#### Cornyn Appointment Adds Texas Voice To Senate Agriculture Committee

the state by drought gives the Senator an opportunity to hit the ground running. notes that High Plains cotton leaders are eager to help the Senator in any way they can to address the issues that face production agriculture. "Sitting on the Agriculture, Finance and Budget Committees puts him in the middle of the action on virtually every issue that impacts agriculture," says Evans. ### **Borden County ISD Dress Code 2009-2010**

lished to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with

the following:

Borden County's students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health and safety hazard to themselves or others. Clothing and grooming that in the principal's judgment may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation is prohibited.

The Borden County School prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that

Is lewd, offensive, vulgar, or contains obscene language

Advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited by the school

Refers to satanic, cult, prison wear or gang activities The following guidelines will be used to determine ap-

propriate dress:

Dresses, skirts, split skirts and shorts should not be shorter than two inches above the knee. A student will lose the privilege of wearing shorts for the school year upon a third offense. Parents will be notified when the second offense occurs. Shorts must be tailored (hemmed with no frayed edges). No spandex biker shorts or wind shorts are allowed (loose-legged, athletic running shorts) and shorts shall not be too tight.

Wearing of oversized or baggy pants and/or jeans is prohibited at school or at any school-sponsored activity on must be an appropriate length and not drag the floor. Boys' pants will be worn at the waist and properly fit the waistline. No excessively wide legged pants will be allowed. 3. Shirts and blouses must be buttoned appropriately with midriff and back covered at all times. (Tops must be long enough that skin does not show when arms are lifted.) Clothing shall be designed, constructed, and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or indecent, and that shall promote proper decorum. The opening on any type of shirt shall not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar of a dress shirt.

Tank tops and "see-through chiffon blouses" will not be allowed unless they are worn with a crew neck T-shirt underneath it or a shirt worn over them during all school hours and activities. Tailored shirt shirttails must be tucked in unless you have a crew T-shirt underneath the shirt. (All tailored shirts will be buttoned and tucked into the pants or skirt when representing Borden County in any extracurricular activity.)

Sleeveless blouses are permissible but must be in good taste. Appropriate undergarments must be worn and must not be exposed at any time.

Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. House shoes are not acceptable footwear. No metal cleats or plates on the soles of shoes shall be worn in the building.

Hair shall be clean and well groomed at all times while attending school, school functions, and school sponsored activities. It will be styled in a manner that will keep it out of the student's eyes and not obstruct one's vision. No unnatural or bizarre hair colors or haircuts will be permitted. Eyebrows must not be notched or shaved in an unnatural manner. Male students' hair may or off campus. No "saggin, be worn no longer than the top baggin, or draggin." Pants of the collar. In addition: geobe worn no longer than the top metric or unusual patterns will not be allowed to be shaved or cut in the hair, and boys may not wear ponytails, rat-tails, or braids.

A student who violates the dress code shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in school suspension either for the remainder of the boys or girls.

7. Sunglasses may not be worn in the building during chool hours or events inside day or until a parent of designate or result in more serious disci-plinary action. The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity (for example: cheerleader uniforms may vary from normal requirements according to principal/ sponsor approval). 

#### Tips for Removing joyment from the clothes you Common Summer Stains

Summer brings about many wonderful activities, but unfortunately, it also brings about stains on our favorite summer clothes. Here are a few tips to follow for the most common stains. Remember, pretreat and wash the garment by following the care label. Never dry a stained garment in the dryer until the stain is completely gone, as the dryer heat will set the stain making it near

impossible to get out.

Blood: Soak fresh stains in cold water. Pretreat dried stains with a pretreat product or a liquid laundry detergent. Launder, using detergent and a bleach (chlorine or non-chlorine) that's safe for the fabric.

Grass: Pretreat with a prewash stain remover or liquid laundry detergent. Launder, using detergent and a bleach (chlorine or non-chlorine) that's safe for the fabric.

Juice: Wash with laundry detergent and a bleach (chlorine or non-chlorine) that's safe for the fabric.

Mustard: Pretreat with a prewash stain remover. Launder, using detergent and a bleach (chlorine or non-chlorine) that's safe for the fabric.

Sun screen: Pretreat by

using a prewash stain remover and then wash in the hottest water allowed by the fabric care label with a detergent. Inspect and repeat if necessary.

#### How to Succeed With Clothes Shopping

School clothes shopping is upon us! Whether you are looking for a new wardrobe for yourself or your child(ren), here are a few tips that can help you get the most value and en-

When you consider a purchase, ask yourself if you like it well enough to wear it two or three times a week for the next six months. If so, you have a winner!

2. Concentrate on solid colors. They are more versatile than prints, so you will get more use out of them. Consider prints as extras. Use your accessories, belts, jewelry, scarves, ties, jackets, and vests to create textured accents.

Seek quality instead of quantity. Buy well-made, well-designed clothes in classic styles. Don't overbuy; just buy the best you can afford. When you go to a department store, go first to the designer section. You don't have to buy your clothes there, but you can see what the designers are offering then find similar garments in less expensive departments.

4. Check the color of garments in natural light before you buy them. Store lights can distort colors. What looks great on you in the dressing room might be a suit of a different color when you go outside. Try your clothes on at home before you take the tags off, just to make sure they are right for you. And don't hesitate to return an item if you've changed your mind about it.

5. Buy accessories that will add a touch of color near your face. This will help you avoid looking "washed out" when you wear not-so-perfect colors, or neutrals that require a color

7. Don't fret over specific figure faults. You can create an attractive, harmonious look by using your color and style

### A Long Producing Vegetable Garden: Extend your vegetable growing season with minimal effort

It's easy to become complacent when your vegetable garden first starts producing in early summer. But to get the most out of your vegetable garden, plan on harvesting into the fall or even the winter, where weather permits.

Keeping your vegetable plants healthy is the first key to a long producing vegetable garden. But even the healthiest vegetable plants will finally exhaust themselves setting fruits and will need replacing. With a little planning, you can easily keep your vegetable garden producing in succession.

Here are some simple, but key factors for a long produc-ing vegetable garden and maybe even a whole new fall vegetable garden.

1. Keep Picking Don't give up and leave those over ripened zucchini on the vines. Once a plants fruits have gone to seed, it thinks it is done for the season and begins to decline. Many plants, like squash, beans, peppers and eggplant, will stop producing new veg-etables if the existing veggies are left on the plants to fully

ripen.

2. Water Regularly Vegetables don't just need water, they need regular, consistent watering. Irregular watering results in diseases like blossom end rot, in cracking and can often make the vegetables bitter tasting. Allowing plants to dry out will stress the plant and cause it to stop producing and to drop whatever blossoms it already has.

3. Control Insects & Diseases Stop problems while they are small. Plants can defoliate from fungus diseases and a plant with no leaves is

not going to produce fruit.
4. Feed Lightly You've asked a lot from your vegetable plants and they could use a little food by mid-summer, no matter how rich your soil is. But feed them lightly, especially with nitrogen. Too much nitrogen will encourage a lot of leaf growth and inhibit fruit production.

5. Let the Sun Shine In Make sure the vegetables are summer, there is so much foliage that the sunlight can't get through. Most vegetables ripen faster in sunlight and produce tastier fruits. Vegetables that languish in the shade of leaves are more susceptible to insects and diseases.

6. Weed It's easy to let things slide toward the end of summer, but weeds will compete with your vegetable plants for water and nutrients, just when they need it most.

7. Succession Planting Planting crops at intervals will renew your garden by having new plants ready to take over for spent plants. Beans, radishes and lettuce can be seeded every two weeks, for an almost endless supply. Seedlings of early maturing tomatoes can be planted to replace plants

that are on their last legs.

8. Fall Planting The cooler weather and shorter days of fall make it a more ideal planting season than spring, as long as an early frost doesn't spoil everything. Peas, spinach, broccoli, cauliflower and greens can all be planted in July and August for harvest in September and October. In milder areas, harvesting can extend into winter.

When seeding in late summer, plant your seeds a little deeper than you would in the spring, to take advantage of

getting enough sunlight. cooler soil and moisture. Shad-Sometimes by the middle of ing the newly planted seeds and ing the newly planted seeds and seedlings will help protect them from the summer sun. Mulch, row covers and taller plants, like your mature tomatoes, can be used for this.

9. Extend the season Cool nighttime temperatures send a signal to many plants to stop producing new fruits. If cool temperatures or a frost are inevitable, cover your crops with floating row covers. These light-weight woven fabric allow light and water to come through, but raise the temperature slightly. If your crops need to be fertilized by insects, the row covers should come off

during the day.

10. Share the Bounty With any luck and a bit of work, you'll probably have more vegetables than you can use (or drop off on your neighbor's porch when they're not looking). Why not consider contributing the extras to a local food bank or a program sponsored by Plant a Row for the Hungry (PAR). PAR is a grassroots program sponsored by the Garden Writers Association, that encourages gardeners to donate their surplus garden produce to local food banks, soup kitchens and service organizations to help feed America's hungry. There are over 70 million gardeners in the United States alone. That's a lot of cabbage.





#### Mr. Brewster and His Art of Living

Brewster in the early seventies, I knew he would be a friend for life. There were just a couple of similarities: we both had two kids about the same age and we both were in the midst of trying to get new enterprises going. There the similarities ended. He was big and outdoorsy. I prefer inside endeavors. He liked to hunt, fish, shoot black powder rifles and go on primitive campouts where participants wear buck-skin, throw tomahawks and compare knives. I don't do any of those things.

Delbert was a craftsman. He created art from objects in nature. I don't know who first told me about Delbert Brewster and his work with bone, antler, wood and stone. Anyway, I called him at his home in Andrews and asked him if I could interview him. He said he was going to be coming through my town on his way to Comanche, where he grew up. I gave him directions to my house and he stopped by and showed me some of his work. It was exquisite. He did scrimshaw on cow horns, carved images in stone, made wooden containers accented with antlers. He made all sorts of things, some big, some tiny. I didn't see how such a big man with big hands could do such intricate work.

Over the next few decades, our families did things together. When we were building our house near Fort Davis, Delbert showed us how to stucco and did a good bit of the work himself. Our kids climbed in the back of our old pickup and I'd drive them over the mountain roads. They com-pared it to a carnival ride. Livingston. But his art and in-fluence still live.

When I first met Delbert Delbert and his wife Elwana showed up at most of our family's weddings, graduations or other significant events. We always made it a point to attend Delbert and Elwana's annual wild game dinner, which turned out to be big gatherings of forty people or more. The menu included everything from rattlesnake to mountain lion.

Delbert had a career as an

art teacher in Andrews before embarking fulltime on his art. He displayed his work at some of the most prestigious art shows in the country. He turned out tons of work, much of it given away because Delbert thought the person receiving it could use it in some way. When we wanted to buy some of his work, we practically had to twist his arm to let us pay for it.

But Delbert's real specialty was the art of living. He was patient, kind, generous and considerate. He was always the same. As an art teacher, he was encouraging to his students and knew how to get them to do good work and be proud of it. To his friends, he was interested in what they were doing. When we hadn't seen the Brewsters for a few months, we'd have long telephone conversations back and forth getting caught up on each other's activities. Delbert never bragged about his accomplishments, but he bragged plenty about his wife, his daughter Regina and son Todd. As you can tell by the past tense, Delbert is no longer with us. He had a massive heart attack while on a fishing trip with friends and family near Lake


