

Obama Budget Continues Disappointing Trend In Presidential Budgeting for Agriculture

You would think that an agriculture industry that provides as much as 20 percent of the nation's Gross Domestic Prod-uct (GDP) and underpins the safest and most abundant food supply in the world for its citi zens would merit a higher level of consideration from the nation's highest office.

Unfortunately that is not the case and President Barack Obama's first attempt at for-mulating a federal budget proposal once again targets agriculture, one of our nation's bedrock economic contributors, in a way that eerily mimics the narrow-minded view of agriculture worn thin by his predecessor.

Fortunately, just like Bush Administration budgets that routinely sought to undermine the bipartisan 2002 Farm Bill, the Obama budget proposal appears to be receiving a cold reception from the Congres-sional leaders on both sides of

That is welcome news for producers says Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Executive Vice President Steve Verett.


Verett notes, "Agriculture will look to the bipartisan coalitions in Congress that did the hard work necessary to create a leaner, but still effective 2008 Farm Bill, to keep the current Presidential budget proposals

from gaining traction."
PCG's efforts to keep these concepts from moving forward will be centered on harnessing opposition to the proposals that is already being voiced by the men and women who will ulti-mately write the FY2010 Federal Budget plan and secure passage of the various appropriations bills that will estab-

lish funding levels.

The good news for agriculture is that Congressional opposition to the proposals has been quick and unequivocal at the highest levels. The growing list of farm state Congressmen and Senators who oppose the Obama Administration's attempt to fundamentally alter the Farm Bill includes: Sen. Kent Conrad (D-ND), Senate Budget Committee Chairman; Rep. Collin Peterson (D-MN), House Agriculture Committee Chairman; Sen. Saxby Chambliss (R-GA), Senate Ag-

The Borden Coyotes played to take a commanding lead of the Sterling City Eagles on Feb. 24 in the Bi-District round of the playoffs and came away with a good win.



Horse: 7th place overall from a field of 39 teams







ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, 352.081 of the Local Government Code provides that the commissioner's court of a county, by order, may prohibit outdoor burning in the unincorporated area of the county if the commissioners court makes a finding that circumstances present in the unincorporated area create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burn-

ing; and,
WHEREAS, the Dawson **County Commissioners Court** does hereby find that circumstances presenting the unincorporated areas of Dawson County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by certain outdoor burn-

ing; and, BE IT THEREFORE OR-DERED that the following emergency regulations are hereby established for portions of the unincorporated areas of Dawson County, Texas that are not subject to public ownership or control for the duration of the above mentioned declara-

(1) Actions Prohibited: Except as described hereinafter, a person violates this order if he ignites, or

Ignites, or causes ignition of any combustible or vegetative material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning or ignition by others

Enforcement: (a) Under notification of suspected outdoor burning, the fire department shall respond to the scene and take immediate measures to contain and to extinguish the fire.

(b) If requested by a fire official, a duly-commissioned peace officer, when available, shall be sent to the mation for Bidders, proposal scene to investigate the nature

(c) In accordance of Lamesa Fire Department. with Section 352.081 of the Be it also ORDERED that Local Government Code, a person who knowingly or intentionally violates this order commits a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine up to \$500.00.

(3) If the responding peace officer finds that the person responsible for the fire is in violation of (1) above, a citation shall be issued for: Vio-

lation of Burn Ban Order.

(4) This order shall not apply to the outdoor burning of vegetative material caused by welding or by other causes relating to the act of welding, if such burning is not malicious or intentional.

(5) This order shall not apply to burning of vegetative material when such burning is performed in accordance with appropriate safety and protective measures, and is submitted and approved by the City

the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the public safety hazard posed by wildfires during the current dry weather period by curtailing the practice of outdoor burning, which purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement action based upon this order.

This order prohibiting outdoor burning shall remain in effect until April 30, 2009 at 12 o'clock noon, and shall expire at that time or upon the date the Dawson County Commissioner's Court, by order, determines that the circumstances present in the Dawson unincorporated areas of Dawson County no longer create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning, whichever occurs earlier.

Little Bitty Rugs

During the late 40's and early 50's, Sadie Ludecke, of the Plains community near Gail, was a barrel racer. She rode a horse named Honest John. While she was waiting to enter the arena, she would casually braid her horse's mane. When she groomed Honest John, she would braid his tail. Those early sessions of braiding horsehair led her to a career of braiding tiny rugs for miniature houses.

"I belong to the Society of American Miniaturists," says Sadie. "I taught rug making at workshops in Salado for ten years. I've been making the little rugs for about 25 years.
They've been sold all over the awhile. We didn't have much United States.'

She braids six strands of embroidery thread into a single string and carefully glues it to a flexible backing material. She does it all by hand. Her tiny braided rugs can fit into the palm of your hand. She says her rug making has been one of the most fun things she has ever done. 


