Caught Twenty Lobos.

Killing three lobos last week, John Corbet, a well known trapper of this section, brought the total number of these wolves killed by himself since last August up to twenty. The ones he killed last week had just killed three calves and dragged them to their den, he

Mr. Corbett who was in the city Monday after supplies, has been confining his operations to the ranges owned and controlled by G. W. Tankersely and J. D. Sugg, and for each lobo he killed he received \$30, making his earnings since last August \$600. He says that while he is thinning the predatory animals out, there are plenty of them left, and he will continue his work of extermination.

He boasts of holding in captivity the oldest and largest lobo in the country. The animal was captured. last September. Mr. Corbett says the big fellow is fully as large as a yearling steer and is about seventyfive years old. He is a wise old guy and fought shy of the trap a long time before I caught him, said the trapper. Explosive Neckties.

There are several processes of manufacturing artificial silk which are based on the use of ordinary cellulose, reduced to a plastic condition so that it may be drawn into threads. These are woven into various forms whose chief difference from real silk. to the eye, is that the material is

All but one of these processes yield a "silk" that is as safe as cotton. The other employs nitro-cellulose, or soluble guncotton, from which the threads are drawn in ether or alcohol. After the thread has been drawn and is ready for weaving it is supposed to be denitrated. If it is, then it is entirely safe. Otherwise it may be exceedingly dangerous, for it then remains nothing less than guncotton spun into a fabric.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROHIB-ITING THE MANUFACTURE, SALE, BARTER AND EXCHANGE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS EX-CEPT FOR MEDICINAL, SCIEN-TIFIC AND SACRAMENTAL PUR-

Mouse Joint Resolution No. 2

A resolution proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20, thereof by striking out and repealing said section, and substituting in lieu thereof a new Section 20, prohibiting the manufacture for purposes of sale, barter or exchange, and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, within this State, except for medicinal, scientific and sacramental purposes, and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall, st noon on the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; providing, further, that this section shall not prevent any session of the Legislature from passing any law to enforce the same; and, providing, further, that all laws in force when this amendment is adopted, providing penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, shall remain in full force and effect; until modified or repealed; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment, directing, a proclamation therefor and making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof, and method of voting; prescribing certain duties for the Governor of this State, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out and repealing Section 20 thereof, and substituting in lieu of said Section 20 the follow-

Section 20. The manufacture for purposes of sale, barter or exchange, ind the sale, barter and exchange of incoxicating liquors on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, is hereby prohibited within this State, except for medicinal, scientific and sacramental purposes. The Legislature of the State of Texas, shall, at noon, on the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1812, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section, but nothing in this section shall prevent any session of the Legislature from passing any law to enforce the same; and all laws in force when this amendment is adopted provicing remedies, penalties or forfeiture in relation to the manufacture, sale or ransportation of intoxicating liquors! shall remain in full force and effect antil modified or repealed.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for memhers of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of! Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, being the twenty-second day thereof, A. D. 1911. At said election the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words "Official Ballot."

Said-ballot shall have also written, or printed thereon the words "For Prohibition," and the words "Against Pro-

All the voters favoring said proposed' amendment shall erase the words; "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same, and those opposing it shall erase the words "For Prohibition." If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition" said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes shall be "Against Prohibition" said amendment shall be lost and so declared.

All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and in all other respects, as far as such election laws can be made applicable.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand (5000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds, in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.
