## ETERNAL SECURIT

"You have been severed from
Christ, you who are seeking to be
justified by law; you have fallen
from grace" Galatians $5: 4.4$
As we have seen thus far in
this series, the preponderance of
New Testament scriptures teach
the eternal security of the believer.
However, a few isolated verses on
the surface seem to indicate a
believer can lose his salvation, like
Hebrews 5:11-6:8 that we studied
in Part IV. Some of these pas-
sages are best interpreted in a
contextual approach, such as those
in Hebrews 5 \& 6. Other pas-
sages are best interpreted on a
language basis, like Galatians $5: 4$
above.
If we look first at Galatians
from a contextual basis, we see
that the Apostle Paul wrote the
epistle because an extremely
serious problem had developed in
the churches in Galatia. A group
of Christian Jews from Jerusalem
had visted the churches and taught
that to be a Christian you must
also become a Jew and carry out
the Mosaic Law, even to the

ic expression used in the Greek theater. An idiomatic expression is a word or group of words whose
individual definitions usually have nothing to do with the implied meaning of the word or words. For example, if I said, "my boss
was so uptight last week waiting was so uptight last week waiting
for news of his transfer that he was climbing the walls, " you would understand me to mean that my boss was exhibiting a lot of
anxiety last week. But if you were anxiety last week. But if you wer a foreagner in irticle with an English dictionary in one hand, you would give up after trying reconcile the
definition of "up" with "tight." So we have the same problem with the koine Greek "fallen from." It was a dramatic idiomatic expression that meant to be "hissed"

Texas Senate Week in Review
Cavalryman Correspondent
Austin - On Monday, July 15,
the Texas Senate convened for the
First Called Session of the 72 nd
Legisslature to work on the state's
budget. After reelecting Senator
Don Henderson of Houston as
President Pro Tempore, the
members of the Senate met in joint
session with the members of the
Texas House of Representatives to
hear an address from Governor
Ann Richard. Governor Richards
addressed specific objectives for
the special session, and praised
Comptroller John Sharp's Texas
Performance Review as the basis
of the budget plan. Governor
Richards also stated that there
would be no need for a state
income tax this session.
Senate committees spent the
week meeting for long hours
trying to pass legislation relating to
several areas specified in the
Texas Performance Review. On
Thursday, July 18 the first
package of legisistation to be
considered on the Senate floor was
the criminal justice legislation
sponsored by Senator Ted Lyon of
Rockwall. Senate Joint Resolution
4 proposes a constitutional
amendment authorizing a 1.1 bil-
lion dollar bond program to pa
for an additional 30,000 priso beds over the next four years. Senate Bill 24 provides for the
efficient operation of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, including the parole of special needs offenders, and the provision
of services and facilities of services and facilities to the
institutional division by private vendors. On Friday, July 15, the Senate
passed Senate Bill 2, sponsored by Senator Carl Parker of Port
Arthur, which would create the Arthur, which would create the
Texas Department of the Envi-
ronment. This ronment. This legislation consoli-
dates the Texas Water Commer dates the Texas Water Commis-
sion, the Texas Air Control Board the Texas Waterwell Drillers Board, the Structural Pest Control Board, as well as various envi-
ronmental functions performed by ronmental functions performed by
