O FAR as things political go, Pat O'Brien owns the town. So far as the railroad goes, and that is to the jumping-off place in the Pacific ocean, Joe Dale owns the railroad. Dale's railroad moves and has a large part of its being in O'Brien's town. Soon or late these two men were sure to war for supremacy in the town, and this is the story of how it happened. The people of the town and the stockholders of the rail-

road don't come into the story at all. They only furnished the sinews of war, which fact is abundant proof that the story is true.

Pat O'Brien's town calls him the cardinal. In a moment of angry defeat, a silk-stockinged enemy, too polite to liken Pat to the devil, sourly dubbed him a second Cardinal Richelieu. The name tickled the town's fancy, and it stuck.

The cardinal didn't mind. He was too busy to cavil at mere names. #### INGENIOUS COAT HANGERS

Good Substitute for a Regular Article When Such Is Not at Hand.

A coat or jacket of any description should be kept on a coat hangerwhen not being worn. If a regular hanger does not chance to be on hand a good substitute can be evolved by making a tight roll of wrapping paper or newspaper and tying about the center a string with loops left to hang it on the hook.

The paper roll if sufficiently thick will keep a coat in shape nicely. Most waists are also better hung up, than laid in a drawer. In traveling it is especially convenient to be able to fashion good hangers with only a few old papers, a bit cf string and just a moment's time and work.

For traveling the small cases of extension hangers are delightfully compact and a great convenience. These hangers can also be bought separately and a bag of silk or dimity made for them to be carried in.

### WOMAN IS DRIVEN MAD BY A PHONOGRAPH SONG

TAMAGNO'S FORMER LOVE BE-COMES INSANE OVER VOICE FROM MACHINE.

Paris.-The French Anthropological society, continuing its campaign in favor of the establishment of a phonographic museum, is gradually adding to the interesting collection of nearly 500 cylinders offered to it by Dr. A. Azeulay. #### TRADE CONDITIONS INCREASE

BUSINESS FOR NON-CONTIGUOUS TERRITORIES IS \$190,000,000.

Imports for Eleven Months Amount to \$15,887,418, Against \$8,860,429 for Same Months of 1909.

Washington-Trade of the United States with its non-contiguous territories for the fiscal year just ended aggregated about \$190,000,000, according to statistics of the department of commerce and labor. The department contrasts with the record of 1897, when the trade with noncontiguous territories aggregated only \$35,-000,000. Statistics show that for eleven months of the last fiscal year the shipments from the United States to Porto Rico, Hawaii, the Philippines, Guam, Midway, Tutuila and Alaska amounted to \$75,000,000 and the shipments therefrom to the United States \$96,666,000. This trade, both export and import, was larger than that of the preceding year. The largest percentage of gain was in the Philippines, to which the recent tariff act extendthat follows taking a dose of castor ed the privileges of the interchange of 1909. Exports for the corresponding period amounted to \$15,140,445 in 1910 and \$9,825,083 in 1909.

More than \$10,000,000 reduction in the postal deficit has been made in the first nine months of the fiscal year just ended, according to final returns from the auditor for the postoffice department. Such a reduction is unprecedented. Deficit for the nine months was \$2,709,000 as against \$12,-832,000 in the same period of the preceding fiscal year. In the third quarter ending March 31, the postal ser vice earned a surplus of \$1,363,000, the revenues for the quarter amount ing to \$58,934,000 and the expenditures \$57,561,000. The latter showed an increase of less than 4 per cent.

Controlled Newspapers.
The Atchison Globe says that no advertiser has ever tried to control its editorial policy, the remark being occasioned by the charge often made nowadays, that the big advertisers direct the editorial policy of newspapers.

The experience of the Globe is the experience of most newspapers. The merchant who does a great deal of advertising is more interested in the circulation department of a newspaper than in the editorial department. If a daily paper goes to the homes of the people, and is read by them, he is satisfied, and it may chase after any theory or fad, for all he cares. He has troubles of his own, and he isn't trying to shoulder those of the editorial brethren.

There are newspapers controlled by people outside of the editorial rooms, and a good many of them, more's the pity; but the people exercising that control are not the business men who pay their money for advertising space. The newspapers which are established for political purposes are often controlled by chronic officeseekers, whose first concern is their own interests. There are newspapers controlled by great corporations, and the voice of such newspapers is always raised in protest against any genuine reform.

The average western newspaper usually is controlled by its owner, and he is supposed to be in duty bound to make all sorts of sacrifices at all sorts of times; there are people who consider it his duty to insult his advertisers, just to show that he is free and independent. If he shows a decent respect for his patrons, who pay him their money, and make it possible for him to carry on the business, he is "subsidized" or "controlled." The newspaper owner is a business man, like the dry goods man or the grocer. The merchants are expected to have consideration for their customers, and they are not supposed to be subsidized by the man who spends five dollars with them, but the publisher is expected to that he is ungrateful for the patronbination when you think it over .-Emporia Gazette.
