

Since the introduction of typewriting machines and their universal acceptance by the business world, it has been the aim of inventors everywhere to produce a typewriter capable of use on books of record and on insurance policies and other large the attempts that have been made to bring about a practical machine of this character, two obstacles have seemed insuperable, viz.: Intricacy and great expense. Both of these barriers have now been overcome by an inventor of New York. For upward of six years he has expended all of his inventive and mechanical energy and many thousands of dollars in perfecting his machine.

Only three of these typewriters have thus far been exhibited. It bears but slight resemblance to any of the standard typewriters in use, weighing but ten pounds and being built on simple and compact lines. The key-board is disk-shaped and contains eighty celluloid keys, the arrangement of which brings those keys striking vowels and other much-used letters and characters immediately under the hands of the operator. A noticeable feature, also, is the ribbon attachment for writing with ink of any desired color. The emoval of a black ribbon, for instance, and the substitution of a red, purple or green ribbon is accomplished with both ease and celerity. The machine will receive a book of any required width or thickness, will write a ong line or short, and is so devised that the distance between lines may be scaled to suit the amount of space at hand or the fancy of the operator.

In this new machine perfectly flat platens, separate from the feed rollers, have been introduced, and where several copies of any manuscript are required a platen made of brass is used. This gives a hard, unyielding surface for the type to strike against, and the last copy of a dozen or fifteen is as plain as the first. If but one copy is to be made the turn of a handscrew substitutes a hard rubber platen suitable for the purpose. Thus, while it is essentially a book-writing machine, its scope of utility includes the work done by all other typewriters in general, and a single sheet of note paper séems quite at home between its rollers as a double-entry ledger.

THE SUGAR TRUSTS BRAZ-EN BLUFF.

The shutting down of the refineries of the Sugar Trust is simply an attempt to prevent the Senate from passing the free-sugar bill which was passed by the House of Representatives at the last session. The Trust magnates are aware that a determined effort will be made at the coming session to fulfil Democratic pledges in the matter of the free raw material bills, of which free sugar is one. Their game is to get up a scare that will furnish an excuse for obstruction to their henchmen in the Senate.

In spite of this or any other scheme they may concoct the duty of the legislature. A change is of the Senate is clear. The freesugar bill ought to be passed with out delay. In 1881 he testified: "I do not see why, under free trade in sugar, we could not supply a very large proportion of the world's consumption." In 1888 he testi- al. fied that 100,000 tons of refined sugar had been exported from this country during the year 1887.

I while foreign refineries have remained starionary, the American Sugar Trust has greatly improved its plant and meth\_ ods. It now commands the situation in this country. It has made its owners millionares. It bas, on the confession allowed and then the order came to of its President and its Treasurer, bribed both political parties. It has bough: legislation by deals that have disgraced the Senate and provoked the people to an outburst of indignation before which the Democratic party went down for the sins of its betrayers.

The Trust has increased the margin of profits of the business of refining sugar from 82 cents per 100 pounds in 1891 to about \$1.15. It has capitalized a plant worth about \$10,000,000 at 75,000,000, and issued \$10,000,000 in bonds. Not a dollar of the \$75,000,000 was paid in money. The only working capital of the Trust was the \$10,000,000 borrowed on bonds. This statement is based on the report of the London experts who examined the books of the Trust. On this capitalization the old Trust paid 27.5 per cent, in 1888 and 23 9 per cen'. in 1889. In 1892 the present Trust paid 150 per cent on its total actual investment of \$10,000,000-the rea! value of its plant. In 1893 it paid 155 per cent. It has been estimated by the Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin that the real profit of the Trust is about 220 per cent.. or \$22,000,000.

The stock of this profitable monopoly is held by the Havemeyers, John O. Searles, Spreckles, Matthiessen and a few others who carry on the business and some stock gamblers. Mr. H. O. Havemeyer and Mr. Matthiessen, according to sworn testimony in the New York Supreme Court, controlled \$31,000,000 of the \$35,000,000 of stock that constituted the capital before \$25,000,000 of new stock was issued to Spreckles

These sugar magnates have grown to be multi-millionares since the formation of the Trust, and they propose to still further advance their fortunes by preventing the repeal of the law which they forced through the senate, and which imposes heavy taxes on the people in ever.
