The Great Packers' Strike to be Settled by Arbitration.

Torms have already been agreed upon and the strikers will resume work to morrow. If the strikers win out in the arbitration the trust will, only profit by the advanced price of dressed meats, but should the strikers loose then the trust will have not only gained in the advance of dressed meals but will gain by decreasing the wages of its employes, and this at a time when the producer gets but little out of the cattle shipped to the market.

Such is the power of trusts to prices paid to producers, and control the prices they get not least, they would almost move succeed were it not for organized labor.

Later: Since writing the above the strike has broken out anew. This, the strikers say, is the result of the packers breaking an agreement In Chicago alone there are 30,000 men on strike.

The Cattle Industry.

The rise and fall of the cattle industry for the past twenty-five years is well portrayed in the federal census figures. In 1880 the number of cattle in the United States other than milch cows, was about 21,000,000. Four years later the number had increased 46,000,000, which fell to 27, 000,000 in 1902, when the last federal census was taken. gain since 1880 is over 100 per the increase in cent, while population for the same period averages but 51 per cent. R lating to Pensions for Relating to Incorporation of Confederate Soldiers.


HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Article 3, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to pensions of ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That, Article 3, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or indivicuals, municipal or other corpor ations whatsoever; provided, how ever, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Con-1ederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disahility is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances, who have never re-married and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880; and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month; provided futher, that no appropriation shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand ditional to the par value of such State of Texas, as provided for dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law: provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the State, and, provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

Sec 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and county officers.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 16. of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the incorporaand discounting privileges, prescribing the liability of stockholders in same; providing for the regulation of such corporate bodies, and prohibiting foreign corporations with such powers from doing business in this State; and providing for the submission of such proposed Constitutional Amendment as required by law.

SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 16, of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby so amended that the same shall hereafter read as fol-

The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting priviliges, and shall provide for a system of State Supervision, regulation and control of such bodies which will adequately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution.

Authorizing Legislation in Aid of Internal Improvements.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing legislation in aid of certain internal improvements.

Section 1. (c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

SEC. 3 The Governor is hereby authorized to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this proposed amendment to the electors of the State, as hereinbefore indicated, and to futher direct said election in its details, as is usual and customary in such

SEC. 4. That the sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary is hereby appropriated cut of the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the necessary cost and expenses of the proceedings hereunder to be had and done.
