Santa Ana's invading hosts had but recently passed from Rio Grande on the Laredo and Matamoros routes to San Antonio and Goliad. The Alamo had fallen four days before this journey began, and Fannin surrendered near Goliad nine days after their departuie, but these ill-fated colonists knew ff neither event.
