Local lady okay after bout with rattlesnake

Peggy Bates of Muleshoe got an unpleasant surprise last Wednesday while working in her yard.

While reaching down to move some debris, she felt a sharp sting and heard the chilling sound of a rattlesnake.

Although she could not see the snake, her hand immediately began to swell and hurt.

Her husband Jack Bates drove her to the Muleshoe Area Medical Center from their rural home south of Muleshoe for emergency treatment.



A&M researchers develop mite resistant corn line

In a development that could revolutionize insect control in Texas Panhandle-South Plains and other High Plains corn production regions, a Texas A&M University researcher has developed a corn line that is resistant to the dreaded spider mite.

The new corn line is "TAM-MITE 1." It was developed by Dr. Tom Archer, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock. It is a white seeded, full season corn that flowers about 90 days after planting. Archer says the seed line germplasm is being

released to commercial seed companies this fall.

"We expect the seed companies to breed the TAM-MITE 1 germplasm with their best lines to develop commercial, mite resistant hybrids for growers," says Archer. "That means the mite resistant seed should be available to growers in about three years."

Archer's research was funded primarily from the Texas half-cent bushel corn checkoff, which is administered by the Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB).

"TCPB and the state's grow-

ers have helped fund corn insect research and other research programs since 1977," says Carl King, TCPB executive director. "These outstanding research results we're seeing from Dr. Archer and others

Farm, Ranch Safety Week declared in Bailey County

At the request of Bailey County Farm Bureau President Donald Puckett of Muleshoe, County Judge Marilyn Cox has proclaimed Sept. 17-23 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Bailey County.

This year marks the 52nd annual observance of National Farm Safety and Health Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The theme of National Farm Safety and Health Week for this year is "Sow the Seeds of Health . . . Practice Safety."

Emphasis is being placed on better technology, safe work practices and education.

The proclamation states that Americans should be concerned about agricultural production and its global impor-

wouldn't be possible without the tremendous support shown by growers in the voluntary check-off program."

Mites are primarily a problem in semi-arid regions of the Great Plains and Mexico. They feed on corn leaves. When dry summers combine with hot temperatures, mite populations can explode in numbers and severely damage corn yields.

Pesticides, namely Capture from FMC and Comite from Uniroyal, have been used for effective mite control at a cost of \$20-\$30 per acre per application. Archer believes that with the development of the new mite resistant corn, growers will have much less dependence on the pesticides.

Archer's mite-resistant seed research is a joint effort with Dr. Frank Peairs of Colorado State University and Dr. John Mihm of CIMMYT, the international corn and wheat re-

search center in Mexico City. In the studies, the resistant seed was tested in Texas, Colorado and Mexico. It consistently showed high resistance to both two-spotted mite and the Banks grass mite.

In Archer's 1993-94 Texas research, TAM-MITE 1 was crossed with two popular seed lines which are susceptible to mites. The hybrid seed was grown and compared to susceptible seed lines. The resistance of the seed lines was rated in a scale of 1 to 10 for feeding damage by mites, with 10 being 100% damage.

In one comparison the first TAM-MITE 1 -cross scored a 3, or 30% damage, far below the economic threshold where corn is significantly damaged. That compared to a rating of 7, or 70% damage from the susceptible line. Similar results were seen in the second comparison,

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Freshmen battle DC to 0-0 tie

The good news is the Muleshoe freshmen posted their second-straight shutout, holding Denver City to 66 total yards and four first downs.

The bad news is the Mules didn't fare much better against an aggressive Mustang defense in a 0-0 tie in a freshman football game here Thursday.

The Mules (1-0-1), plagued by turnovers and penalties, managed just 80 total yards and four first downs.

"It's the second game with bunch of ninth graders, so you kind of expect some mistakes," Muleshoe coach Randy Adair said. "But I was extremely encouraged about our play. Our defense was impressive.'

Quarterback Matt McClanahan, who rushed for 48 yards and completed 9-of-11 passes for 34 yards, set up the Mules' best scoring chance when he returned a punt 25 yards to the Mustang 20-yard line early the third quarter. Denver City went three and out after bobbling the secondkickoff and begining at its 11.

Two running plays left the Mules third-and-three from the 13, but a holding penalty and a sack killed the drive.

McClanahan, under constant pressure, was sacked three times.

"We had some personnel mismatches which caused some problems protecting the passer," Adair said. "They were stunting their linebackers on almost every play and it's hard for young players to pick up stunts and blitzes in the line."

field position, the Mules wasted another chance to get on the board four minutes into the fourth quarter when a Justin Cleavinger punt and solid coverage pinned the Mustangs at their 11.

A second down sack by inside linebacker Greg Pena left the Mustangs with a third and-20 at the one.

But a 17-yard run by quarterback Steve Corn got the Mustangs out of the shadow of their own goal posts and into more comfortable punting position.

Muleshoe limited Denver City to 42 total yards until the final drive of the game, when the Mustangs drove to Mules'

Mustangs back 10 yards before time ran out.

Corn completed two passes to running back Kyle Ivy for 37 yards in the drive.

"I think we looked a lot better on defense than they did," Adair said. "We stuffed them, while it was more of a case of us shooting ourselves in the foot on offense."

Muleshoe was bottled up in its own in the first half, with two drives halted by fumbles and another ended with a blocked which Denver City recovered at the Mules' 18 two minutes into the game.

Muleshoe forced two turnovers. Yoel Reyes forced a fumble which Justin Lee recovered early in the second quarter, and cornerback Kyle McDaniel intercepted a pass on the Mustangs' next drive.

Cleavinger caught four passes for 21 yards.

The Muleshoe freshmen play at Lubbock Cooper at 5:30 p.m. Sept. 21.



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

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

PROPOSITION NO. 11

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, rhich amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as openspace agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature.'

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

PROPOSITION NO. 14

If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the

residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person.
