

Mules' upset bid falls short, 17-14

DENVER CITY — Muleshoe High School wrestled firsthand Friday night the difference between a good team and a mediocre one.

Mistakes.

Good teams just don't make them.

Playing near flawless football and capitalizing on several Muleshoe mistakes, Denver City held on to beat the Mules, 17-14, on Tony McCray's 28-yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter.

The first of three fourth-quarter fumbles by the Mules set up the winning kick.

Taking over at Muleshoe's 47, Denver City quarterback Josh Smith spotted McCray isolated on a linebacker and hit the wingback with a perfect pass down the left sideline for a 26-yard gain.

After picking up another first down, the drive stalled at the 11. Denver City had its regular offense on the field on fourth down, but the Denver City coaching staff changed

its mind after calling a timeout.

Muleshoe misplayed the ensuing kickoff and Denver City recovered at the 35. The Mustangs ran almost five minutes off the clock before turning the ball over on downs with 2:23 left.

Muleshoe (0-2) managed one first down before fumbling away its last chance.

"We've improved so much since the first game (a 42-6 loss to Portales) and that vastly outweighs some of the errors we made tonight," Muleshoe coach Randy Adair said. "And they did a good job of taking advantage of what we gave them. And we gave them some opportunities we shouldn't have."

Muleshoe played well on both sides of the ball in the first half, putting together several sustained drives engineered by senior quarterback Alfredo Gonzales with the help of some creative play calling that kept the Mustangs off balance.

The Mules barely touch the

ball in the second half (13 plays) as Denver City pounded away at a tiring Mule defense.

Muleshoe took a 7-6 lead

midway through the second quarter on a 33-yard pass from Alfredo Gonzales to Jesse Gonzales (no relation) to com-

plete a 14-play, 67-yard drive. Alfredo Gonzales took a one-step drop, and hit Jesse

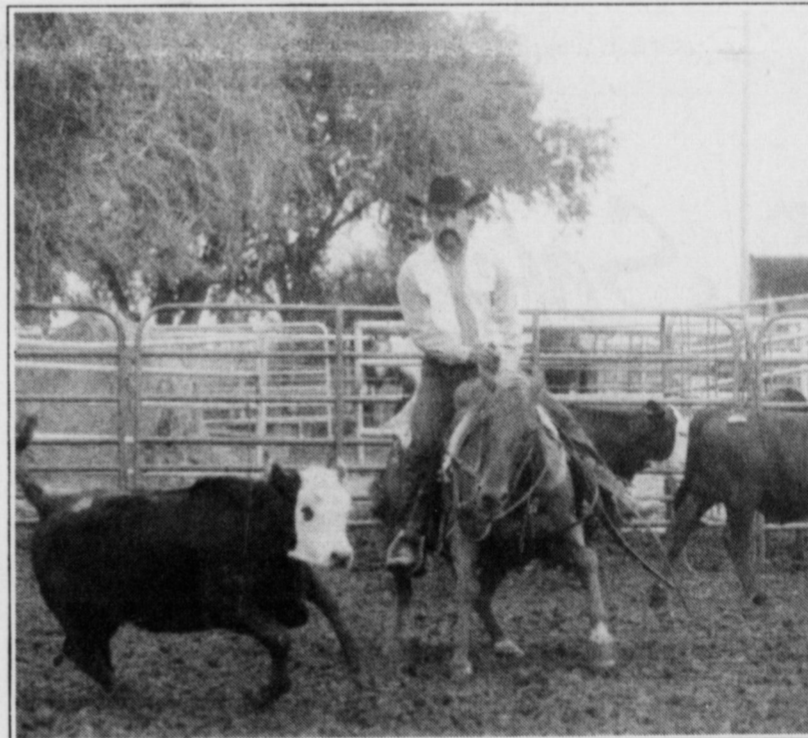

Local lady okay after bout with rattlesnake

Peggy Bates of Muleshoe got an unpleasant surprise last Wednesday while working in her yard.

While reaching down to move some debris, she felt a sharp sting and heard the chilling sound of a rattlesnake.

Although she could not see the snake, her hand immediately began to swell and hurt.

Her husband Jack Bates drove her to the Muleshoe Area Medical Center from their rural home south of Muleshoe for emergency treatment.

By the time she arrived, she was in a lot of pain, nauseous and her hand was extremely swollen. She was treated with anti-venom at MAMC and transferred to Lubbock, where she is hospitalized. Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks said

A&M researchers develop mite resistant corn line

In a development that could revolutionize insect control in Texas Panhandle-South Plains and other High Plains corn production regions, a Texas A&M University researcher has developed a corn line that is resistant to the dreaded spider mite.

The new corn line is "TAM-MITE 1." It was developed by Dr. Tom Archer, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock. It is a white seeded, full season corn that flowers about 90 days after planting. Archer says the seed line germplasm is being

released to commercial seed companies this fall.

"We expect the seed companies to breed the TAM-MITE 1 germplasm with their best lines to develop commercial, mite resistant hybrids for growers," says Archer. "That means the mite resistant seed

should be available to growers in about three years."

Archer's research was funded primarily from the Texas half-cent bushel corn checkoff, which is administered by the Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB).

"TCPB and the state's grow-

ers have helped fund corn insect research and other research programs since 1977," says Carl King, TCPB executive director. "These outstanding research results we're seeing from Dr. Archer and others

Farm, Ranch Safety Week declared in Bailey County

At the request of Bailey County Farm Bureau President Donald Puckett of Muleshoe, County Judge Marilyn Cox has proclaimed Sept. 17-23 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Bailey County.

This year marks the 52nd annual observance of National Farm Safety and Health Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The theme of National Farm Safety and Health Week for this year is "Sow the Seeds of Health... Practice Safety."

Emphasis is being placed on better technology, safe work practices and education.

The proclamation states that Americans should be concerned about agricultural production and its global importance.

wouldn't be possible without the tremendous support shown by growers in the voluntary check-off program."

Mites are primarily a problem in semi-arid regions of the Great Plains and Mexico. They feed on corn leaves. When dry summers combine with hot temperatures, mite populations can explode in numbers and severely damage corn yields.

Pesticides, namely Capture from FMC and Comite from Uniroyal, have been used for effective mite control at a cost of \$20-\$30 per acre per application. Archer believes that with the development of the new mite resistant corn, growers will have much less dependence on the pesticides.

Archer's mite-resistant seed research is a joint effort with Dr. Frank Peairs of Colorado State University and Dr. John Mihm of CIMMYT, the international corn and wheat re-

search center in Mexico City. In the studies, the resistant seed was tested in Texas, Colorado and Mexico. It consistently showed high resistance to both two-spotted mite and the Banks grass mite.

In Archer's 1993-94 Texas research, TAM-MITE 1 was crossed with two popular seed lines which are susceptible to mites. The hybrid seed was grown and compared to susceptible seed lines. The resistance of the seed lines was rated in a scale of 1 to 10 for feeding damage by mites, with 10 being 100% damage.

In one comparison the first TAM-MITE 1-cross scored a 3, or 30% damage, far below the economic threshold where corn is significantly damaged. That compared to a rating of 7, or 70% damage from the susceptible line. Similar results were seen in the second comparison,

Gonzales (who went in motion) just as he turned up field.

Gonzales kept the drive alive with a seven-yard screen pass to wide receiver Daniel Garbarino on third-and-five at the Mustang 42.

Gonzales was 6-of-12 for 81 yards in the first half. Gonzales was 7-of-14 for 95 yards for the game and added 24 yards rushing.

But Denver City responded with a scoring drive of its own, marching 68 yards on 12 plays with Smith hooking up with McCray on a 28-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-15. Smith then hit a wide open David Carillo in the corner of the end zone for the PAT which gave the Mustangs a 14-7 half-time lead.

It didn't last long as Garbarino fielded the second half kickoff at the 22, motored across the field to the right sideline, picked up a block by

Alfredo Gonzales at the Denver City 45, and raced into the end zone untouched.

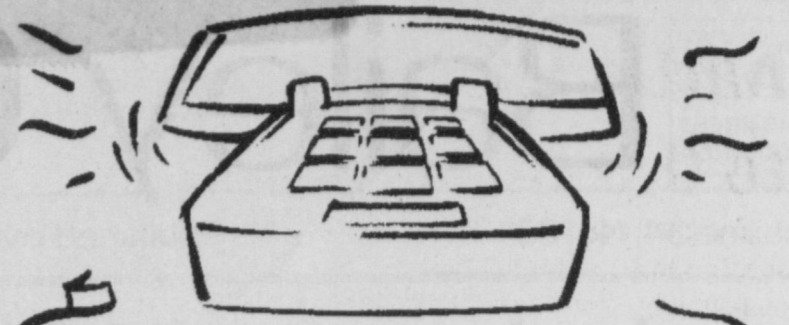
It was one of the few chances Garbarino had to show his game-breaking ability as the Mustangs were determined to take him out of the game by double teaming him on almost every play.

Smith, probably the best quarterback Muleshoe will face all year, gave Denver City a 6-0 lead by capping an 80-yard drivewith a 12-yard run.

Smith was 6-for-18 for 98 yards (4-of-6 for 64 yards in the first half) and added a game-high 54 yards rushing.

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Freshmen battle DC to 0-0 tie

The good news is the Muleshoe freshmen posted their second-straight shutout, holding Denver City to 66 total yards and four first downs.

The bad news is the Mules didn't fare much better against an aggressive Mustang defense in a 0-0 tie in a freshman football game here Thursday.

The Mules (1-0-1), plagued by turnovers and penalties, managed just 80 total yards and four first downs.

"It's the second game with bunch of ninth graders, so you kind of expect some mistakes," Muleshoe coach Randy Adair said. "But I was extremely encouraged about our play. Our defense was impressive."

Quarterback Matt McClanahan, who rushed for 48 yards and completed 9-of-11 passes for 34 yards, set up the Mules' best scoring chance when he returned a punt 25 yards to the Mustang 20-yard line early the third quarter. Denver City went three and out after bobbling the second-kickoff and beginning at its 11. Two running plays left the Mules third-and-three from the 13, but a holding penalty and a sack killed the drive.

McClanahan, under constant pressure, was sacked three times.

"We had some personnel mismatches which caused some problems protecting the passer," Adair said. "They were stunting their linebackers on almost every play and it's hard for young players to pick up stunts and blitzes in the line."

In a game dominated by

field position, the Mules wasted another chance to get on the board four minutes into the fourth quarter when a Justin Cleavinger punt and solid coverage pinned the Mustangs at their 11.

A second down sack by inside linebacker Greg Pena left the Mustangs with a third-and-20 at the one.

But a 17-yard run by quarterback Steve Corn got the Mustangs out of the shadow of their own goal posts and into more comfortable punting position.

Muleshoe limited Denver City to 42 total yards until the final drive of the game, when the Mustangs drove to Mules' 28-yard line with 14 seconds left. A holding penalty set the

Mustangs back 10 yards before time ran out.

Corn completed two passes to running back Kyle Ivy for 37 yards in the drive.

"I think we looked a lot better on defense than they did," Adair said. "We stuffed them, while it was more of a case of us shooting ourselves in the foot on offense."

Muleshoe was bottled up in its own in the first half, with two drives halted by fumbles and another ended with a blocked kick Denver City recovered at the Mules' 18 two minutes into the game.

Muleshoe forced two turnovers. Yoel Reyes forced a fumble which Justin Lee recovered early in the second quarter, and cornerback Kyle

McDaniel intercepted a pass on the Mustangs' next drive.

Cleavinger caught four passes for 21 yards.

The Muleshoe freshmen play at Lubbock Cooper at 5:30 p.m. Sept. 21.

What, I ask, with breath He gave, can I give the Giver? Tell me, pray!

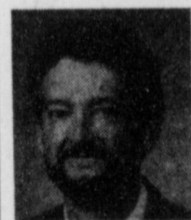
Can I enrich, impress, indebt, the Author of Life with the offer of my love?

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for a owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was charged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10%-30%	\$ 5,000
30%-50%	\$ 7,500
50%-70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

Our thanks to the Mary Martha Sunday School Class of the First Baptist Church for their donation to the Healthcare Center.


