## Caution must be used when pruning trees

underside, about four inches from
the trunk. Now come from the topside and cut off the entire limb leaving the stub. Make a final cut flush with the trunk to remove the stub. Stub cutting allows you to
remove the branch without it breaking halfway through the cut
and peeling the bark down the tree and peeling the bark down the tree
trunk. But, remember to always remove the stub as stubs left on the tree will tatee much longer to
heat, and increase the chances of rot and decay which can be quite
prevalent in some of the hardwood prevalent
species.

If at all possible, try not to remove branches much larger than
4 inches in diameter as these tend to have difficulty healing and create a large wound on the side of
the tree. the tree.
Don't top your trees!
Domers have the mistaken idea that topping their trees is a healthy practice. Not only does topping a tree ruin a tree's natural
shape and beauty, but it exposes shape and beauty, but it exposes
the tree to insect and disease invasion and sunscald.
Be very skeptical of door-to-
door pruners. Although the fellow door pruners. Although the fellow may have good intentions, it s
better not to trust your tree to the whims of the "roving tree surgeon."
The best time to remove branches is winter or early spring, benore the leaves have come out
and are fully developed, but if you miss these times, it is still okay to do some pruning almost any time
