Miss Jameson On Air Tour

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Sept. 26 — Famed woman flyer, Edna Gardner Whyte of Fort Worth, Texas, has registered for the Fourth Annual All Texas Air Tour, October 11-18, to help publicize the 1953 March of Dimes drive, one of the main purposes of the tour this year. Mrs. Whyte has just completed two months volunteer service as a nurse for infantile paralysis victims in Dallas. She will be sponsored by the Texas Chapter of Ninety-Nines, Inc., an international organization of women pilots which was founded in 1929 with Amelia Earhart as its first president.

Other members of the Ninety-nines who have registered for the tour are Miss Ama Lee Jameson of Brackettville; Mrs. Martha Ann Reading of Dallas; Mrs. Mary Ann Greer of San Antonio; Mrs. Josephine (Grandma) Allison, pilot, and Miss Doris Weller, co-pilot, both of Dallas; Mrs. Ruby Hays, pilot, and Mrs. Ann Duthie, navigator, both of El Paso. Shahan Angus Ranch of Brackettville will sponsor Miss Jameson and Southwest Airmotive of Dallas will sponsor Mrs. Allison, the Flying Grandmother of last year's tour. Out of state members of the Ninety-nines who have requested registration blanks for the tour are Mrs. Mildred D. Hurt of Indianapolis, Indiana; Mrs. Bernese M. Brand of Redwood Falls, Minnesota; Miss Mary Jane Sasla of Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Loretta Slavick of Kirkwood, Missouri; and Miss June Walsh of St. Louis, Missouri, who has been awarded a fellowship by the Ford Foundation for a years work in Aviation Psychology and Education at the University of Illinois.

The National Flying Farmers organization will be represented on the tour by E. M. (Tex.)

Anderson of Medina, National President; Fred Triplett of Hillsboro, National Secretary and President of the Texas Flying Farmers; Mrs. C. E. Boyd, Jr., of Sugar City, Colorado, National Flying Farmer Queen; and Jack Galbraith of Wichita, Kansas, head of the National Insurance Division of the Flying Farmers.

The aviation industry will be represented on the tour by a helicopter furnished by Bell Aircraft of Fort Worth, and Chance Vought of Dallas has entered a plane piloted by John Willey of Dallas who will distribute 20,000 lithograph pictures of their Cutlas and Corsair planes at the airports in the 42 towns scheduled to be visited on the week-long 3,000-mile tour.

The air tour members will participate in a coast-to-coast Mutual broadcast featuring Smiley Whitney's band at their first overnight stop at Circle-R Sky Ranch, Medina, Texas, Saturday, October 11.

O.P.S. Cites Records Rules

Some merchants are required to retain specified merchandising records although the merchandise itself may be exempt from price control, district Office of Price Stabilization officials said today.

Citing an example, O.P.S. pointed out that shoes recently were exempted from price control, but certain records still must be preserved by the merchant under O.P.S. amended regulations.

Good Advice From State Health Officer

AUSTIN, Oct. 8 — Poor eyesight can make a child "slow" in school. Uncorrected visual defects can cause a normally bright youngster to dislike school, fall behind his class and become self-conscious about playing sports and games, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

A child will rarely complain about poor vision. It may be blurred, he may see double, yet in three cases out of four, he will not tell anyone because he does not know how well he should see. That is why it is so important for parents and teachers to know the symptoms of eye trouble. An intelligent child may be victimized by poor vision both at school and with his playmates.

Too often a youngsters' eyes are neglected because no one knows that they will need care, Dr. Cox points out. For this reason, visual tests should be continued throughout the child's school career.

Some of the symptoms which may mean that a youngster has eye trouble are:

1. Rubs eye often, attempts to brush away blur.
2. Becomes irritable when doing close work.
3. Blinks more than usual, stumbles or trips over small objects.
4. Is over-sensitive to light; can't play games requiring distance vision.
5. Red-rimmed, encrusted or swollen eye lids.

When any of these symptoms are present, those responsible for the child's condition should have his eyes examined at once. Early correction will save many days of unpleasantness and possibly blindness.

Texas Ranks Fourth

AUSTIN, Sept. 29. — Almost every other Texan has an automobile.

The state now ranks fourth in automobile population of the nation, with some 3,400,000 registered, according to information compiled by the Texas Good Roads Association. These automobiles, plus the trucks and buses, drive a total of more than 81 million miles a day.

At present only New York, Pennsylvania and California have more automobiles than Texas. In the last ten years this state's population has increased 20 per cent but its automobile population has increased nearly 100 per cent.

Texas now has 44,000 miles of improved highways for these automobiles to drive on. Nearly half of that amount is in the farm-to-market road system. Urban expressways total less than 100 miles, while safe four-lane highways now total approximately 1,000 miles.

If all the automobiles in Texas were lined up bumper to bumper, they would form a line 13,000 miles long.

O.P.S. Extends Food Price Posting

The O.P.S. community pricing program, featuring display of ceiling price posters in grocery stores, is expected to be extended within a few weeks to most counties in Texas, O.P.S. said today.

Grocers in Bexar, Galveston and Harris counties and in a number of North Texas counties began displaying the posters September 29 after receiving them by direct mail from O.P.S.

The posters list ceiling prices on more than 300 food items and enable shoppers to see at a glance the level maximum prices on those items. Simultaneously, the grocers are relieved of the job of figuring their own ceiling prices.

The posters do not list processed fruits and vegetables, on which ceiling prices were lifted recently by Congressional order, or fresh meats. Separate posters on meat prices are being planned for a later date.

Similar to a food pricing posting plan applied during World War II, community pricing is so named, O.P.S. said, because under it price ceilings are worked out by O.P.S. for local communities, or wholesale grocer trade areas on the basis of local wholesale costs.

Hunters Show Vast Increase

AUSTIN, Sept. 30. — The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission said the number of hunters and fishermen in the state has more than doubled since World War II.

He made the announcement in a speech before the International Association of Game Commissioners in Dallas.

The Executive Secretary added:

"It cannot be said that the wildlife population has improved to meet this demand. So far it has been met by lower bag limits and shorter harvest periods. There is an end to how far such curtailment can go and yet be satisfactory.

"The problem of the ever increasing number of sportsmen who go afield and cause an additional pressure on the wild-life resources has yet no answer. Everyone is encouraged to go hunting and fishing who will. It is the job of the professional conservationists to find ways and means and furnish leadership for maintaining the highest possible harvest so as to accommodate the maximum number of sportsmen."

The Executive Secretary noted that "it would not be well to say that wildlife work in Texas is poorly financed, but never has it been financially strong enough to accomplish more progressive management practices that those closer to the problems would like to see done." He went on to observe that "the work of wildlife conservation is as well financed as the people of the state want it to be and will be improved at such time as public sentiment sees the need for it, and this without pleading from the Commission itself."

The recent introduction of new Bible versions by both the Catholic and the Protestant clergy was received with considerable acclamation by the people of the nation, sometime with ceremonies and under conditions considered appropriate to the solemnity of the occasion. In both of these new modern versions, care was taken that nothing would be detracted from the historical and the factual recordings of this Book of Books. The purpose of all concerned was to make it a more understandable and easily readable book, and in this city they seem to have done remarkably well. There was considerable publicity given this event, and it appears to have awakened several millions of persons as to the significance of this new edition of the greatest of all Books.

Which is good. The trouble has been however not altogether that an edition was needed to induce people to read this Book, but to get them to read it anytime. There have been too few people who read this Book, much less study it and even less follow its precepts. It will be a mighty thing for the good of mankind if more people read the new version now, and even then take time to study it or at least meditate over it. Even reading the Book does wonders for the one who reads it, that is provided that at least the New Testament is read all the way through. There is no substitute for the word of God, who is Light and the Way, whereas, as those who have rejected have found out, otherwise there is nothing but darkness and ignorance and lack of life. If you want to do some good reading, just pick up a New Bible, and read, and see what you have been missing in the way of living. We hope millions of copies more than had been, will be read and studied, and more people will have it in their homes — for good purposes and to study, and not like the publicans, for show.

The reason why voting in the Soviet Union is so nice and peaceful is very evident — there is no opposition and no one dares say anything about the top guys.

Contact with a Social Security Representative at age 65 is important to practically every age earner of self employed person in Kinney County according to John K. The Del Rio & Winter Garden Telephone Company has been installing a considerable number of new poles in their local phone installation.

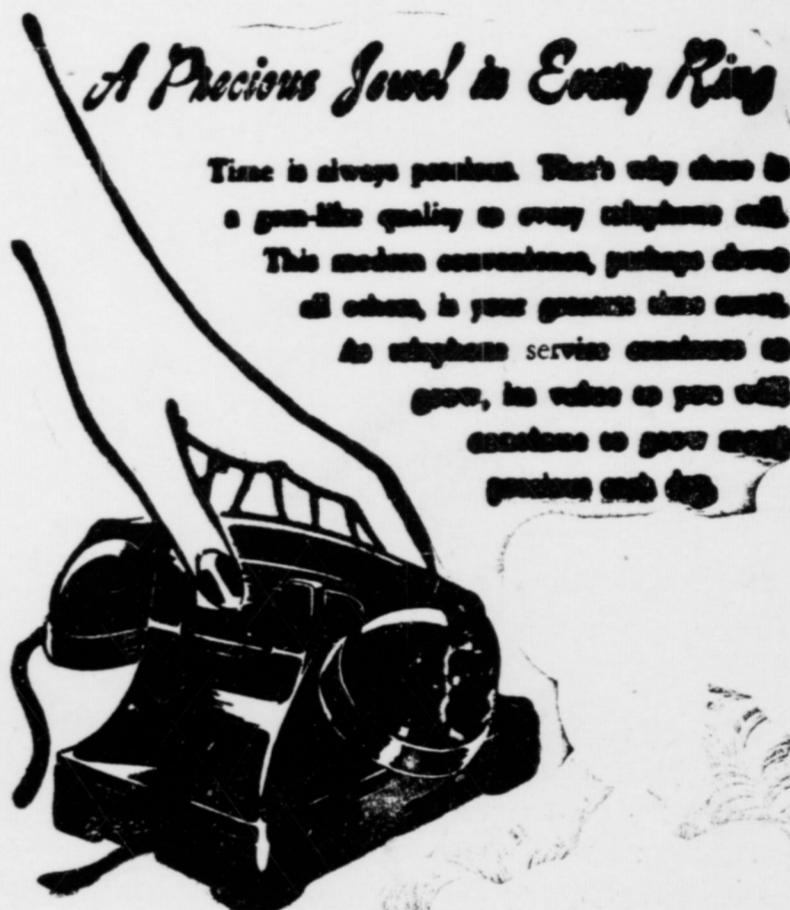

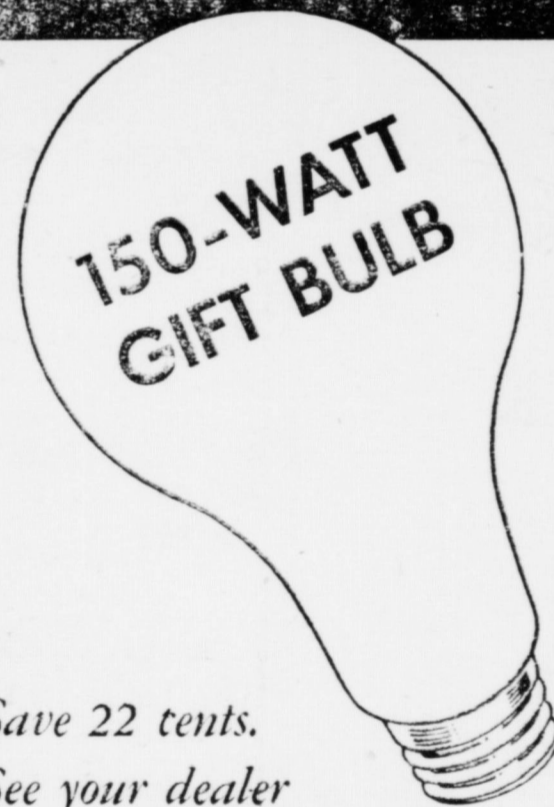

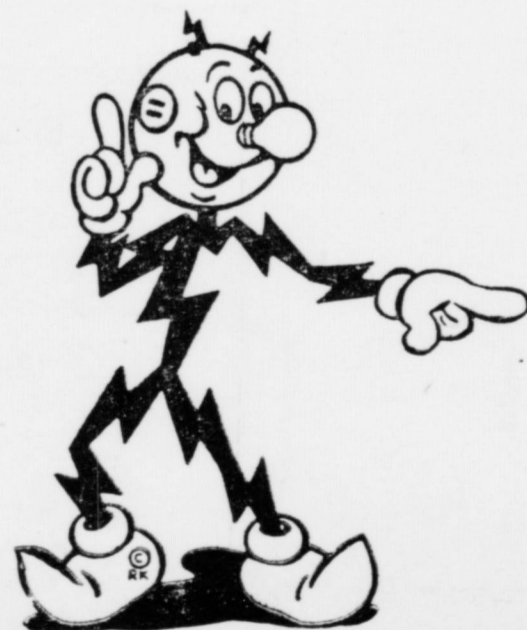
