

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



Take Control of Cleaning: Spring Cleaning with a Plan

making plans to begin out Spring cleaning routine. Spring cleaning may seem like an overwhelming task, but a few common sense guidelines can make it more manageable. First, survey the job and list what needs to be done. Then organize and prioritize the job into reasonable segments - by room, by task or by an hour or two each day.

Have the right tools, including a good vacuum cleaner, clean rags and the right cleaning supplies readily available. Bleach or other disinfectant cleaning solution, a non-abrasive, all-purpose cleaner, tub/ tile/sink cleaner, glass cleaner and upholstery cleaner also belong in the collection of basic supplies. Read the labels with furniture polish on it. well ventilated area.

Clear out the clutter - things will look better immediately and there will be fewer items dirtiest rooms first. Work top to bottom, beginning with ceilings and walls. The weather is teasing us streak marks when cleaning into thinking that it is time for large vertical areas, such as Spring, and many of us are walls, start at the bottom and work upward, overlapping and cleaning in a circular motion.

Use the proper cleaning product to make jobs easier. For floors, use a no-rinse product or use a general all-purpose cleaner and rinse the floor well after each cleaning. Spray glass cleaners on a cloth instead of directly on a mirror of picture glass. This will keep the cleaner away from the frame and prevent it from seeping onto a picture. Avoid using rags that have been subject to fabric softener in the laundry - they may leave a lint residue. Wait to dust furniture until after you have vacuumed and/or swept - the vacuum and broom stir up dust. Dust wood furniture using a clean cloth carefully to match the right cleaning product with the right surface, be careful as to not mix cleaners and work in a well ventilated area. spicuous area first. 
4-H Clothing Project Was "Sew" Much Fun!

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

Anyone contemplating a change in their entity or farming structure is advised to try and get those changes put in place BEFORE March 15.

Getting this work done before the crop insurance sales closing date will help mitigate the chance that entities referenced on a growers insurance documents and the entities on file at the county FSA office

Farm Bill Boosts Subsidy Levels For Enterprise Units

The 2008 Farm Bill may have given an insurance coverage option that most High Plains growers rarely considered a new lease on life in the world's biggest cotton patch.

Interestingly enough the

changes may be enough to en- peril, crop revenue and revcourage a few High Plains growers to rethink their crop insurance program in 2009.

The change that was made involves a complete reworking of the premium subsidies applicable to the "Enterprise Unit" coverage option.

Among the many changes made in the 2008 Farm Bill was Congressional authorization for the USDA Risk Management Agency to boost the premium subsidies available to farmers insuring crops at an aggregated level through the "Enterprise Unit" designation.

The new subsidies are significantly higher than the subsidy levels in place for "Enter-prise Units" in 2008. Prior to 2009 a single premium subsidy

In 2009 producers choosing to insure their crop under the "Enterprise Unit" coverage option will benefit from a completely different subsidy rate schedule, which may prove advantageous to growers. The new and old premium subsidy levels are shown on the following table.

In year's past there was little incentive for a grower to take on the additional risk associated with lumping all of their cotton acreage under a single umbrella policy. The trade-off for a modest 10 percent premium rate cut and a small savings on their overall federal crop insurance bill, schedule applied to all multi- was losing the ability to have

each farm or eligible sub-farm unit stand alone. In most cases growers on the High Plains choose to invest in the more expensive "Basic" or "Optional" unit coverage options that provide individual protec-

tion to each insured unit.

With only a few weeks left before the March 15 sales closing date for cotton, it may be worth a call to see the very real differences in cost between an optional unit Multi-

peril or Crop Revenue Coverage policy with the same policy applied at the "Enterprise" unit.

Every farm's situation is different and growers are advised to consider their options carefully before making a decision one way or the other.
