LLOYD LEE DAVIS -- Easter is when Jesus rose from the dead.



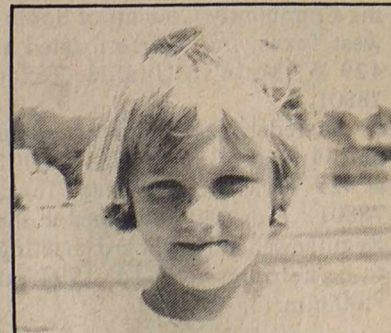
REBECCA PEREZ -- This Sunday I'll get a new Easter basket and then I can meet the Easter Bunny when he comes.

Crazy Chicken Burglarized

City Police Chief, Johnny Fritter responds to emergency call within 19 minutes after receiving report of break-in.

The attempted burglary of the Stop and Shop Drive-In grocery, early Monday morning, was thwarted by the quick action of a Fort Clark security guard and the rapid response of Brackettville Chief of Police, Johnny Fritter.

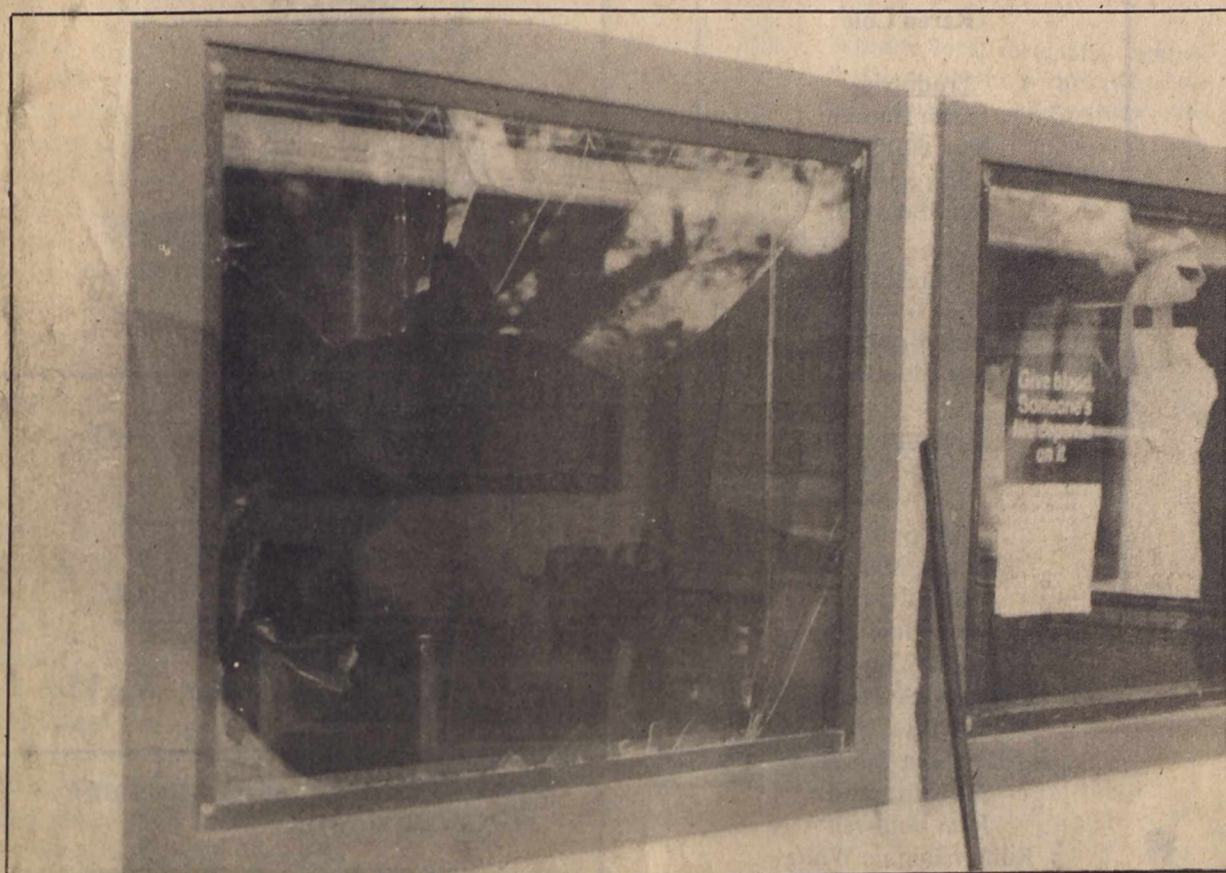
Dan Shi, security guard on the Fort Clark gate, was working the graveyard shift when he noticed someone trying to get into the Stop and Shop shortly after 1:00 A.M. Shi's attention was attracted because the individual was trying to enter through a side entrance that was known to be sealed up. He immediately notified the Sheriff's office, with the primary call being made at 1:20 A.M. According to the dispatcher in the Sheriff's office, a call was placed to John Fritter at 1:21 A.M. A second call at 1:25 A.M. was attempted by the Fort Clark security to the Sheriff's office but it could not be completed due to the line being busy. A third call was made by security to the Sheriff's department at 1:28 A.M. notifying them of the sound of breaking glass coming from the west side of the building. Chief Fritter arrived on the scene at 1:39 A.M. The

total lapsed time from the initial call until the city police responded was 19 minutes.

After a careful inspection of the premises was made by owner, Freddy Frerich, it was assumed the would be burglars attempted the first part of the break-in on the east side of the building. They ripped the screen off a window of the room that housed the ice maker and squeezed in to gain entry. After entering the small room they broke the glass out of a sealed door only to find the entrance behind the large coolers inside the building. The thieves, realizing they could not get into the building from that side, climbed back out the window. From there, they went to the west side of the building where they took a large rock and threw it

through the large window.

The break-in has left many unanswered questions. Why were the culprits not quieter in their attempt to burglarize the building? Why did they not knock out more glass in the window which would have allowed them a larger entry and also eliminated the chance of sustaining bad cuts from the broken glass? Blood spots were obvious around the floor and the

cash register which indicated a wound of some sort had been sustained.

Frerich was contacted Monday morning and asked if he had checked his losses and he replied, "I can't seem to find anything

missing at the present. There possibly could be some cigarettes missing but we have not checked that out as of yet".

The break-in seems to have been very spontaneous, according to official reports, with little or no

planning. Chief Fritter, when contacted, replied, "It was definitely not the work of a professional".

No arrest have been made at the present as the ongoing investigation on the "botched burglary" continues.

Irate Parents Appear Before School Board

A special meeting by the Brackett school trustees was scheduled for Monday evening at six thirty o'clock for the purpose of canvassing the results of the Bond Election. What should have been a routine meeting developed into a very volatile situation after Mr. Vito LaGioia requested his name be placed on the agenda.

After calling the meeting to order promptly at six thirty o'clock in the high school library the Board immediately went into executive session and remained there for four hours. The Board heard concerns and complaints from four sets of parents in regards to a corporal punishment incident concerning members of the coaching staff.

On the morning of March 22, 1991, according to Brackett School Superintendent, Bob McCall, coaches James Day, Rebecca Hubbard, and Kenneth Campbell were involved in an incident which involved corporal punishment being administered in a manner and for reasons that are not consistent with the Brackett Independent School District Policy and the District Discipline Management Plan.

McCall's report continues by stating that students were paddled by both Coach Day and Coach Hubbard for "lack of effort" during the first period junior high physical education program. The punishment was administered in an inappropriate setting (in view of other students rather than out of view of other students). Board Policy (FOB) allows corporal punishment in order to "preserve an effective educational environment, free from disruption."

After an intensive study of the incident, Mr. McCall found the

"lack of effort" in physical education insufficient cause to use corporal punishment. He also did not feel that due consideration was given to the "size, age, and condition of the students, the type of instrument that was used, the amount of force that was used, and the part of the body that was struck."

The Superintendent did not find any of the teachers involved guilty of deliberately trying to do serious physical harm to the students. He did say that he felt as though the teachers demonstrated extremely poor judgment and exhibited unprofessional behavior in this incident.

Mr. McCall has issued the following course of action that should serve as a means to assure concerned citizens that such an incident cannot happen in the Brackett Independent School District again.

1. All staff will receive immediate instruction on the reasons for the use of corporal punishment and the means by which all corporal punishment is to be carried out.

2. All instruments for the administration of corporal punishment will be delivered to the principal's office. No individual employee of the district, other than the principal will possess or display any instrument of corporal punishment.

3. The teachers involved in the incident will receive a written reprimand from the superintendent. The teachers will agree to the specified remedial actions noted in each reprimand. The reprimand will remain in the teachers' personnel file for a period of one year from the date of the incident. After the one year period, if all of the other requirements are met and no other violation of this nature has occurred, the letter will be

removed.

4. Coach Hubbard and Coach Day will be suspended for two days. Coach Campbell will be suspended for one day.

5. Coach Hubbard, Coach Day, and Coach Campbell will serve an additional year of probationary status on their term contracts.

6. Each individual involved will be required to complete 30 hours of in-service training covering the following areas; a. Discipline Management/District Policy/Assertive Discipline Techniques; b. Effective Teacher, Student, Parent Relations; c. Effective Teaching Practices; d. Physical Education Curriculum and Course Design.

7. A letter of apology will be written to the parents of each child involved and an apology will be made to the class.

8. No teacher involved in this incident will administer corporal punishment during their future tenure at Brackett Independent School District.

After the Board reconvened in open session, a motion was made by Diane Bravo to terminate two of the coaches that were involved. The motion died for a lack of a second. Zack Davis then made a motion to approve action taken by the superintendent with the addition of five days suspension for Coach Day. This motion died for lack of a second. Beth Ann Smith moved to accept administrative actions as presented by Superintendent Bob McCall and Jim McDaniel seconded the motion. The motion passed by a vote of 4 for and 3 against.

The Board then moved to the first item of business on the regular agenda, canvassing the results of the bond election. The Board approved the results after reviewing tally sheets by a 7-0 vote.

Sunday morning, preceding the worship service in the First Baptist Church, Reverend Preston Taylor recognized Mrs. J. Lee Ballantyne for her 90th birthday, which was coming up on the following Friday. Reverend Taylor gave a short history on Mrs. Ballantyne and concluded by inviting everyone to a special dinner for her and her friends.

Mrs. Ballantyne's father, Dr. F. M. D. Hill, organized the First Baptist Church in 1921 after he finished his career ministering to the troops on Fort Clark. Dr. Hill, who had been a medical doctor, gave up his very successful career in medicine to devote his life and time on a full time basis to serving God.

It was after the war was over and his work with the troops was winding down that Dr. Hill recognized a need for a church in

Brackettville. Mrs. Ballantyne's first memory of this new Church and the services held by her father were in the County Courthouse.

After awhile, the services were moved to a small Chapel located in the same area as the now present Nutrition Center. Some years later, the Chapel on Fort Clark was put up for sale and with the local Baptist Church being the only one to offer a bid, it was bought and moved to its present location.

Mrs. Ballantyne has watched the Church "her Daddy and Jesus" built together and, through the years, she has accumulated many fond memories of this House of the Lord. For some 30 years she served as the organist for the Church and these memories are very sacred to her.

Visiting in the morning service as guests of Mrs. Ballantyne was Mrs. Elsie Sauer and Mrs. Bess

Mr. McCall, you bring up the district policy concerning corporal punishment. "The incident took place on the track field, but with a professional witness?" If you had a professional there this would not have happened. You can't justify the bruise on my daughter's leg which neither you nor the coaches even saw or checked. You can't justify the bruises on David Broderick which you weren't aware of until his parents showed you the pictures. You also can't justify the other children being hit for not running. You better check your rules again. Our children have rights and if someone violates those rights they can take action. That is why you had concerned parents at the Board meeting to see you.

I did not like or accept your proposal which you had made up before you even talked to the parents or heard what they had to say. That amazes me and offends me. You were concerned in the legal aspect of it for yourself, the School and your coaches. What about our children?? Where was the concern for them?? Your

Parents, do not allow this to happen to your children here or anywhere else.

In 1880, a band of rustlers were operating south of Ft. Davis in the Chinati Mountains where there were no Rangers to keep the peace.

Major John B. Jones ordered Sergeant Seiker to take four men and a guide and ride to the mountains. When Seiker reached Ft. Davis he learned there were four bandits. One of the outlaws was Jesse Evans from New Mexico, who was a ring leader of Billy the Kid's gang. They were robbing stores in broad daylight and no-one would stop them. A heavy reward was offered for their capture.

A colored man named Louis was playing both ends against the middle. He told the Rangers where the desperados hide-out was located. And he told the bandits the Rangers were after them. The outlaws told Louis to warn them if more than four Rangers were coming.

The Rangers rode southwest of Ft. Davis about eighty miles. The Rangers came onto the bandits who were above them on the mountainside. The outlaws fled, firing on the Rangers, who gave chase.

The chase lasted for two miles, when the Rangers found the outlaws holed up in some rocks.

The Rangers charged across the open ground and one was killed. Finally one of the bandits was killed and they came out with their hands up. Only then did the Rangers know their comrade had been killed.

The Rangers, using their Bowie knives dug a grave and buried their friend on the mountain. They tied the bandits to their horses and took them to jail in Ft. Davis. They were paid the \$500 dollars reward and Fort Stockton and Ft. Davis were safe again.

TEXAS SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

AUSTIN -In the frenzy to meet the Texas Supreme Court's April 1 deadline for equalized public school funding, the Conference Committee on Senate Bill 351 met Thursday and voted favorably on the final draft. The compromise bill establishes 195 county education districts to levy taxes to operate the state's Foundation School Program. It also establishes capped tax rates at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, and a multi-tiered program that includes the foundation program, equalized enrichment, facilities and debt service funds. The conference committee plans to meet Monday, March 25 to sign the final committee report.

On Wednesday, March 20, the Senate finally passed the Sunset legislation relating to the restructuring of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The Sunset Advisory Commission was established to review state agencies for their necessity, effectiveness, and efficiency every twelve years. Senator Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin, sponsor of Senate Bill 352, has served as chair of the Sunset Advisory Board for the past two years. After attempting to amend the legislation on Monday, March 18, to include increasing the board size, the Senate agreed on Wednesday to require at least one board member to be from a

rural area, and for no two board members to reside in the same area.

Also on Wednesday, March 20, the Senate Natural Resources Committee, chaired by Senator Bill Sims of San Angelo, heard testimony on Senate Bill 1099, sponsored by Senator Steve Carriker of Roby relating to permitting hazardous waste facilities. The legislation provides for more local input into siting decisions and extends the moratorium on commercial hazardous waste facilities until new guidelines can be established by the Texas Water Commission. Among those testifying in favor of the legislation was Governor Ann Richards. The bill was referred to a special subcommittee chaired by Senator Carriker.

On Tuesday, March 19, the Senate did not convene due to the tardiness of a large number of senators. After the Secretary of the Senate, Betty King, called the roll and found there was no quorum, Senator Carl Parker moved adjournment until 11:00 a.m. the next day. Lieutenant Governor Bullock promptly announced there were no objections and adjourned until the following day. He had expressed earlier in the session his desire to begin promptly each day.

The Senate stands adjourned until 11:00 a.m. Monday.

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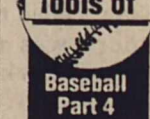


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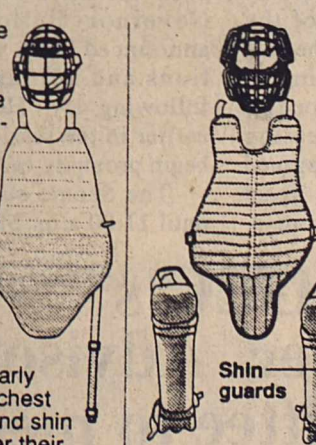
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The Catcher's equipment

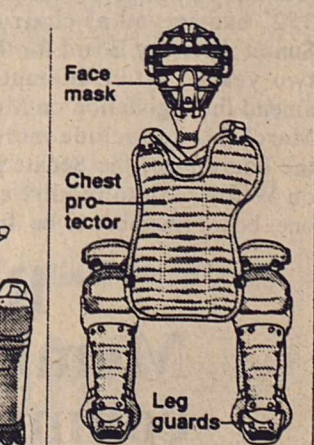

Protective equipment for catchers has become more safety-oriented since the creation of the first catcher's mask in 1876. To avoid ridicule, catchers in baseball's early years wore chest protectors and shin guards under their uniforms. Early masks consisted of meshed wire and soft leather with shock-absorbing pads on the forehead and cheeks.



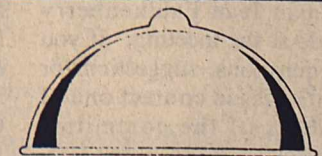
The first catcher to wear shin guards over his stockings was the New York Giants' Roger Bresnahan in 1907.

Board approves Tax Exemption Policy

In an effort to develop a comprehensive policy that will protect the tax base and encourage the improvement and preservation of historical sites in the Kinney County area, the Brackett Independent School District Trustees adopted an official policy that will offer a variety of exemptions to property that has been approved for a Texas Historical Medallion, and whose owners are making efforts to preserve or restore that property. The policy, adopted by a 7-0 vote of the board, appears below:

- institution - Full exemption
- B. Owned by an individual or company, but open to the general public with no admission charge - Full exemption
- C. Business Property - 25% exemption on Assessed Value
- D. Residential Property - 25% exemption on Assessed Value

Granting of exemptions will be considered annually in the January Board meeting. Continuation of approved exemptions will be contingent on the preservation efforts by the owners in the previous year.

The Brackett Independent School District recognizes the historical significance of the buildings in the District. The Board wishes to provide some incentive for the restoration of those buildings. Because of this commitment, the Board will consider granting exemptions to the following categories of property:

This policy is pursuant to the authority granted the Brackett Independent School District Board of Trustees under Article VIII, Section 1-F of the Texas Constitution and the State Property Tax Code Section 11.24, Second 11.34 (b), and Section 11.18.
