We hope Carl will take the widow alright.

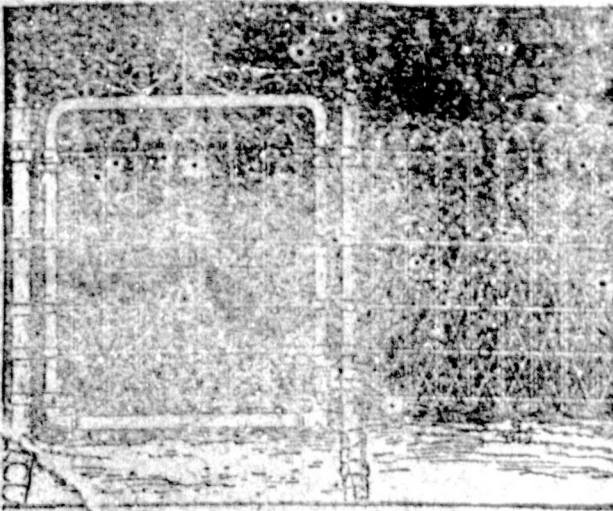
Mr. Harris passed through here with a bunch of horses last Monday morning.

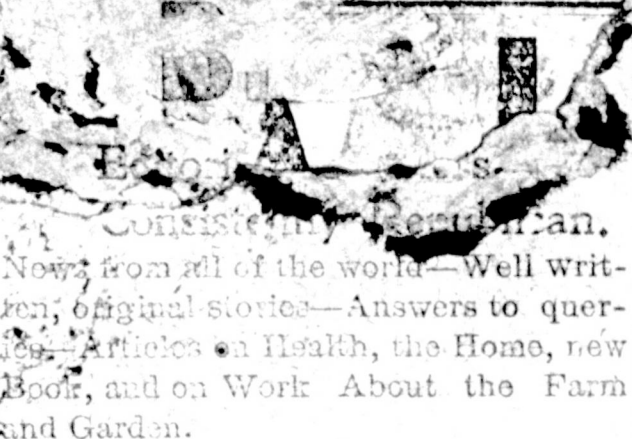
