


Memorial Edition dedicated to J. George Loos, Jr.

This special issue of the Kinney Cavalryman is dedicated to Cavalryman's original owner, J. George Loos, Jr., a special man. As the paper reaches another milestone in its history, its change from tabloid size to a regular size newspaper, it is appropriate that this issue be dedicated to him.

George and his late wife, Judy, started this paper in 1974. They had moved from San Antonio

to Brackettville in 1972. This community "grew" on them and they fell in love with the people and the community. George wanted to help Brackettville grow and prosper. The town needed a means of communication. So, George started "The Kinney Cavalryman.

Both George and Judy loved the paper. It was a joint family project. They owned the Cavalryman for thirteen years until cancer took Judy from us and George became ill and was unable to handle it.

J. George Loos, Jr., was a graduate of Texas Military Institute (T.M.I.) in San Antonio, Texas. His had a degree in Political science. He served in the United States Army from 1954 to 1958. He was also a long-time Ham operator.

George's talents were many. George wrote some wonderful editorials. He even won an award from the Texas Press Association for one of them.

George loved electronics. He could repair practically anything - radios, TV's, satellites and related equipment, you name it. He successfully owned and operated the International Electronics Corporation of San Antonio.

Being a Ham Operator was one of the great love's of George's life. He used it to serve others. George was always on alert, especially when we had a storm or a disaster. He could be counted on to warn and help his community through his radio abili-

In 1980, George came up with the idea of a Tortilla Tossing Contest for the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored Frontier Fair. This unique idea became a tradition, continuing for a number of years. Promotion was George's cup of tea!

One year George ran for Mayor. He didn't win. But this, too, showed his great interest in

and concern for his community. J. George Loos, Jr.'s father was the owner of one of the largest carnivals in the United States. So George, as a young boy, got to travel to many interesting places, and he did so in style. George Loos, Sr. bought and owned President Teddy Roosevelt's plush Pullman Train Car and transported his family in it. J. George, Sr. was a very affluent man. Because of this, George attended the best private schools and even (Forgive me for this, George) attended dancing school.

J. George Loos, Jr. passed away, Monday, February 4th, 1991. He is survived by four daughters: Karen Jaggers and Lori O'Boyle, both of Houston, Texas, Donna Loos of San Antonio and Crystal Sue Loos of Belle, Missouri. He had one grandson, Sean Patrick O'Boyle, 7 yrs. of age, from Houston and a one granddaughter, Lauren Elizabeth Joggers, 7 months, from Houston. He is also survived by a sister, Betty Johnson of San Antonio.

He was laid to rest, February 6, 1991 at the County Cemetery, Brackettville, Texas.




SN Casimiro "Cass" Garza

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Tips for Spring Cleaning

With the arrival of spring comes the arrival of a task that is both dreaded and anticipated at the same time-spring cleaning.

These answers to common concerns will make the job easier, helping get you out of the house and into the sunshine a little quicker:

Q. Mybrass accessories tarnish so quickly after polishing. Any solution?

A. Apply a thin coat of window cleaner with a soft cloth, let dry and rub lightly to polish. Brass will be tarnish-free for months.

Q. How can I dust pleated lampshades easily?

A. A 4-inch paintbrush is great for dusting lampshade pleats, window pane corners, etc.

Q. Dust clings to the miniblinds just as soon as I clean them. Is there any way to prevent this?

A. Wipe mini-blinds or vertical blinds with damp fabric softener sheets to eliminate static that attracts dust. This trick also works well on the TV screen and stereo.

After you have the house clean and shiny, what could be better than relaxing in the sunshine with a pitcher of iced tea and a loaf of refreshing Lemon Tea Bread with Ginger Cream Spread?

This bread will be best if prepared one day and served the next. Bring it out as your reward for a job well done.

Lemon Tea Bread 1/3 cup butter or margarine

¾ cup sugar 2 eggs, lightly beaten 3 teaspoons grated lemon rind

2 cups sifted Martha White Self-Rising Flour 34 cup milk

½ cup chopped walnuts 1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice

tablespoons sugar Heat oven to 350 degrees.

Grease an 8½ × 4½ × 2½-inch loaf pan. Cream together butter and ¾ cup of sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and lemon rind; beat well. Add flour to creamed mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour. Stir in walnuts. Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 55 minutes to 1 hour.

Combine lemon juice and 2 tablespoons sugar. Spoon over hot bread immediately after removing from oven. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Turn out of pan and allow to cool completely on wire rack. NOTE: If using Martha White Plain Flour sift 21/2 teaspoons bak-

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
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SWEET REVENGE

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
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Library News

Buckle Up for Love Sponsored by **EMS**

Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week, sponsored by Texas Department of Health and Kinney Co. EMS, will be observed February 10-16, 1991 with the theme "Buckle Up for Love."

Gene Weatherall, chief of the health department's Bureau of Emergency Management, said that in 1989 more than 700 Texas children died of injuries that could have been prevented. "The good news," Weatherall said, "is that child safety seats prevented 28,000 njuries and about 200 deaths in children four and younger in this country last year."

"Trauma is still the number one killer of children," said Kay Smith local EMS director, " and children are most vulnerable to trauma when they ride in motor vehicles." According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, child safety seats are 71 percent effective in preventing fatalities.

Texas law requires children under age 2 to ride in a safety seat; from age 2 to 4, children may ride in a safety seat or buckled by a safety belt. Everyone in the front seat, no matter what their age, must ride buckled up. Parents who want to borrow a child safety seat can contact the health department's SafeRiders Program at 1-800-252-8255.

"We hope the Buckle Up for Love program will make the residents of Kinney County more aware of the positive aspects of buckling their safety belts," said Kay Smith.

Brackett ISD call for a bond election

on Thursday, January 31, 1991, finance law. the Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees unanimously agreed to call for a bond election to be held on March 23, 1991. The purpose of the election is to seek voter approval for the sale of up to \$1,000,000 in school building bonds.

The bonds will be used to finance a variety of projects. A top priority for the bond issue will be construction of up ten classrooms. These additional rooms are needed to accommodate the limit on elementary class sizes to 22 student and to improve the educational setting for secondary students. Another priority is the construction of a vocational building. The building currently in use for Ag Science was found inadequate during the recent Texas **Education Agency Accreditation** visit. Additional projects include rewiring and refurbishing the Jones Elementary building and general renovation and repair to

existing structures. The Board determined to move forward with the bond election in spite of the unsettled condition of school finance. They reasoned that interest rates are at a five year low and that after April1, 1991 the local district may not have the option of issuing bonds. Also, there is a possibility that the state may assume the bonded

In a special meeting held under the expected new school

WHY DO A BOND ISSUE

Bond issues are never popular because they often mean more taxes. Why then is the Brackett Independent School District seeking a bond election when the economy is in recession and school funding issues are in such disarray in the Texas Legislature? These are legitimate questions that might and should be raised by any taxpayer or concerned citizen. Answers to these questions may be found

1. The District has the legitimate need to build more classroom space and to refurbish a 1957 elementary school building.

2. AAA School Bonds are selling at their lowest rates in at least five

3. Some school funding plans currently before the Texas Legislature have provisions for the assumption of a district's bonded indebtedness by the state.

4. If the state school funding plan (ultimately passed) is favorable to the District, the Brackett Independent School District hopes to fund the bond payments within the indebtedness of local districts existing structure.



A distinctive ring is heard to alert all extension users of an intercom call. Customers must subscribe to the optional service Three-way Calling for ComCallsM to function. 


get much worse.

Coronado was a Spanish conquistador who went looking for gold, but found a new world instead. He was born in 1510 in the old university town of Salamanca, Corondo went to Mexico wit its first viceroy in 1535.

He was a go-getter and married into an influential well-todo family and become governor of Nueva Galicia.

When Gray Marcos appeared from the Zuni area of present day New Mexico with the tales of cities of gold, the viceroy named Coronado to head an expedition to find these cities and conquer these cities.

In early 1540 Coronado set out with two hundred mounted men, a large amount of footsoldiers, one thousand Indian allies and a gigantic pack train. This expedition was to fail in the quest for gold but to be one of the most productive expeditions of all

Coronado traveled along 1554.

Francisco Vasquez De the Sierra Madre to Rio Sonora, then north to the upper Gila and present day Arizona. Here they found the first of the golden cities which proved to be the adobe pueblos of the Zuni Indians.

> From there Coronado sent Garcia Lopez de Cardenas to the northwest to search for riches. Instead of riches Cordenas found the Hopi Indians and the Grand Canyon. Cardenas is credited with being the first white man to see the Grand Canyon.

Meanwhile Coronado marched on to the Rio Grande, where he contacted the Pueblo Indians. He spent the winter there among the Pueblo in 1541. Upon hearing Indian tales of the golden land of Gran Quierra, he marched his men across the present-day Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. He finally gave up and turned back.

By 1542 he went back in Mexico and reported his failure to the viceroy. For awhile Coronado turned to politics and after some years he died in Mexico City in


