


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

HOW MUCH FERTILIZER TO

The question, "How much fertilizer should be used per acre?" cannot be answered definitely, but only in a general way. It is sometimes put in this form: "What is the most profitched around that way. It is sometimes put in this to-"What is the most profitable amount that may be applied per acre?" Neither can the question in the amended form be exactly and accurately answered. The soil, its character, condition, preparation, etc., may be well known, or controllable factors, but we know not what the seasons may be, says Hon. R. J. Redding, Director Georgia Experiment Station, Department of Agriculture, in the Virginia.

APPLY.

Carolina Fertilizer Almanac. We know that some grops will bear larger amounts of fertilizers with reasonable assurance of profitable returns than may be expected of other soils. A crop that occupies the soil from the fall season until spring, or early summer, will bear heavier fertilizing than will a crop that is planted in the spring and ripens for harvest in midsummer. The first case is illustrated by oats, wheat, or other small grain, or grass, especially when sown in the fall of the year. Such a crop occu-ples the soil during the late fall and win-ter, and early spring—during which pe-riods the rains are usually abundant— ripening for harvest in late spring, or very early summer, before the burning summer heat and possible drouths of June and July. Oats and wheat therefore are ideal crops for liberal fertilizing. corn is rather an uncertain crop on the ordinary dry uplands of the South. It has but a short period in which to develop its flowers—tassels and silks—covering but a few days. If very dry weather thell previous when the control or the control of shall prevail when this critical period is approaching, and for some time after it is passed, the crops may prove a greater or less failure. There can be no second effort, no second period of blooming.

It is different in the case of cotton, which commences to bloom and make fruit in June (or even earlier) and continues throughout the summer.

tinues throughout the summer until checked by a severe frost in November. It has a number of "chances." Cotton is therefore another ideal crop for liberal fertilizing. A small amount of fertilizers applied per acre will no doubt yield a larger percentage profit on its cost than will a larger amount. To illustrate: An application of \$2 worth of fertilizer per acre will not fertilize an application of \$2 worth of fertilizer per acre. of fertilizer per acre may cause an in-creased yield of cotton (at 10 cents per und) of the value of \$6 to \$8, or a pr of 200 to 200 per cent. on its cost. I have frequently had such results. But it does not follow that twice as heavy an appli-cation will produce twice as large re-

sults, or that three times as much would cause three times as great an increase in the yield. In other words, the rate of increase in the yield of cotton will not be in proportion to the increase in the amount of fertilizers applied. Two dollars' worth of fertilizer per acre may yield an increase in the crop of \$6; but \$6 worth would not therefore bring an increase of \$18.

The less breaking up of color on a wall the more artistic it is.

The most successful form of the solid colored wall is an alabastined wall. There is as much difference between tinted walls, as there is between shoddy and all-wool gowns. The shoddy gown holds its color for a few days, while the all-wool keeps its color to the very last thread, so also in solid colored walls, there are shoddy walls and permanently colored walls which retain their color down to the very last particle. The ideal wall coating this wasn't exactly like a woman, alnever rubs off, never flakes nor chips off and is always ready for a fresh coat. If there is wallpaper on the wall, soak it off with warm water, then go over the plaster after you have removed the paper with warm water to remove every trace of paste. Have the wall thoroughly clean for a clean wall cannot be built on an unclean foundation. If there are any particles of foreign matter adhering to the wall scrape them off with a putty knife. Then if there are any discolorations on the wall, size it with a material made from cheap varnish, thinned down with benzine and japan added for a drier, then cover your wall with your tinting material.

Be sure your man uses a tinting material mixed with cold water. If he comes to you and asks for warm water, you can make up your mind that there is glue in the material which he proposes to put on your wall, and you can be certain that you are going to have a shoddy wall, for glue means shoddy. Glue means that it will hold its color long enough for the man to collect his bill and not much longer Insist on your tinting material being mixed with clear, cold water. Be sure that your wall is made from pure materials, then you will have a permanent, artistic, sanitary wall. A wall that will be a "thing of beauty and a joy forever."

A WARSHIP BLOWN UP.

TORPEDO EXPLODES DEMOLISH-ING FRENCH BATTLESHIP.

Commander, Chief of Staff and 70 to 80 Bluejackets Lose Their Lives -Child Killed Instantly.

Toulon: A terrible disaster occurred here Tuesday afternoon. The powder magazine on board the French battleship Iena blew up at 1:35 and as a result Capt. Adigard, Commander of the battleship, Capt. Veritier, Chief of Staff of the Mediterranean Squadron and from seventy to eighty bluejackets are dead, while Rear Admiral Manceron and hundreds of other men are suffering from injuries, some of them horrible in their extent. Uniform Text-book Bill Includes Cities. The re-enactment of the uniform textbook law by the Senate passed that body in such a shape that it applies to large cities which have heretofore been exempted from its provisions, though a har dfight was made to exempt them. Those in favor of that proposition have not given up the fight, however, but will seek to have the House amend it so that it will not apply to the cities of the State. Corporation Candidates.

The House has acted favorably or the bill by Representative Terrell of Cherokee to compel candidates for office to file a statement showing the extent of their connection with any and all corporations before their names can be placed on the ballot. If this bill should pass it would not affect any now holding office, but would make some now holding office ineligible for re-election unless they severed some present connections. Stamp Tax Proposed.

Representative Kennedy of Lime stone has introduced a bill providing for stamp tax as a means of raising revenue, similar to the one enforced by the Federal government to defray the expenses of the war with Spain. It provides a tax on deeds, deeds of trust, mortgages, transfers of stocks of bonds of corporations, notes and other legal instruments, the minimum tax to be 25 cents and the charge to be increased according to the consideration or amount involved.
