the 1870 's, the U.S. Government owned this building. It was build
around 1822 , probabiy by military
Iren sion and craftsmen. This building was scheduled to house military officers with the rank of Captain
or above with accompanied dependents. As seen in the War Department photo, the trees were not quite in abundance or as large
in the current photo. Canvas awnings, which were popular
during World War II and some years prior, are seen in the two upstairs right hand windows (quarters 27) and a mail box is seen near the sidewalk in front of
Quarters 28 . There are holes in Quarters 28. There are holes in
the wall on the west side of Quarters 27 which probably were for the supporting rods of the same type of awnings, only some of
them appeared to have supported much wider awnings. The Army had a Post Office on Fort Clark, in fact on the map made in 1944, the Post Office was located just across
the alley to the rear of the Post the alley to the rear of the Post
Theatre (now Town Hall). So
there was probably some mail uarters. least to the Officer's Quarters. During the 1930's, former soldier C. Eaton, who was
ssigned to Fort Clark then, said hat he knew of a Major and his family who were assigned quarters number 27.
After the U.S. Government sold the military post of Fort this and other former officer's quarters to house hunters, employment Co. Brown and Root
employees, and various other guests on a temporary basis. In quarters were occupied by LaughIn AFB Company Grads Officers during some of this era. of Texas purth American Towns Ranch, most of the quarters were sold to private individuals. Some commercial businesses purchased primarily for use as hunting lodges for their V.I.P. employees and guests, and customers. Old quarters number 28 and 27 are now
privately owned. Number 28 is owned by the Aulger Estate and number 27 is owned by Mrs. Elsa O'Rourke and her daughter.
Number 28 is vacant, and guter 27 is occupied.

Here are some tips on making prize winning chili from Preparing Competition Chili by the Chil (C.A.S.I.). "Competition chili is a combination of finely cut meat, seasonings, and spices in a smooth
liquid gravy. It contains no beans liquid gravy. It contains no bean preferred to ground meat. The chili contains very little or no grease. Winning chili must look
good, smell good, and taste good. good, smell good, and taste good.
Because the judging process takes awhile, chili must retain its color consistency, aroma, taste, and afterbite while hot, warm, lukewarm, and cool in a styrofoam
judging cup. The chili should be free of grease and the meat and gravy also must look good in the
small plastic teaspoons used for small plas
judging."

You can use beef or venison.
But high quality lean beef usually But high quality lean beef usually
makes the best chili. You need to end up with about one quart of finished chili for the judges and you will be able to sell or give
your chili away during the day our chili away during the day.
With that in mind start with enough to meet your needs. Use cut meat for the Judge's chili and ground meat if you intend to make
large a mount for the crowd. a large a mount for the crowd.
Neutral cooking surfaces work best and black pots are not recommended as they taint the chili with their seasoning. Trim
meat of fat, gristle, and connecting meat of fat, gristle, and connecting
tissue. Regular commercial chili powder is permissible, but complete commercial chili mixes are not permitted. All chili to be
judged must be prepared from scratch on site the day of cookoff. On the day of the cookoff there is a checklist prepared by C.A.S.I. arme of the things you'll ne
