

# **Changing of the Guard Borden County Coyotes Clobbers Richland** Springs ; Winning Streak Comes to an End

The Borden County Coy-otes have never played the Richland Springs Coyotes, but these two programs have had much success on their own, capturing five State Championships and two runner-up fin-ishes since 1997 between them. So, on paper this looked to be a very intriguing match-up with the Coyotes coming off of their latest State Champion-ship and the Richland Springs Coyotes coming into this game riding a 77 game regular sea-son winning streak, which dated back to 2001.

During that stretch Richland only had 5 losses and 3 state championship titles. But, on this Saturday evening, the best Coyote on the field was the Borden County Coyote. Play-ing on the field turf in Trent, the Coyotes used their speed and quickness to score at a fe-verish pace with many big time

plays. Michael Cooley and the rest of the Coyotes wasted little time getting things started as Cooley followed the blocking of his front line of Derek Tatum, RT Shafer, Flynn Chapman, quarterback Miles Valentine and fullback Austin Fields to pay dirt from 60 yards away on the first play of the game for the Coyotes. Chapman hit the first of his

many extra points to take a 8 to 0 lead with 9:46 left in the game

The Coyote defense got a big turnover on Richlands first possession, as Cooley de-flected a pass that Karl Lamming was quick to gobble up. The Coyotes looks primed to increase their lead as Valentine hit Tatum for a 20 yard pass to move doop into Pickland tor move deep into Richland ter-ritory, but on the play before Miles hurt his shoulder and his pass just finished it off and he would be forced to leave the game and he would be unable game and he would be unable to return. Karl Lamming, as the Coyotes back up quarter-back got off to a rough start as he fumbled the first snap and Dichler den and the first snap and Richland recovered. Richland would score moments later to cut the lead to 8 to 6. Two plays later, Karl had a bit of revenge as he hooked up with RT Shafer for a 55 yards scor-ing strike, Chapman converted for a 16 to 6 lead.

On Richlands second play they answered back with a touchdown pass of their own to cut the Coyote lead to 16 to 12. Michael Cooley broke free again, this time from 47 yards out, another Chapman kick pushed the lead to 24 to 12.

Quint Shafer, RT Shafer, John Hensley, Flynn Chapman, Austin Fields all took turns rushing and harassing the Richland spread back, and would force a punt. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> play of the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, Cooley jumped in from 4 yards out for his 3<sup>rd</sup> score of the half, Flynn converted again and the Coyotes had a commanding 32 to 12 lead commanding 32 to 12 lead. again on a nice run to cut into the lead at 32 to 20. The Coyotes appeared to answer right back as Karl Lamming rumbled 53 yards for an ap-parent touchdown, only to be nullified by an illegal block. The Coyotes were forced to go for it on 4<sup>th</sup> down, but a big sack gave the visitors the ball

on the first play, Richland had a nice gain, but while in the pile, John Hensley stripped the ball from the stripped the ball from the Richland ball carrier and Michael Cooley picked up the loose ball and sprinted 71 yards to the endzone. Chapmans 5<sup>th</sup> consecutive extra point kick pushed the lead to 40 to 20, with 4:49 left in the balf in the half.

The Richland Springs Coyotes made a nice halftime adjustment of playing no huddle offense to keep the Coyotes from rotating fresh rushers. This tactic allowed Richland to move the ball down the field, but the Coyotes had a chance to intercept a pass, but Cooley stumbled a bit which kept him from being able to reach up to the ball after finding himself in perfect position for the theft. Two plays later, Richland cut the lead back to 20 at 48 to 28.

The Coyotes had a rough initial series of the 2<sup>nd</sup> half, and were forced to punt the ball away. Richland did not waste this opportunity as they marched down the field and again trimmed the Coyote lead to 48 to 34.

On the first play of the next Coyote series, Karl Lamming made the play of the day as he lofted a beautiful pass that looked to initially be over thrown, but Cooley found another gear to catch up to the pass and haul it in for a nice 50 yard scoring play, Chapman remained perfect and the lead was comfortable again at 56 to 34

On the first play of the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, Richland scored again to 56 to 42. But, as has been the case all game long, the Coyotes responded. This time, Cooley took to the air as he eluded to rushers and then found a wide open RT Shafer on a 53 yard scoring pass. The Coyotes now had a 62 to 42 lead.

The Coyotes forced a turnover on their next defensive possession, as Cooley hit a Richland player from behind

4<sup>th</sup> down pass inside the Coy- and Flynn Chapman recovered Coyotes in great field position, Tanner Richey connected with Chapman on a nice 28 yard reverse pass play, Chapman added the extra point to build the lead to 70 to 42. Richland used a little trickery and a huge crack back block to score quickly to cut the Coyote lead to 70 to 48. The Coyotes this time used a little time off of the clock before Flynn Chapman scampered in untouched from 34 yards out to extend the Coyote lead to 76 to 48.

Richland would add two very late touchdowns to make the score appear closer than the game actually was and as a result, the final tally for this historic match-up ended at 76 for the Borden County Coyotes and 62 for the Richland Spring Coyotes. But more importantly, the Coyotes improved on their 11 game regular season winning streak, while ending one of the longest winning streaks in Texas football his-

early season game. Leading the way for the Coyotes in this crazy offensive battle was Six-man Player of the Year Michael Cooley. Michael had 157 yards rushing on 14 carries and 4 rushing touchdowns, caught one pass for 50 yards and a score, was 1 of 2 passing for 53 yards and a score and recovered a fumble for a score. Mike was also in on 7 tackles, had 4 passes bro-ken up with two big hits and a caused fumble, and a 46 yard

Flynn Chapman added 8 of 10 extra point kicking, 5 carries for 51 yards and a score, 3 receptions for 60 yards and a score, 7 tackles a sack, a blocked extra point and a fumble recovery.

Karl Lamming filling in for Miles Valentine who completed only pass before leaving the game, finished 6 of 8

passing 167 yards and 2 touchdowns. Karl also had 7 tackles, a blocked extra point and an interception.

RT Shafer had 2 catches for 108 yards and 2 scores and was in on 8 tackles, 2 sacks a pressure and a big hit.

David Rodriquez was in on 2 tackles, Skyler Dear was part of the wall that protected Chapman on extra points and played some end.

Quint Shafer had 4 tackles and 2 quarterback pressures and played some end on offense



In the third quarter, the Eagles did some passing of their own when they scored on a 23 yard pass but the PAT was Great job, guys! no good. The Eagles scored





Memory Fragments of Hurricane Ike

carried by fierce winds and waves some twenty miles inland from the Gulf of Mexico. They were like bulldozers, destroying everything in their paths before coming to a stop on a-highway near Winnie. Rising water placed cattle and hogs, some alive, high in trees. One man strapped himself to a huge oak tree, thinking he would be safe from the storm. His body was found still strapped to the tree, but the tree had been uprooted and carried

miles away. One former Navy seal stayed in his house on stilts until it had three feet of water in it, then swam away, thinking with his strength and training he could get to safety. The churning water was so powerful he was exhausted within minutes. Then he ran into some water moccasins. He, fortunately, was rescued by a game warden patrolling in a boat. Hurricane Ike hit Galveston

at 2 AM on Sept 13th last year. It was the 3rd most destructive storm to hit the US, behind Andrew in1992 and Katrina in 2005. One hundred twelve people died along the Texas coast and damage in the area exceeded twenty-four billion dollars. Jude Wilson lives at Winnie, about twenty miles from the coast. He stayed home during the storm. "We were getting ready to go. One car had a dead battery, the other had a flat tire. We were stuck. I've never seen such a damaging storm here. Rita did some

Two huge iron barges were prried by fierce winds and aves some twenty miles insnapped practically in half. I was surprised one of them didn't come through the roof. We had a metal shed behind the house. It was picked up, bounced off the roof and landed half a mile away. You could hear stuff hitting the house. I've never experienced anything like that in my life." Harold Jones is pastor of a

church in Winnie that lost its roof and large windows. "We had what I think were tornadoes striking the building. It literally blew out brick walls." He helped out at Oak Island, which took a hard hit from Ike. Two hundred residents are still missing. Mr. Jones says perhaps they moved away, not bothering to come back. "Some of the trees at Oak Island had water marks 15 feet high. Appliances and all sorts of debris were stuck that high up in the trees.

Salt water from the storm killed lots of alligators. "Any animals that did not have free access to retreat were subject to meeting their death.' Refugees sought shelter in the church. One man donated a bull to the church. It ended up in hamburgers. "One thing they could count on at Trinity Church was a lot of bull." People in Winnie are accustomed to storms don't consider moving away. They just get up, dust themselves off and start all over again.

## Notice of Drinking Water FLUORIDE Violation

The Texas Commission On Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has notified the Borden County Water System that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL FLUORIDE at 4 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a

level of 5.28mg/L in the 2nd quarter mg/L in 2009 and a level of 5.28 mg/L in the 3rd quarter of 2009.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUO-RIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. How-ever, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

We are working to correct the problem by investigating the possibility of connecting to another system.

Analysis of drinking water in your community for ARSENIC indicates a level of .0068 mg/L based on a running annual average of quar-

terly samples. This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing AR-SENIC in excess of the MCL over many years could experience skin damage or problems with their circulatory system, and may have increased risk of getting cancer.



> **PUBLIC NOTICE** Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed **Constitutional Amendments**

HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation.'

### **PROPOSITION 2**

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead.'

The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature 's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity.'
