Some moves are better left out of your workout-here's what to watch out for.

Recently, the American Council on Exercise (ACE) surveyed 3,000 fitness professionals to identify the most common-and perhaps the most costly-gaffes based on what they see at the gym everyday. Here's what you need to know so you don't make those common mistakes and so you can get the most out of your exercise routine while keeping safety first.

Hot Habits Incorporate these into your workout to boost safety and fitness:

Warm up. People tend to shrug off this prelude to exercise, either giving it minimal time or bypassing it altogether. But just like cold dough, cold muscles won't be as pliable to work with (without risking tears) as warmed ones. Try gentle movements, like walking, to prepare your muscles before leaping into a more rigorous workout.
Stretch more. "Stretching seems to be a 'lost art,' but it can improve range of motion and flexibility, and reduce the risk of muscle tightness and strain," says Debi Pillarella, MEd, a certified personal trainer and a national fitness spokesperson for ACE. Get the most from your stretch right after your workout, while your muscles are still warm.
Bring a bottle. Always bring a bottle of water with you to the gym and drink from it regu-larly-before you feel thirsty. "Thirst is a signal that you're already on your way to dehydration," says Pillarella
Find "just right." Many people either work out too in-tensely-risking injury-or not intensely enough. Ask your

## Scissor-Tailed Flycatcher

From its long tail to its famous "sky dance," no other bird is more striking and identifiable than the Scissor-tailed Flycatcher. It was officially adopted by the State Legislature May 5, 1951 as the Oklahoma state bird. The common name is derived from its former Latin name-Muscivoria forficata, meaning "flying""scissors" and "to devour." Scissortails can be found on open prairies, along tree-lined roads, and along roadsides perched on fences, limbs and in isolated trees. They consume a great number of grasshoppers, crickets, spiders, and other ground-dwelling insects making them economically important and popular with farmers and ranchers.

Soon after the birds arrive in the state, the males begin their famous "sky dance," a popular site along roadsides during spring and early summer. After climbing about 100 feet in the air, the male makes
a series of V-shaped flights, then plunges down in an erratic zigzag course often somersaulting while uttering a rolling, cackling call. The performance has been described as "an aerial ballet of incomparable grace." Nesting usually takes place in an isolated tree 7-30 feet above ground. Often two broods of 4 6 each are raised during the summer.
Scissor-tailed flycatchers are easily identified by their long scissor-like tail, which may reach nine inches in length. During flight the bird opens its tail like a pair of scissors and folds or closes the "scissors" when perching. The nape of its neck and its back are pearl gray, and the breast is white. Wings are sooty black with a touch of scarlet at the shoulders. The principal threat to scissortails is poaching. A great number of birds have been killed by poachers who wanted only the bird's tail:

## Sam Baker and His Wild Emotions

When Sam Baker is per- nearly died. forming his music on stage he looks wild. His long unruly hair flies around and he moves in such a way that you wonder if he's sane. He sings loud with a raspy voice and strums his guitar like he was fighting it. Then his voice turns soft and contemplative and he plays his guitar with gentle, loving strokes. Sam Baker is one interesting guy. Music has taken over his life.

I had wanted to meet Sam for a long time. Texas artists and musicians kept telling me about him, but I somehow didn't connect with him until late last year when we both happened to be at Bill Worrell's place in Mason County.

There were crowds of people around, so to get away from the din, we settled down in a nearby pickup, rolled up the windows and had a visit. I asked him about an experience he had in Peru in 1956 when he was 32 . His eloquence surprised me.
"When you're young you want a challenge, so you walk up in tall places and run wild rivers and go about the world as though you're immortal," he said.

In Peru, he and some friends climbed icy peaks in the Andes. He boarded a train in Cuzco and sat in a narrow compartment with a man, woman and child. He had a wonderful time in Cuzco, which he described as a beautiful city that make you feel like nothing bad would ever happen to you. There had been trouble in Peru from a terrorist group called the Shining Path. Lima was under martial law. Sam says he had been keeping a watchful eye, but Cozco relaxed him and he felt good. The terrorists had placed a suitcase bomb on a luggage rack just three feet from Sam's head. When it exploded, the three people in the compartment were killed. Sam suffered brain damage, a loss of hearing and the top of his left hand was blown off. Shrapnel punctured his body. He
"My world changed from being a young man to an old man," Sam says. "From a place where I was strong and able to climb ice to a place where I couldn't hear, couldn't walk and couldn't use my hands. It's a miracle to be on the face of the earth."

Sam struggled with words. Instead of asking for a cup, he asked for that thing that holds coffee. He could see a chair, but couldn't remember the name for it. Eventually he started writing about his experience in Peru and some songs emerged. Four years ago, when he was fifty, he recorded a CD and called it MERCY. It launched his career as a singersongwriter. He now performs all over the US and Europe, but calls Austin home.
"I'm like a kite with a long string," says Sam, "but it's anchored here in Texas." His second CD, PRETTY WORLD, was released in 2007. The injury to his hand was severe. He says his guitar playing is almost primitive, but it gives him the emotional foundation for the words to his songs. Sam Baker was born in Itasca, played sports in high school and studied guitar at North Texas. He worked as a white water boatman and carpenter before he started singing for a living.
