> ETERNAL SECURITY
> Part VI
> Before I begin to examine oher passages of scripture that
seem to contradict the doctrine of the eternal security of the believer, I would like to make a few observations. Nowhere in the New testament faith in eternal security is necessary for eternal security. In other words, I don't have to believe in the doctrine of eternal security to be eternally secure.
There are millions of God-fearing believers in Jesus Christ in this world who do not believe they are eternally secure, even though believe the Bible teaches that they Ibelieve that the fault lies in th fact that these fellow believers fail to differentiate between salvation Tand RLustrate: To illustrate: thians 5:10, the Apostle Paul states that all believers will stand before the judgment seat of Christ where have done in this life (after salva tion). Most Bible scholars and reference Bibles agree that Revela tion 20:11-15 is a picture of the
judgment of unbelievers Corinthians 3:11-15 is a picture of the coming judgment of believers.

The unbeliever is not pertinent
