by all the Councilmembers. The City will now go out for bids for the construction of the pool.

Representatives from the Las Moras Masonic Lodge, Mr. Tom Fulkenberry and Mr. Richard Schafer were present at the Council meeting. The Las Moras Masonic Lodge had ask the City to exempt this historical building from City tax. The Las Moras Masonic lodge is a Texas historical site. Council approved the request.

The City and M.U.D. agreement was presented to the Council. The total cost would be split by each and any future changes are allowable. The agreement would be renewable each year. City Council approved the agreement.

Martin Luther King holiday which occurs on January 21, 1991 was discussed by the Council. Council agreed that City Hall would honor the holiday by closing City Hall.

Council approved putting all City employees on Blue Cross/Blue Shield Insurance.

The City Council went into executive session to discuss personnel policy and personnel review. The Council came out in open session and set a special meeting for Monday, January 28th.

Commissioners Court Meeting

The County Commissioners' Court met on January 14, 1991 with all members of the Court present.

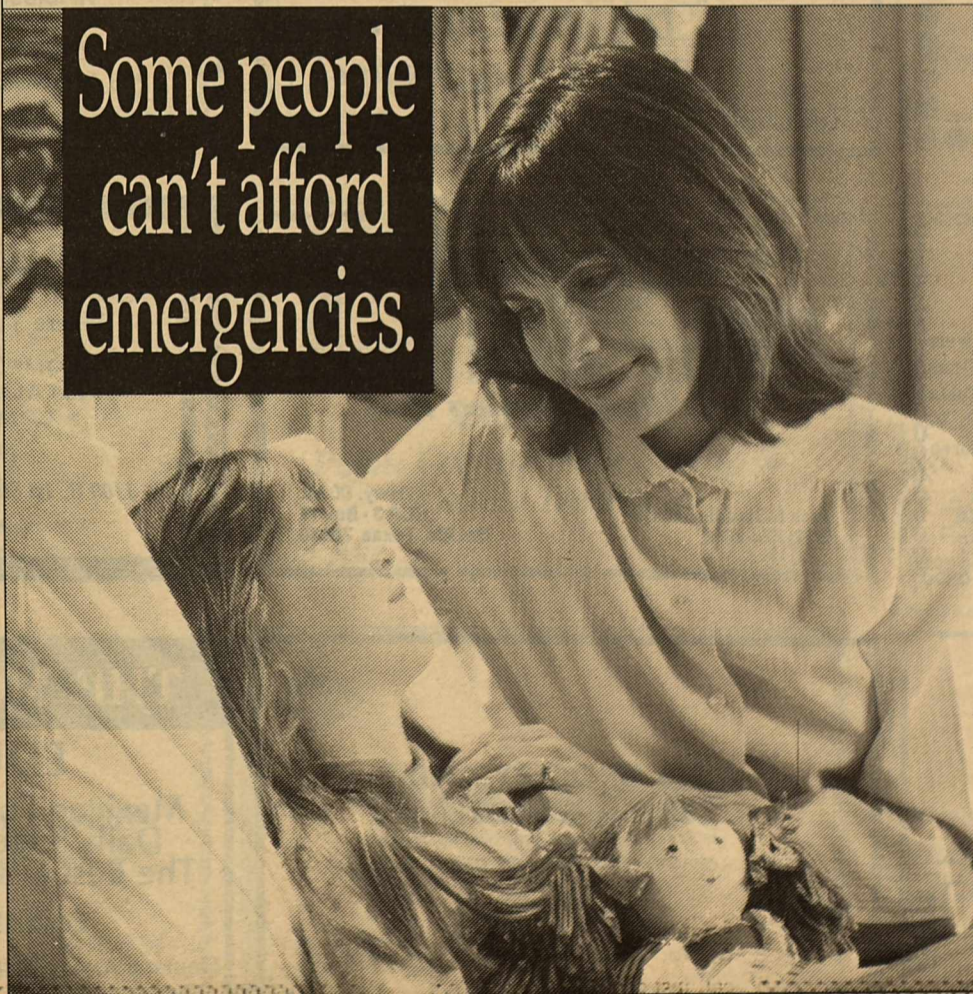





Applications for Emergency Farm Loans Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought and excessive heat during 1990 crop year occurring between January 1, 1990 and October 1, 1990 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Uvalde, FmHA County Supervisor Edmund L. Persyn, Jr. said today.

Uvalde County was one of nineteen in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought and excessive heat during 1990 crop year occurring between January 1, 1990 and October 1, 1990. Edwards, Kinney and Real Counties were named contiguous counties and farmers in those counties may also be eligible for disaster loans.

Persyn said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$5000,000 whichever is less. For Farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Persyn said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 26, 1991 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the

new farming season," Persyn said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Uvalde is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

AUSTIN - The leadership of the Texas Senate will change hands Tuesday, January 15, for the first time in 18 years as former State Comptroller Bob Bullock succeeds William P. Hobby as Lieutenant Governor during ceremonies at the Capitol.

Bullock and Governor-elect Ann Richards will be sworn in at noon Tuesday. Hobby, who did not seek re-election, has served in the post since 1973.

Five new senators were sworn in last week during ceremonies in the Senate Chamber. 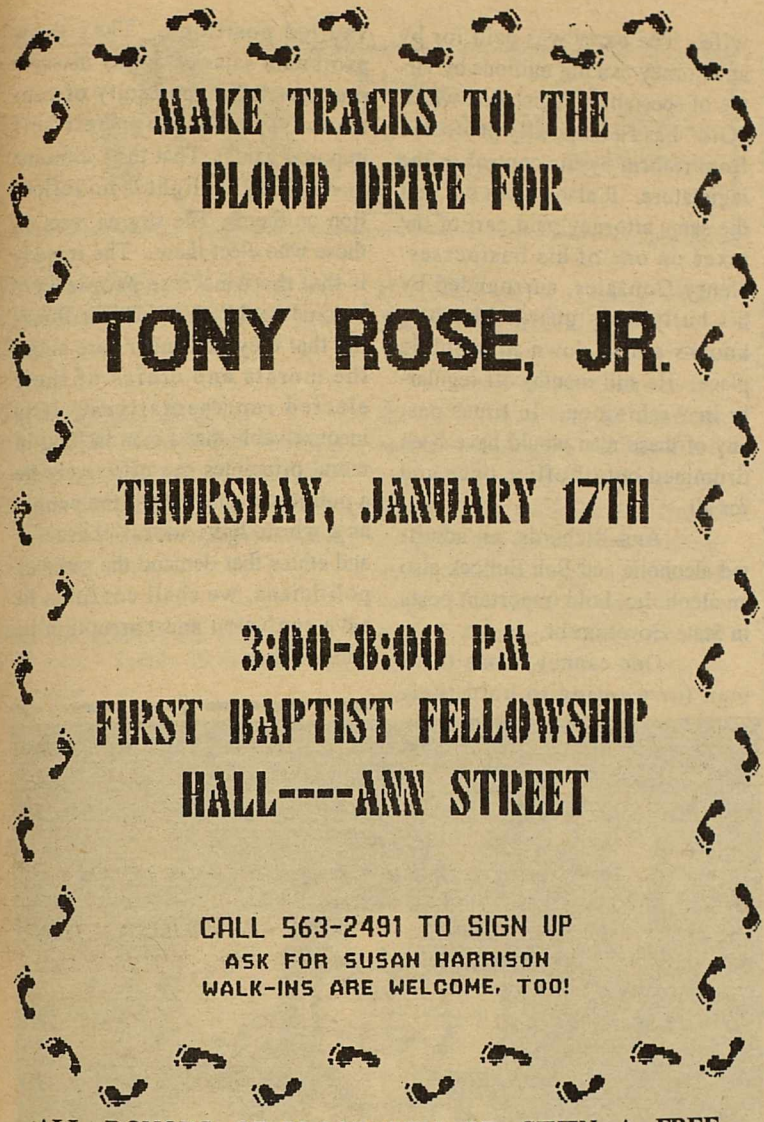

Landowners

Bills designed to help rural landowners in their struggle against the illegal use of their property have been prepared by Riverside & Landowners Protection Coalition, Inc., for filing in the current session of the Texas Legislature.

Purpose of the bills, upon enactment into law, is to reduce or eliminate some of the harassment and damage rural landowners suffer from river and land recreationists.

One proposal would prohibit hunting and discharging of firearms on public waters or riverbeds except when legally hunting waterfowl.

Another would permit Game Wardens to inspect vessels and other devices for wildlife resources the same as vehicles and game bags.

The Coalition also seeks to amend "Places Weapons Prohibited" in the Texas Penal Code by adding private property without effective consent of the property owner to enter with a weapon.

Another proposal would amend the Criminal Trespass law to clarify where privately-owned property adjoining a navigable river ends and the public land (the riverbed) begins, the gradient boundary line.

Arthur Nagel, president of the Coalition says any "Texas Rivers Protection" bill introduced will be opposed again by the Coalition until effective safeguards are built in to prohibit entry onto and use of privately-owned property abutting navigable rivers unless invited in by the landowner.

Rural property is not fenced at riverside. Nagel added since fences are not next to rivers too many river users believe they can leave the state water of navigable rivers and use the land for

picnicking, exploring, engaging in target practice and disposal of trash. Navigable rivers are those rivers averaging 30 feet in width from the mouth up. The riverbed is state property held in trust for the public. The Coalition works to educate the public the abutting land is privately owned, fence or no, and that the offense of Criminal Trespass can result from entry without an invitation to do so.

Bill stand a better chance of passage when persons helped by them make their desires known to the legislature. Your representative and senator needs those calls, letters and cards. And so do the legislators hearing and voting on bills in committees prior to their reaching the floor.

Nagel concluded by saying rural folks need to speak up on their problems. The days of remaining silent and hoping someone will do something are past, gone, no longer exist. The Coalition is speaking for rural folks on their problems. But support from property owners is very essential in the decision process at Austin.

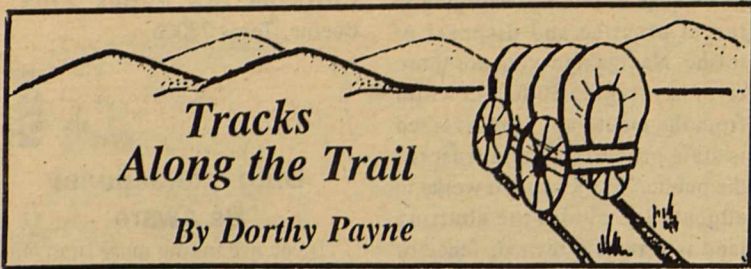

The French explorers Pierre and Paul Mallet came to New Orleans with salted meat to sell. The Governor, Jean Baptiste Le Moyne, Sieur de Bienville, asked them to guide on an expedition under Andre Fabrey to find a route from the mouth of the Mississippi to the mines of New Mexico.

This venture was a failure, partly because of the drought which made the rivers too low for travel. To top that off the Mallet brothers were lost and were never heard of again.

Meanwhile in the far north the Danish explorer Vitus Bering lead a second Russian expedition to explore the coast of North America. But the first Europeans to discover Alaskan land are actually Aleksei Chirikov and some of his crew from the Saint Paul who, on the 15th of July sighted Prince of Wales Island in the Alexander Archipelago. The next day Bering and his ship, the Saint Peter, discovered Kayak Island.

Soon afterward the Danish explorer and his ship the Saint Peter was wrecked on one of the Commander Islands.

Bering died and was buried on December 8, 1741 on the Island along with members of his crew. The survivors built a new ship and managed to make their way back to Kamcharka. There they told tales of the rich prospects for fur trade in the area. These tales aroused a new interest in finding a northwest passage among the English, French and Spanish.

Among other expeditions were several made by the Frenchman Pierre de la Verendrye in the Rocky Mountains. When he reached Pierre, South Dakota, he buried lead plates on March 30,

1743 to prove he had been there. The plates lay buried there until February 16, 1913 when local school children discovered them after 170 years.

Between Us By: Joe Townsend

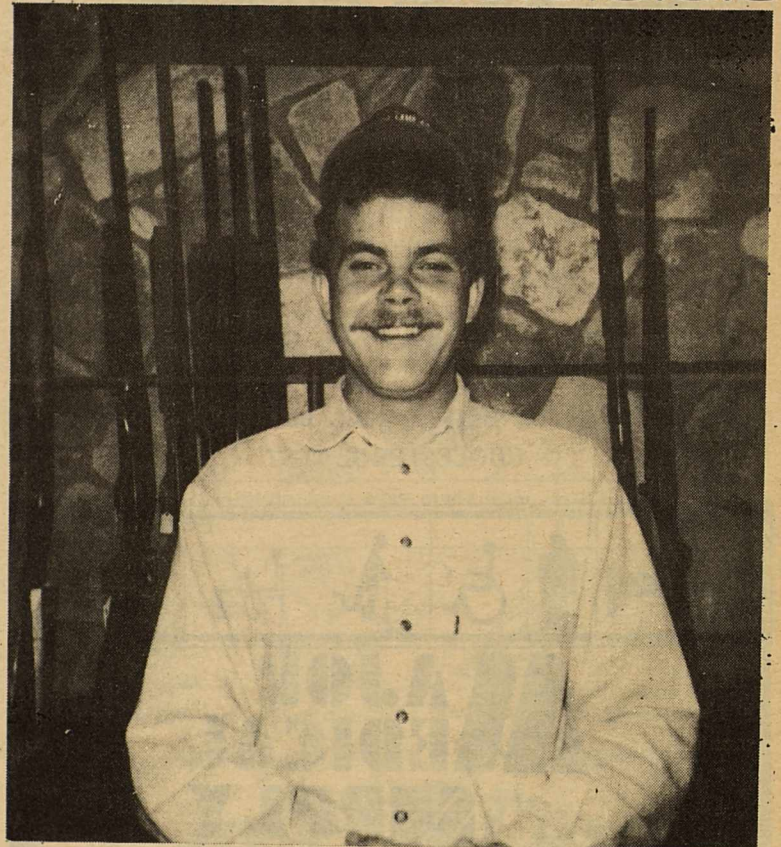

"And I say this is no time to be calling around for estimates!"

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Commissioners Court of Kinney County declare it's unanimous opposition to the approval by the Texas Water Commission of a wastewater discharge permit for the proposed Texcor facility.
