

## The Iron Pot-Still a Mystery

By a Former Secret Service Man

**Ex-Operative Tells of Cleverest of Counterfeiting Plots**

greatest confusion. Clothing and shells, guns and fishing-tackle were strewn about the floor, evidencing a precipitate departure. It was tantalizing to again allow the criminals to escape. I felt deeply chagrined, and resolved never again to put off a matter of this kind. The men had forestalled me by only a few hours, for I had intended arresting them that morning, and there had been nothing in their conduct during my visit to their cabin to indicate that they thought of flight. PRISONER WINS WAY TO LIBERTY WITH TEETH

MAN IN JAIL GNAWS THROUGH TWO HEAVY BEAMS ONLY TO BE RECAPTURED.

Erfurt, Germany .- The police have captured a man named Schaarschmidt, who escaped from the Gera jail three weeks ago. The manner of his flight makes one of the most remarkable of all of those told in the romances of prison heroes.

Crossing the one window of his cell within was an oak beam 7x7 inches square. Outside the window was another beam nine inches thick. These were his only bars besides the masyour honor. sive masonry of the building. That is to say, there were no metal bars between these wooden barriers.

But the wood, toughened by age, was enough to make any prisoner



without tools despair. Schaarschmidt had not even the metal shank from his shoes to make a saw of, for he had only felt slippers in his dungeon. He got to work with his teeth, however, upon the inside beam. It took him three months to gnaw through this formidable barrier. 





## **NEWS FROM OVER TEXAS**

The edible and poisonous varieties of these fungi are too close together in general and species for the average youngster to differentiate them. Some years ago the department of agriculture at Washington issued an elaborate and beautiful set of illustrations of mushrooms and "near" mushrooms, tion in Santiago. labeling one set "edible" and the other "poisonous." The story leaked out that the printers got the labels mixed, and that the transposition was not discovered until the work had been sent broadcast. terest is a bulletin which is now ready for distribution by the Experiment Station of the Texas A. and M. College, in regard to commercial fertilizers. It is prepared by Dr. G. S. Fraps, the chemist, and contains analysis by J. B. Rather, assistant chemist.

Dr. Fraps gives an interesting description of "plant food" and explains exactly what it is and why it is so named. He shows wherein certain soils are deficient in the materials that are known as "plant food," and he gives explicit directions how the missing constituents may be supplied.

A remarkable statement in the bulletin is that which calls attention to the value of cotton seed meal as a fertilizer, and the double value that marketable product has. "He says "feeding stuffs contain plant food. After they are used by the animal most of the plant food is passed. A small portion is retained by the growing animal and a portion is used by cows in the elaboration of their milk, but the largest part passes off. He explains that manufacturers of fertilizers are purchasers in large quantities of the materials necessary to the mixing of a valuable fertilizer and that they have

the machinery and equipment for the proper mixing. In this way the manufacturer can supply the article more conveniently, probably more cheaply. However, he warns the farmers to know what they are buying when they do purchase a commercial fertilizer.

Dr. Fraps warns the farmers against buying "formulas" by which to do their own mixing. He says some of these 'secret formulas" have been offered in Texas, and he gives the analysis of one which he says contains no plant food whatever. He advises the farmers that the Texas Experiment station will provide a number of formulas for any person who desires to do home mixing, and that it will be free of any charge.

The bulletin is especially interesting. and it will be sent to all those who make requests for it.


moment the lion caught sight of the buggy and started toward it. Unarmed, powerless to protect themselves, the two immediately applied the whip to the bronchos they were driving.
