"This is My commandment,

have loved you" (John 15:12). "But you, why do you jud your brother? Or you again, why do you judge your brother with
contempt? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ" (Romans 14:10). I have juxtaposed these two do and don't of the Christian way of life. In this history of the rise of one of tions, Ellis covers the first millennium of Celtic history. During this period, the Celts dominated the anwest to Turkey in the east. The author writes that, although the "Celtic Empire" commanded many

created and perpetuated by inde-

history of their civilization, now 3,000 years old and confined to the islands and peninsulas of northwest

History of the Seminole Indian Scout Cemetery

The History of the Seminole Cemetery is as unique and
historical as the Indian Scouts who are buried there. Approximately 100 or more Negro Seminole Scouts who played a major role in
protecting the Texas Frontier from prostile Indians are buried there, with the descendants and families of the scouts.
The Negro Seminole Indian Scout Cemetery was established in
September 1872, on the Fort Clark Reservation. April 14, 1881, the Scouts fought their last Indian
battle following the final important battle following the final important
raid on Texas soil near the Rio Grande. At that time the cemetery was At that time the cemetery was
under supervision of Deacon Tony under supervision of Deacon Tony
Wilson, who left us many years

    Building number 46, during this time was the official Post Guard House, for military prisoner
    confinement. Around to the side and rear, there was a high fence which enclosed an area for prisoners to be able to have some
    exercise. If you have ever visited exercise. If you have ever visited
    the "Old Guard House Museum," you should have noticed that the cells which are in the cell block are quite small. In addition, there
    never was any plumbing facilities never was any plumbing facilities
    in the cells. Anyone whom may have been imprisoned in this guard house probably remembered their
    stay for the rest of their life. Life stay for the rest of their life. Life
    could not have been very comfortable in these cells as far as hot or cold weather is concerned. Air conditioning or central heat would
    not have been found in this not have been found in this
    building during the era in which it was in use as a military confinement facility. When the 2nd Cavalry Divi-
    the 5th Cavalry and the federalized Texas National Guard Cavalry was gone, there was a need for a much
    larger military prisoner confinement facility. So, a "Stockade" was built, which consisted of World War II type military bar-
    racks enclosed in an area with high fencing. The Provost Marhigh fencing. The Provost Marbarracks were just on the other side of the fence. There was also a solitary confinement building,
    which remains on Fort Clark Springs through the present time. This area was located in part of an area of where Unit 3 is now located. The main entrance faced
    Travis Road, just to the east of the non-commissioned officer family housing (now referred to as the "Forty-niners"). It went north and
    south from Travis for about $3 / 4$ ths of the way to Spofford Access Road, (now re-named Scales Road).
    If you have not visited the Fort Clark Old Guard House Museum, you certainly should. It is one of the more interesting military
