Harvesting of the 1958 winter wheat crop with record yields per acre, has been completed in most areas except in the North Plains counties. Cotton ranges from field in bloom in South Texas to just up to a stand in plains areas where replanting has been necessary. Boll weevil and thrip damage is heavy in the southeastern third of Texas with thrips and grassnoppers being reported in the remainder of the cotton producing counties.

Texas sorghums range from near maturity in South Texas to just up to a stand in the high Plains. With favorable weather from now until harvest, Texas could produce nearly as large a sorghum crop as was harvested last year.

Carrots and other vegetables in high Plains counties are showing good growth. All Texas rice acreage is planted and most up to a good stand.

In a letter to Secretary of Labor Mitchell, Fisher called for action by this nation either with the Mexican government or unilaterally which would result in increased availability of the braceros to work on farms and ranches on this side of the Rio Grande.

Fisher cited a report by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assn. to the effect that since Jan. 17 fewer than 40 braceros have been contracted for ranch labor, although a need for approximately 2,000 existed. Fisher in his letter to Mitchell

### RULE 7:00 THE GAME-OFFENSE

PART THREE OF A SERIES

7.12-A base runner is entitled to an unoccupied base when he touches it before he is out provided he has touched all the preceding bases in order. He is then entitled to it until he is put out, touches the next base, or is legally forced to vacate it for the following runner.

7.13-In advancing, a runner shall touch first, second, third, and home bases in order.

A. If forced to return, he shall re-touch all bases in reverse order unless the ball is dead, in which case he may go directly to his original base.

C. In the event a runner fails to touch a base while advancing or returning, he is out if a defensive player shall touch him with the ball or shall touch the base illegally missed, or the orginal base while holding the ball in his glove or hand. This is an appeal play.

D. With less than two out, the standing of a following runner is not affected by a preceding runner's failure to touch a base. If, upon appeal, a runner is the third out, no runners following him may score.

7.14—Two runners may not occupy a base. But, if, while the ball is alive, two runners are touching the same base, the second runner shall be out when tagged. The first runner

Mr. Dickerson gave us a good example of why we should stay alert at all times no matter who we are or what we do. While he was in St. Louis some time back he had to wait for transportation back to his home, not having anything to do he decided to visit the shoe industry for which St. Louis is famous. He called on a Mr. Johnson of International Shoe Co. Mr. Johnson stated he was interested in opening a branch in the south. They were thinking about Alabama and Mississippi, didn't think of Texas. Well after some talk and work it was

later agreed to locate the factory in Bryan, Texas. Remember, Texas is now the second largest state in the union in size but through continued effort we can make her the largest industrial tycoon where she should be.




