

Coyotes Pull Together to Beat Buena Vista After Scare

The Borden County Coy- not before the home town otes found themselves in uncharted waters Friday as they not only found themselves behind early, but because of their inability to get the Buena Vista Longhorns off of the field offensively, found themselves behind at half for the first time

in 2 years. The Coyotes looked as if the long bus ride to Imperial gave them a little bus lag, as they gave up a touchdown to the Longhorns on their kick-off return to fall behind early 6 to 0. To combat that, the Coyotes showed the same signs of lack of focus on offense as they fumbled on back to back plays, the 2nd resulting in a turnover. The home town Longhorns wasted little time converting as they covered 25 yards in 2 plays to push their lead to 14 to 0. This marked the largest deficit in two years.

The Coyote offense finally managed a score on their next possession, but a failed extrapoint attempt kept the Coyotes behind by 8 at 14 to 6. The Longhorns then put together a nice drive down the field using up most of the quarter to push their lead to 21 to 6.

The Coyotes again wasted very little time answering as Cooley busted loose on a long run for the score, Chapman's extra point cut the deficit to 21 to 14. The Coyotes finally be-gan to stiffen defensively, but

Longhorns would take time off of the clock.

The Coyotes got the ball back after a nice 3 and out, but were forced to punt after a bad snap and a penalty forced the Coyotes into a 4th and 20 at their own 10 yard line. After forcing a punt, the Coyotes took over in great field posi-tion and a nice Valentine to Chapman pass closed the gap to 21 to 20 with 1:35 left in the The Coyotes were hophalf. ing for force a 3 and out and get the offense on the field again, but a big 3rd down play for the Longhorns turned the momentum back in their favor and forced the Coyotes to come up with a goal line stand to end the half, but the Coyotes trailed for the first time in two years.

Cooley returned the opening kick-off of the 2nd half for a score and the Coyotes fi-nally had their first lead of the game, a lead they would not give up. The defense got a nice stop and a blocked punt by Quinton Shafer allowed the Coyotes to extend their lead to 32 to 21. After allowing the Longhorns to drive deep into Coyote territory, the defense finally stiffened as Lamming intercepted a pass in the end zone to stop the threat, two play later a 55 yard scamper by Cooley and a Chapman extrapoint gave the Coyotes a 40 to 21 lead

In the 4th quarter, the Coyotes continued their defensive dominance as they inter-cepted another pass and on the first play, Valentine hit a wide open Fields for the score and another Chapman kick made the score 48 to 21. The Longhorns fumbled the ensuing kick-off and Telchik re-covered it to give the Coyotes

FSA Announces Start of 2010 DCP and ACRE Sign-up

On October 7 Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack opened enrollment for both the 2010 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) and the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program. The sign-up period will remain open through June 1, 2010.

In order to streamline the process and ease workload on county office personnel, Vilsack urged producers to make use of the USDA eDCP automated website to sign up. Producers wanting to sign-up for the 2010 DCP or ACRE programs in person can visit any USDA Service Center to complete their 2010 DCP or ACRE contract. 2010 DCP Details

USDA computes DCP Program payments using base acres and payment yields es-tablished for each farm. Eli-gible producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payment rates vary depending on market prices.

Counter-cyclical payments are issued only when the effective price for a commodity is below its target price. The ef-

fective price is the higher of the national average market price received during the 12-month marketing year for each cov-ered commodity and the national average loan rate for a marketing assistance loan for the covered commodity. For 2010, DCP program

payments will be calculated using applicable direct and counter-cyclical program payment yields multiplied by 83.5 percent of the growers appli-cable, enrolled base acres.

Eligible producers may request to receive advance direct payments equal to 22 percent of the 2010 direct payment at will issue advance direct payment at ments beginning December 1, 2009

Producers participating in the 2010 DCP program will also have the option to request advance counter-cyclical program payments equal to 40 percent of the projected counter-cyclical program pay-ment rate. Advance 2010 counter-cyclical program payments, if available, will be announced at the mid-point of the applicable marketing year for





Washington's Devastating Economic Policy As the unemployment rate continues to climb to almost double digits and the federal deficit balloons, Speaker Pelosi is scrambling to find new ways to increase spending and raise taxes. She is desperate to defend the trillion-dollar stimulus that isn't working. With a costly government take-over of health care and a national energy tax in the works, Speaker Pelosi and the liberal Congress show absolutely no sign of slowing down. Just last week the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office released data showing that the federal budget deficit for the fiscal year ending on Septem-ber 30, 2009 reached \$1.4 trillion, which is three times the deficit from the previous year! On top of that, there is even talk in Washington of yet another stimulus package. In the hopes of reigning in these out-of-control policies and changing the direction our country is heading, I offered a series of five amendments to the annual government spending bills. My amendments would have saved the taxpayers \$28.6 billion by preventing "double-dipping" from adding even more money to programs that haven't spent the billions allocated by the Reid-Pelosi stimulus package. Most recently, I submitted another amendment that would hold all domestic spending at current levels for another year rather than increasing this spending by \$43 billion in 2010, essentially implementing a spending freeze

Unfortunately, four of my amendments were blocked from coming up for a vote, and the two amendments voted on by the full House did not pass. While my amendments would not solve all of our spending problems, Congress has to start somewhere. If we simply continue to increase spending when it is clear we can not afford to do so, we only add more deficits and more debt. The solution is clear: Congress cannot continue borrowing money and living beyond our means. It's time Speaker Pelosi and the liberal Congress recognize their failed economic policies are not stimulating our economy but rather digging us into a deeper hole. Their entitlement agenda is failing miserably. It's time we put this country back on track with common-sense solutions that reward productivity and create positive incentives. Moving forward, I will continue to search for ways to offer amendments and find opportunities to cut this out-of-control wasteful spending whenever I can

Texas Stories A Showcase of the Texas Spirit

The Texas Navy

The Texas Navy was founded in 1836 when the new republic was faced with invasion on land and sea by overwhelming forces from Mexico. The modest fleet was composed of four sailing vessels headquartered at Galveston. They protected the Texas Coast and prevented the Mexican government from landing an army of troops there. Had it landed, it would have trapped General Sam Houston and his small command. Historians agree that one of the most important elements in the victory at San Jacinto was the maritime activity of the Texas Navy. After the Battle of San Jacinto, Mexican General Santa Anna was held prisoner on one of the Texas Navy ships. The Navy was disbanded soon after that battle.

But the battle for Texas independence didn't stop at San Jacinto. Mexico refused to acknowledge the upstart nation and in 1839 began to organize a new and much larger expedition against the Texas Republic. A second Texas Navy was sent to sea with eight ships under the command of young Commodore Edwin Moore. The fleet harassed the Mexican Navy from the Rio Grande to Yucatan for three years, finally claiming victory over Mexico at the Battle of Campeche. The Mexican government then abandoned invasion plans. The Texas Navy provided protection of its one thousand miles of shoreline until Texas

joined the United States in 1845. The US Navy absorbed the modest little ships of the Texas Navy.

The story of those small fleets was largely forgotten until Governor Price Daniel es-tablished a third Texas Navy as a commemorative organization in 1958 to preserve the history of those early Texas sailors. Today, Texans are honored with Commissions as Texas Navy Admirals for noteworthy service to the State of Texas. Jim Sterling of Liberty is on the organization's board of directors. "Our organization has about 400 members," says Jim. "We have an active board that meets four or five times a year. Eventually we hope to have occasional regattas in the Gulf of Mexico.

Membership in the organi-zation is mostly honorary, but anyone can join for \$40. The official uniform is a blue blazer wit h a Texas Navy patch and a Texas Navy tie.

We have an annual meeting every December down in Galveston at the Artillery Club," says Jim. "It's a Christmas party and is usually a packed house. 

eligible commodities. ACRE Option Still Available

In lieu of the 2010 DCP program producers will also have the option to sign-up for the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program. Unlike the DCP program that uses a price-based safety net of counter-cyclical payments, ACRE provides a safety net based on state revenue losses and acts under DCP.

It is important to remember that the decision to enroll a farm in the ACRE Program is irrevocable. The owner of the farm and all producers on the farm must agree to enroll in ACRE. Once enrolled, the farm shall be enrolled for that initial crop year and will remain in ACRE through the 2012 crop year.

A farm's payment is based on a revenue guarantee calculated using a 5-year average state yield and the most recent 2-year national price for each eligible commodity. For the 2010 crop, the 2-year price average will be based on the 2008 and 2009 crop years.

An ACRE payment is issued when both the state and the farm have incurred a revenue loss. ACRE payments are based on 83.3 percent (85 percent in 2012) of the farm's planted acres times the difference between the State ACRE guarantee and the state revenue times the ratio of the farm's yield divided by the state expected yield. The total number of planted

acres for which a producer may receive ACRE payments may not exceed the total base on the farm. In exchange for participating in ACRE, in addition to not receiving counter-cyclical payments, a farm's direct pay-

ment is reduced by 20 percent, and marketing assistance loan rates are reduced by 30 percent.

The electronic service saves producers' time, reduces paperwork and speeds up contract processing at USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices. It is available to all producers who are eligible to participate in the DCP and ACRE Programs and can be accessed at

www.fsa.usda.gov/dcp. To access the service, producers must have an active USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account, which requires filling out an online registration form at

www.eauth.egov.usda.gov followed by a visit to the local USDA Service Center for identity verification.
