

## **USDA** Releases Upland **Cotton Average Prices** Received by Growers

Cumulative Upland cotton marketings for the first four months of the 2008-marketing year totaled 2.795 million-bales according to information released December 30, 2008 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service.

That figure is a significant 1.757 million bales less than the number of bales marketed through the same period last year and is indicative of cotton demand being dragged down by the serious economic issues facing the U.S. and

USDA estimated that November 2008 marketings were 978,000 bales with an average selling price of 53.1 cents per pound. Based on November's sales, and indications that worldwide market activity will continue to slow, December 2008 isn't expected to begin the process of reversing the current situation.

Based on the latest figures, the 2008 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price calcu-

### STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF BORDEN ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

'IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning is prohibited in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does prohibit outdoor burning activities including trash and outdoor grilling. Welding activities will be permitted when additional personnel are on site with firefighting equipment.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

BC's Cooley was a definite force in all areas of this game.

Offensively, Cooley ran for 2,480 yards and 47 touchdowns while also hauling in eight catches for 85 yards and five other scores. Defensively, Cooley finished with 121 tackles. On special teams, Cooley ran three kick off and two punt returns back for touchdowns.

"Michael's very deserving for the things which he did on both sides of the football,"

Richey said of Cooley.
"Look at his stats. He finished up with over 2,400 yards in a season where he really didn't get that many touches early on. He probably had as many carries in our last five games as he did during all of the regular season.'

Chapman was one of the big ringleaders on one of the top six-man defenses in the state. He finished with 200 tackles, five fumble recoveries, five caused fumbles, nine quarterback pressures, four QB sacks and two interceptions.

"Flynn grew up a ton in a year's time." Richey said of Chapman. "Flynn dedicated himself this season to getting faster and stronger. He also played this game with an atti-

'Flynn played this game like a middle linebacker's supposed to-he just dominated up front."

Richey was named as the top DII six-man coach after turning the Coyotes around from their 3-6 finish in 2007 to a 14-0 state championship

"You won't meet a coach who works any harder, "Cooley said of Richey. "He's been out her 17 years, so he knows what everybody can do and what they've got to do to get it done."

"You can't help but get pumped about doing something because of the way that he's as motivated as he is.

Chapman echoed Cooley's sentiments about their Six-Man Hall-of-Fame coach.

"He's a great motivator. He's all about setting goals, Chapman said. "We're going to reach those goals by doing whatever it takes."

Richey was proud to see as many of his players recognized in such strong fashion.
"Seasons like this don't hap-

pen if not everybody's doing their jobs." Richey said. "Michael and Flynn would both be the first ones to tell you that things like this don't happen to them without everybody else's support.

"This is just another capper to our dream season.

With players like Cooley and Chapman back to lead the Gail bandwagon do not be too surprised to see another banner season in that program in

"We're going to come back working even harder to see if we can't beat what the '97 team did out here," Cooley said.

The Coyotes won their first state six-man crown in 1997 before finishing as the state runners-ups in 1998.

Two of their current coaches, Fernando Baeza and Colt McCook, played integral parts on those teams.

"Coach Baeza kids us all of the time about them being better than what we are now," Cooley said. "We've now got the chance to do something that those guys didn't back then.

"It might be harder, but that's what we're striving for."




## Pups Clobber the Cougars

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL FLUORIDE at 4 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 5.5 mg/L in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2008.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.
