# MUKOEN WILL BE ABANDONED. THE MANASSAS ARMY MANEUVERS. 

Kuropatkin in Danger of Being Surrounded by the Troops Are Divided Into Two Armies and a Mimic Japs---Armies Are Racing.<br>Battle Is On---Texans In Opposition

The forces of Kuropatkin and Oy ama are racing for Mukden. This much stands out of the news of Mon day, and is indicated in a report forwardel by Kuropatkin, who says his retreat is being conducted in perfect order, though the Japanese on Sundas repeatedly attacked his rear and con tinued the attacks until Monday. The resuit of the race is in doubt. The united Russian forces are now north of Yentai, a station on the railway about ten miles northeast of Liao Yang. They are pushing on to Muk den, to which the bulk of the Japan ese forces are marching direct, after having swarmed across the Taitse river.
A strong Japanese flanking column is about thirty miles northeast of Liao Yang and trying to get between the Russian forces and Mukden
With the race in progress, there was a brief dispatch from Mukden saying that preparations for the evacuation of that place are proceeding. This report is well founded, as is pointed out in the Associated Press St. Petersburg dispatches, would mean the abandonment of the whole ot Southern Manchuria and the winding up of the present campaign. It was reported in St. Petersburg at a late hour Monday night that Kuropatkin's rear guard had been almost annihilated and that the main Russian army was in danger of being surrounded.
Kuropatkin, in his report, makes no mention of the abandonment of 200 suns at Liao Yang, a rumor to which effect is in circulation

Advices from Port Arthur by way of Che Foo bring the fighting there up to Septeraber 2 and say the Japanese losses were very heavy

No details of the aflair were obtainable.

MAY END THE CAMPAIGN Reported Russians Intend to Abandon Mukeden.
St. Petersburg, Sept. 6.-It is impossible at this hour to obtaln any statement from the authorities regard. ing the reported preparations for the abandonment of Mukden
This is the first intimation that such course is contemplated. If it turns out to be true, it means the abandonment of the whole of South Manchuria and the winding up of the present campaign
In fact, should Mukden be evacuated, there would be no point for wintering the army of 250,000 men, with its many wounded soldiers. On the other hand, the evacuation of Mukden would give Field Marshal Oyama commod Sous winter quarters and the practica control of two lines of rallway. The Kinchou-Sintin line, tapping rich Chinese territory, stons little short of Mukden, with which it is connected by good wagon road.
The report of the prospective evacu ation of Mukden, if well founded would indicate that the crippling ef fect of the Liao Yang fighting on suropatkin's army is more serious than has as yet been intimated

## DUEL WITH KNIVES.

One Negro is Dead and His Slayer Escaped.
Waxahachie, Tex:s.-Saturday night while a dance was in progress at the home of Holloway Britton, colored, on the Jefferson farm, three miles south east of Italy, Britton and another ne gro named Sam Earnes became involved in a difficuity which resulted in a duel with knives. The combat ants used their lnives in a vigorous manner, and Britton was literally cut to pieces. His wounds resulted in death soon after. Barnes succeeded in making his escape. It is not known how badly he was injured. Britton lived on the Thompson farm two year and was regarcied as a quiet and peaceabie negro. The officers are on the lookout for Barnes.

San Antonio, Texas.-The two me shot at Elmendorf Sunday night while Deputy Sheriff Martinez sought to make an arrest, died in the early hours of Monday morning. They were bystanders. The one, Jesus Cantu, was shot in the groin; the other, Juan Morales, through the bowels. The dep uty was placed in jail.

Gainesville, Va., Sept. 7.-The blue and brown armies are facing each oth er in hostile array. It is the work of the blue army, under Gen, F. D. Grant, operating from Manassas, to strike and drive the brown army, under Gen G. F. Bell, operating from Thorough fare, back through the gap of that name in the Bull Run mountains. The zone of hostilities is a stretch of Vir ginia farms five miles wide and fif teen miles long, comprising the terri tory over which was fought the two battles of Bull Run. Manassas is the southeast point in the zone, and Thor oughfare Gap is in the center of its western limit.
At daylight today Gen. Grant has established a front acros sthe zon and pushed his line two-fifths of the way to Thoroughfare. The northern half of this line (Grant's right) is a picked mass of infantry; the southern half (bis left wing) is a patrol of cavalry. It is with the strong right that the blow will be struck. To meet the attack General Bell has established a line of battle which sweeps in a sem: circle from Buckland on the southwestern limits of the zone, to Woolsey, on the north. Buckland is less than two miles from the western limit of operations, and Woolsey a little more than that distance. General Bell's center is the strongest part of his line.
Up to a late hour no collision of any consequence had occurred. The lines of battle, however, have been formed marshaled for the assault

## RUSSIA TO YIELD

In Regard to the Question of Contraband.
London, Sept. 7.-The preilminary epresentations made by Count Benck endorff, the Russian ambassador to the foreign office, indicate that Rus sia is on the point of making substantia! concessions to the United States and Great Britain regarding the ques ion of contraband of war, as a re sult of the admission by Foreign Mirister Lamsdorff of the report of the general commission to Emperor Nich olas today, together with information transmitted by Ambassador Bencken dorff, showing the views of the British government. The Russian foreign min ister is expected to present to th British government through Sir Charles Mardinge, the British ambas sador to Russia, tomorrow the formal eply of the Russian government. It s understood in official circles her that Russia, while not acknowiedging by her at fanlt for the captures made cally which certain goods, such as food stuffs and cotton, become, in her view contraband.
The British foreign office is satis fied from the representations made oo it that such substantial concessions an easy settlement of the vexatious question.

By reason of tine fact that the day is end at 3, military experts look for the nain engagement tomorrow. General Bell has advanced his lines a least two miles further east than the one he originally took up.
Between the two forces is a stretcil of open country of about a mile. This country is rolling and on either side are woods or corn fields. The outposts of General Grant's forces were stopped in their forward movement bout 10 o'clock. Four companies of he Seventy-fourth New York and one company of the Fifth infantry (regular), under Brigadier General Wint, commanding the First brigade of the Siue army, were ruled oit of action or attempting to cross the open space, They were subjected to the concen rated fire of a long line of the sec ond Texas regiment, under Geaeral Lee, commanding the First brigade of the brown army. This brisk skirmish developed such strength on the part oi the brown army that hostilities seemed to cease aln:ost entirely. Thiz would seem to incheate that Gensral Grant was either preparing to make a strong attack or to make a swift move to flana General Bell on the right
