### BHS One-Act Play to Perform Next Week

The cast and crew of the Borden County High School One-Act Play production of Nevermore! invites everyone to their community performance of their show this next Thursday, March 20th at 7:00 p.m. in the Borden County I.S.D. auditorium.

The community performance will be the final dress

rehearsal for the 19-member cast and crew as it prepares for its District 9-A, Zone 1 Contest set for Tuesday, March 25th. That performance will also be open to the public and will include productions from four other schools in the area.

The Zone Contest will begin at 3:00 p.m. on March 25th in the Borden County I.S.D. auditorium. Hermleigh High School's The Magician's Nephew will begin the contest and will be followed by productions by Ira High School (scenes from *The Playboy of* the Western World), Westbrook High School (Goodbye to the Clown), and Highland High School (scenes from Mrs.

Murray's Farm).

The BHS show will be the last to perform with an ap-

proximate starting time of 7:00 p.m. No late entries will be allowed, so be there early to ensure admittance.

The top two productions from the Zone Contest will advance to the District 9-A Contest to be held at Bronte High School on Thursday, March 27

The BHS production tells the story of classical American author Edgar Allan Poe, who wrote macabre mysteries in the early to mid-1800s. Poe's own death was as mysterious as his stories as he disappeared for several days before being found delirious on the streets of Baltimore. He died a couple of days later.

In the show, "Poe," (sophomore Eric Espinoza) is haunted by the characters of his own stories as they attempt to keep him separated from his en-deared "Annabel Lee" (senior Rachel Wilson). Captain Amos Nimrod (sophomore Brendan Tarleton) and Jeremiah Reynolds (freshman John Hensley) are the play's primary antagonists as they lead Poe toward an unfortunate



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



#### **Voting Machine**

The Democratic Run-off Election will be held on April 8, 2008. Counties with a population of less than 2,000 are exempt from the requirement of the use of electronic voting systems in which a federal office is not on the ballot (House Bill 556, passed 80<sup>th</sup> Legislature). A Voter with a disability may request an accessible electronic voting system (the Auto-Mark) by the 21<sup>st</sup> day before election day with Joyce Herridge, the early voting clerk.
