### Cheers! City finds beer vats

City Manager James Fisher was surprised to learn that two beer vats were among the surplus items that the City of Muleshoe hopes to sell during a Aug. 22 auction.

After all, Muleshoe has been a dry town since the day in was incorporated in 1926.

The vats were among hundreds of surplus items stockpiled in the city storage warehouse, most apparently purchased by former City Manager Dave Marr.

Marr was infamous for bargain shopping at government surplus sales, according to co-workers.

"I don't even know what a beer vat looks like," Fisher admitted. "There's a lot of stuff out there we really don't know what it is and why it is there."

Other city-owned discoveries included a snowplow blade, a sundeck for a pool, two crates of Army tent poles and camouflage netting.

"Not everything out there is junk," Fisher said. "There's a lot of good things out there, but we just don't know what to do with it."

The city recently passed ordinances designed to cleanup Muleshoe, so officials thought they better examined their own lots, Fisher said.

Cheers for the city clean up effort.

### Early voting turnout light

Early voting for Proposition 1 ended on Aug. 5 had only a small amount of Bailey County residents casting ballots.

The Aug. 9 Constitutional Amendment election proposes raising the homestead exemption for school property taxes from \$5,000 to \$15,000. Also taxpayers 65 and over could transfer their tax rate, which is "frozen" at that age, if they purchase a new home.

The increased exemption, if passed, would mean a savings of \$140 in property taxes for average Texas homeowner.

A total of 71 Bailey County residents took advantage of early voting, which included 12 mail-in votes. There are 3,753 registered voters in the county.

The general election was held Saturday.

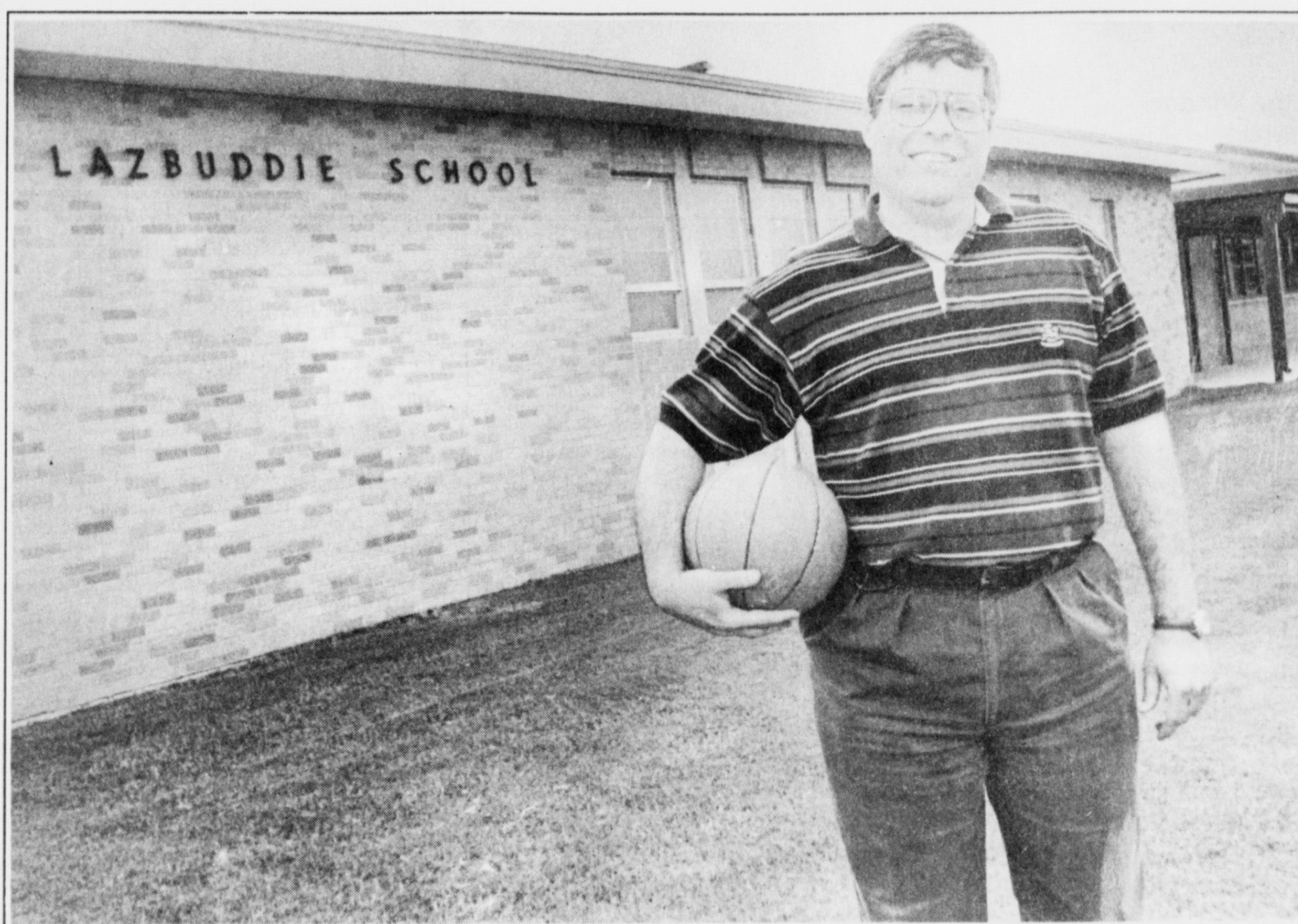

## PULLING DOUBLE DUTY

### ■ Lazbuddie superintendent will coach boys basketball

LAZBUDDIE — Phil Warren will work with a chalkboard in addition to a school board this winter.

Warren, superintendent of the Lazbuddie Independent School District, will serve as interim boys high school basketball coach for the Longhorns for at least this season.

In his eighth year as Lazbuddie superintendent, Warren said he will stay on as coach until a suitable replacement

is found.

The double duty has raised a few eyebrows among his peers.

"A lot of them think I'm crazy," said Warren, who coached Texas high school basketball for 12 years before moving into administration.

He said he misses the day-to-day contact with the kids, but will relinquish coaching duties as soon as a suitable replacement is found.

Warren replaces Gary Grahn, whose coaching contract wasn't renewed this

spring.

Grahn averaged 20 wins a year in his five years at Lazbuddie, but several parents and school board members grew tired of emotional sideline outbursts and felt he was too tough on his players.

Warren agreed.

"He needed to be more positive with the kids," Warren said. Grahn also got thrown out of a game last year after

## Wood happy with turnout

John Irwin sounds like a fog-horn in the early morning mist. "There's way too much walking," Irwin bellows at several players slow to join the defensive huddle. "Take pride in your huddle."

Irwin, one of two new Muleshoe High School assistant football coaches, knows all about pride after spending more than 20 years on the Clovis High School coaching staff before coming to Muleshoe this year.

"He's already had a major impact," said Muleshoe head coach David Wood Thursday after the Mules' second day of preseason practice. "He brings so much experience and enthusiasm."

Wood is in his second year at the helm of a sunken Muleshoe program that bottomed out with an 0-10 season in 1995.

A total of 79 high school players showed up Wednesday

for the first of two-a-days, 15 more than last year.

"It's a great number," said defensive coordinator Flint Bigham said, noting that more than a dozen of the 64 players that showed up last year quit in the first two days. "I don't think any of the kids that are here now are going to be leaving."

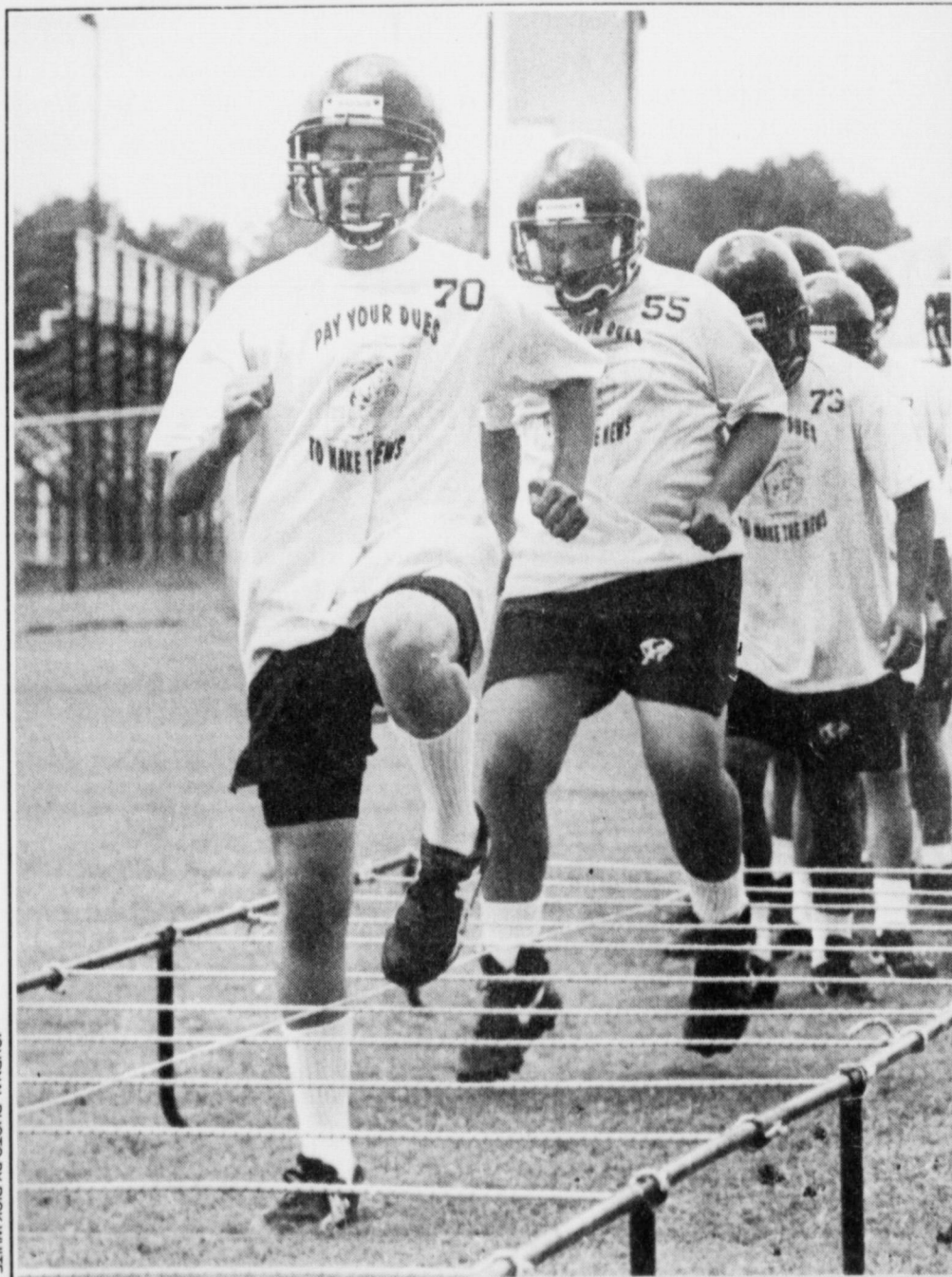
Wood said players came back stronger and in good shape.

"But what I liked more than anything else was their attitudes. They came back more focused and really seemed to be putting out an effort," Wood said.

The Mules will strap on the pads Monday after four days on non-contact work.

"It's fun to get started, but the real football doesn't start until you put the pads on," Wood said. "That first day with pads is the ultimate."

## A dancing scarecrow dreams of fishing

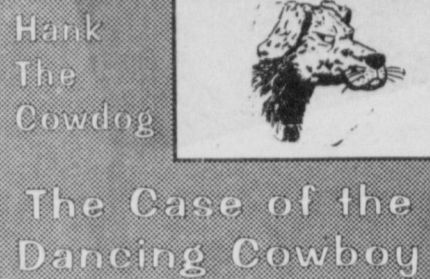

• Get rid of unnecessary paper to be organized for school

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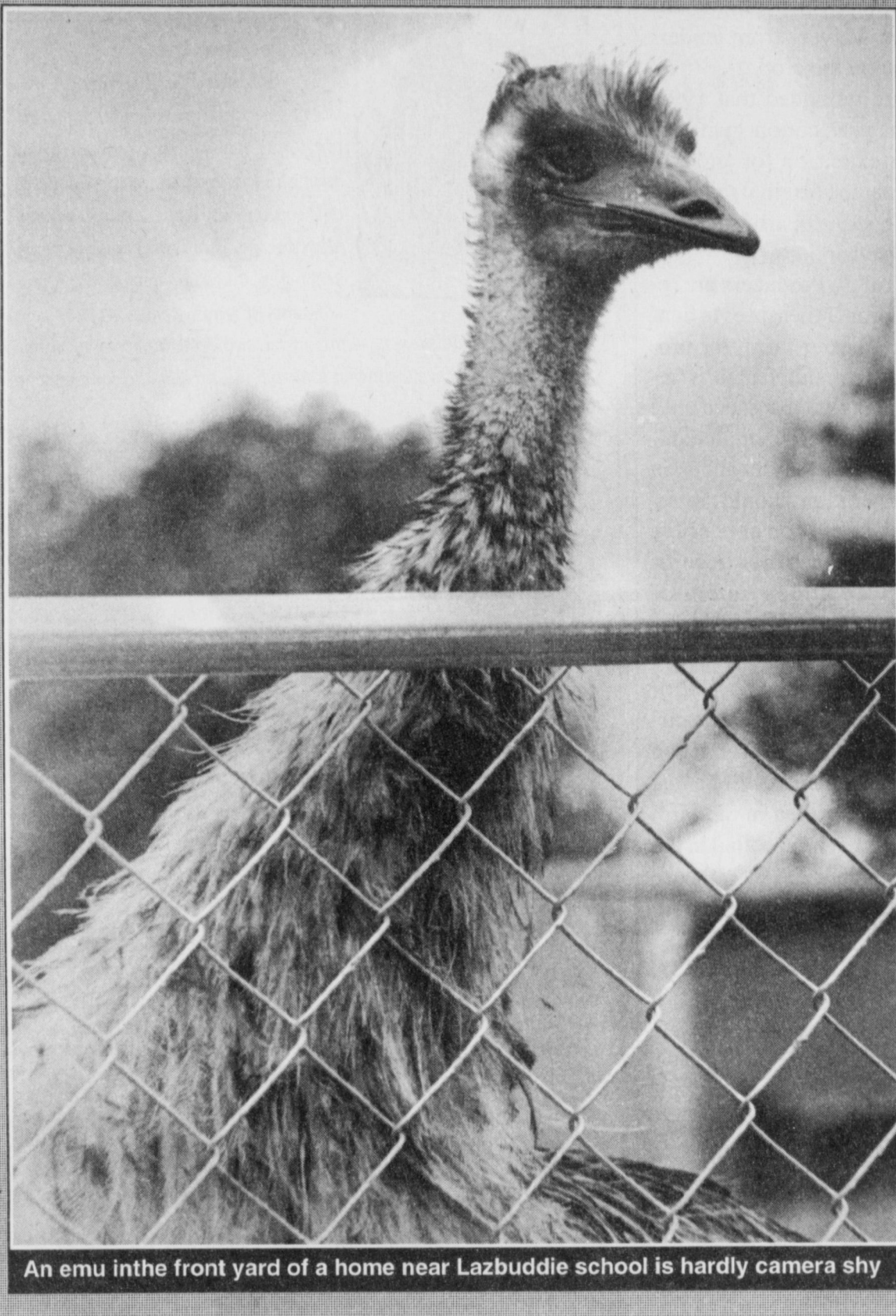

## Health of children declining

HOUSTON — Chances are, when children return to school this fall, they will be among a growing population of physically unfit youths.

"Children and teenagers are increasingly obese and are not as physically active as their counterparts in previous decades," said Dr. Pat Vehrs, an adolescent health expert at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

"National surveys show that since the 1960s, but especially in the last decade, there has been an increase in the percentage of body fat and a decrease in physical activity among youth," said Vehrs, who says 21 percent of children ages 6 to 17 are obese.

Vehrs cites such probable causes as:

- Parents who work asking their kids to stay home until they come home. This encourages inactivity by limiting them to indoor pursuits.

- Little or no family physical activities. Often parents are too tired when they come home to walk, shoot baskets or bike with their kids.

- Increased popularity of "entertainment-by-computer" or television versus old-fashioned playing outdoors.

- Fear of neighborhood crime.

- Lack of sidewalks, well-lit streets, access to parks, gyms or pools in suburban areas.

- Age requirements or rules requiring a guardian's presence at health clubs.

"It's not surprising that kids

find it difficult to remain physically active," said Vehrs. "They are not getting enough encouragement from their parents and society."

Neither may they be getting much help at school, he said, where physical education courses are increasingly considered an elective.

"Even if they enroll in Physical Education (P.E.) classes are usually less than an hour. By the time they've changed clothes, gotten into the gym and taken roll, there is very little actual time left for physical activity," he said.

Vehrs states that 70 percent of high school students are physically active for less than 20 minutes during P.E.. Enrollment in P.E. declines as grade levels increase. Only 10 percent of 12th graders are enrolled in daily P.E., says Vehrs.

"This takes a toll far larger than just being in shape. Studies have shown that physical fitness can improve self-esteem, body image, academic performance and improve energy levels," said Vehrs.

Parents are key to motivating children to become physically active.

"One of the best ways to get kids to exercise is to become involved yourself," he said.

"Kids love to exercise with their parents. Whether it walking, biking, swimming, tennis or just sharing time on the treadmill — if you are enthused, they will become enthused."

Other ways to build-in physical fitness are letting your

kids ride their bikes to school or walk it is safe, encouraging them to play at recess, keeping exercise equipment in the house -- not the garage, looking for church- or other agency-sponsored health camps or activities, and including P.E. course as a regular part of your child's curriculum.

"Above all, encourage them to do something they like. They will be more inclined to stick with it," said Vehrs.

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### Nominating petitions accepted through Oct. 27 for LLA-2 election

Nominating petitions will be accepted through October 27, for the LLA-2 community election. This will be for a three-year term. Frank Stegall is the current representative, and is eligible for re-election for a three-year term. In order to obtain a petition, please come by the Bailey County FSA Office. LLA-2 covers this area: East boundary, Hwy 214; West boundary, New Mexico State Line; North Boundary, Hwy 746 extending east to West on Hwy 214; and South boundary, Cochran County Line.

The County Office is asking for information on any minority producer groups located in the county. If you have any information, please contact this office. We encourage everyone to participate in the elections, and the first step is nominations.

**Emergency Loan Applications** — Bailey County is eligible for Farm Service disaster emergency loans, as of June 16 1997. Generally, that means that producers who have lost at least 30% of their production due to the snow storm that occurred on April 25, 1997, are eligible for FSA loans. Proceeds from crop insurance are taken into account when determining eligibility. FSA AG Credit Manager Joyce Thompson urges producers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications into the FSA Office as

soon as possible, rather than waiting until the deadline of February 16, 1998, to avoid backlogs. For more information call Thompson at (806) 272-4538.

**FSA Payments** — September 30 1997, is the deadline for submitting signatures and documentation for 1997 payments.

### Bailey County FSA News

Please check with this office and make sure we have all the information we need in order to process your payments. If this office does not have all information required by September 30, the payment will be delayed until the office can obtain authorization codes to issue the payments.

**CCC Commodity Loans** — To be eligible for price support loans and loan deficiency payments, including loans through an approved marketing cooperative or loan servicing agent, producers are required to certify and comply with acreage reporting, highly erodible and wetland certifications provisions. The 1997 loan rates are as follows:

Wheat \$2.65; Barley 1.82; Oats 1.19; Corn 2.25; Sorghum 3.57; Cotton .5170.

Producers wishing to put crops in the loan program need warehouse receipts

from the warehouse where the grain is stored, proof of prepayment of 9 months storage and lien waivers from lenders who have a lien on the crop.

Producers are reminded that 1996, and subsequent year cotton loans are not eligible for extension for an additional 8 months at the original maturity of the loan. The 1996 Farm Program repealed this provision.

**Weed Control** — Producers are reminded to take proper measures to control any weeds on your farm, for program purposes. If maintenance is required, no payments will be issued until necessary procedures are completed.

**Farm Records** — Any changes in your farming operation should be reported to this office as soon as possible in order for us to keep our records updated. This includes operator changes, ownership changes, address changes, ect.

**CRP Contacts Expiring** — Producers with CRP contracts that expiring on September 30 1997, are reminded that the history on the farm will be lost unless the farm is enrolled in the farm program. Farms must be enrolled in the program by December 1, 1997. Please contact this office for more information.

**Holiday** — The Bailey County FSA Office will be closed on Monday, September 1, 1997 in observance of Labor Day.

### EPA won't regulate farm air quality

Carol Browner, Environmental Protection Agency administrator, last week finalized the rules for the Clean Air Act.

New standards are now set for ozone and particulate matter (PM). EPA is required by law to review these standards every five years to determine whether the latest scientific research indicates a need to revise the standards.

Browner, testifying before the Senate Agriculture Committee, stated that the new scientific study supported stricter

requirements to the standards. As a result of this study, the final standard for ozone will be updated from 0.12 parts per million of ozone measured over one hour to a standard of 0.08 ppm measured over eight hours.

For particulate matter, EPA is adding new standards for particles smaller than 2.5 micrometers in diameter. EPA will keep the present rules that govern the PM-10 standards, but will change the criteria to add more flexibility for states

to meet the requirements for agriculture.

Browner assured the committee that the new standards—specially those for soot—would not harm farmers.

She stated, "These new air quality standards will not require any farmer to change the way he does his job."

Responding to questions from lawmakers, Browner went on to say, "EPA is not going to regulate farmers as a means of reducing fine particles in the air."

## MHS modifies block schedule

Muleshoe High School students will have to get up earlier this year if they expect to make it to school on time.

School for the whole student body begins at 8 a.m. this fall, 40 minutes earlier because Zero period was shifted from the beginning to the end of the day.

Zero period is used for tutorial sessions and extra-curricular activities.

Administrators hope moving Zero period will lead to better attendance because students will already be in school.

Some students had trouble making the morning sessions in the past, according to MHS Principal David Jenkins.

The length of the tutorial and activity period has also been increased from 20 to 35 minutes.

"A lot of teachers felt the tutorial period wasn't long to be effective," Jenkins said.

"Plus, by moving Zero period to the afternoon, we're not going to have to alter class schedules to hold pep rallies, assemblies or other special

school functions" Jenkins called the move an experiment.

"It's not etched in stone," he said.

Another schedule change is that athletic and band periods will be held every other day instead of daily.

Jenkins said the change will allow students more flexibility in choosing classes and activities.

"We were forcing kids to make decisions between one activity or another," Jenkins said.

The high school is in its fourth year of using a block schedule format, which has students taking eight classes (four a day) that meet every other day.

Classes are 90 minutes long, compared to traditional 45-50 minute classes.

Jenkins said a survey showed that kids "overwhelmingly liked the block schedule. He also said it also allows students to take more classes.

MHS offers 35-40 elective classes.

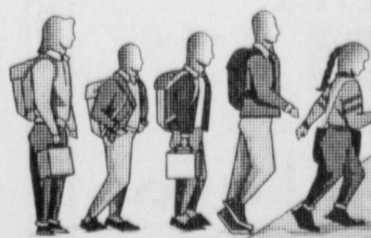

The early years are the best time for parents to lay the foundation for good study habits, said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"When it comes time to do homework, sit nearby with some work of your own," she said. "But remember that a child's attention span is shorter. A child will need short breaks more frequently."

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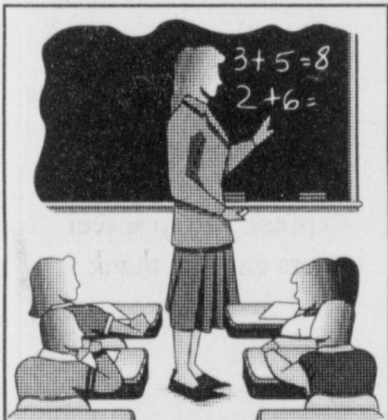

being warned not to under any circumstances, Warren said.

Grahn recently accepted a head coaching job at Ruidoso. NM High School.

There was no shortage of applications to fill the Lazbuddie post, but the most qualified candidates took jobs elsewhere.

Warren decided to take over last month.

"I felt it was the best choice we had at this point in time," Warren said.

The hope is that recently hired assistant coach Mark Hendrickson can take over in a year or two.

Hendrickson was a successful head coach at Lake Arthur (NM) High School.

The 46-year-old Warren coached several state playoff teams, guiding Whitharral to the state semifinals in the late 70s. He also had a succession of playoff teams at Stratford.

"I was burned out on coaching and ready to something

else," Warren said. "Money was also a factor."

Because of budget cuts this year, Warren asked several other district employees to take additional duties.

Warren said it only seemed logical that he did the same.

"My only worry is that people will think we're putting more emphasis on athletics," he said.

Coaching was good training ground for administration, Warren said.

"It's a pretty good place to learn how to make tough decisions," he said.

Warren didn't lose his competitiveness when he quit coaching.

Eager to brag on the school's academic success, he said Lazbuddie does as good a job educating people as any school in the state.

Lazbuddie has finished in the top four at the Class A state academic meet in each of the last five years.

"I'm a lot prouder of that than I am about winning 20 ball games," Warren said.

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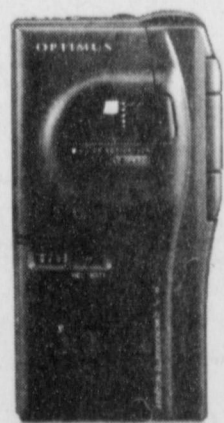

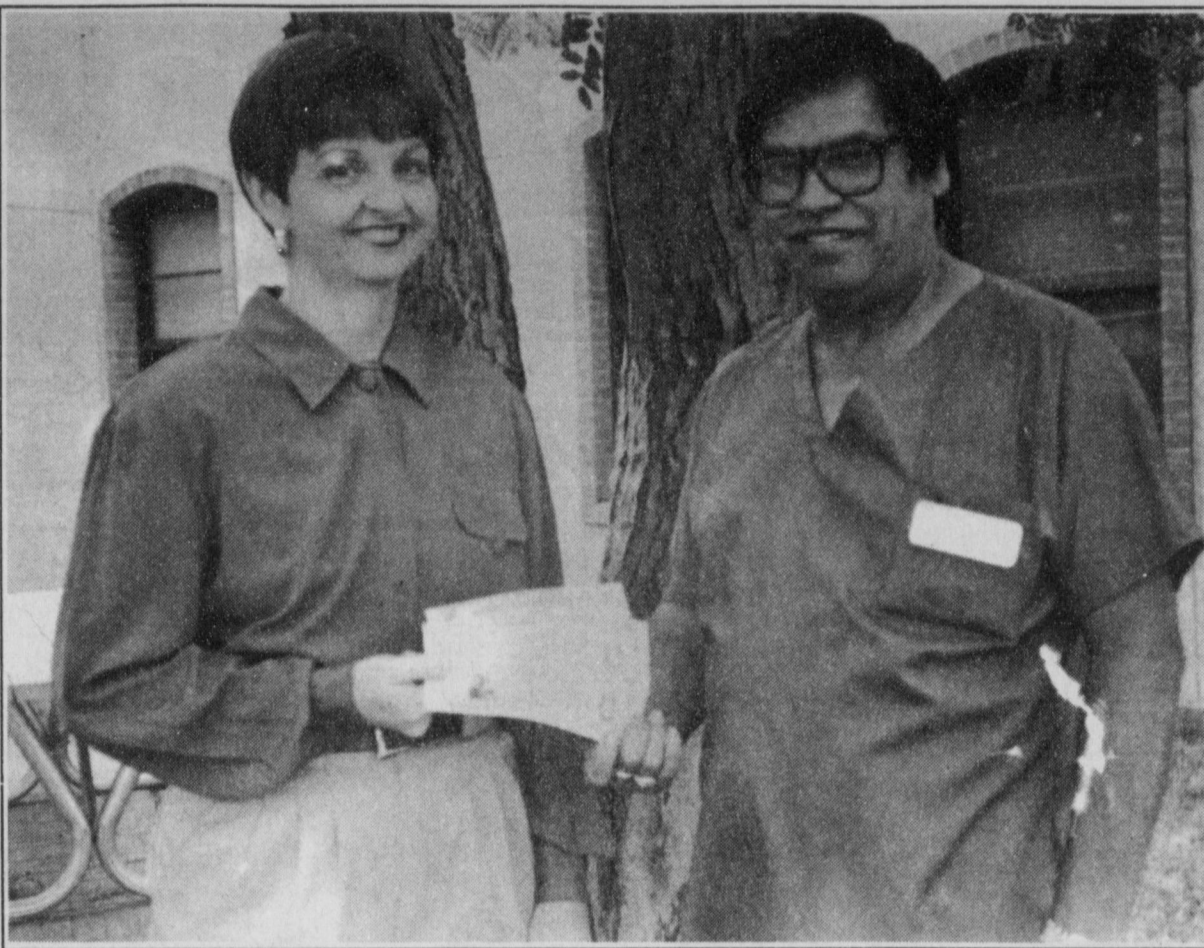
