The Borden County JV traveled to Jayton on September the 24th to take on the Jayton Jaybirds.


The Coyotes had very little trouble with the home town Jaybirds as a result, the Coyote JV blitzed the home team 49 to 0.

Staying on the ground most of the evening, the Coyotes were able to amass over 300 yards rushing as a team. Leading the way on the ground was Brent Davis with 4 carries on the evening for 116 yards and 3 scores. Brent scored on runs of 5 yards, 57 yards and 34 yards. Steven Howard added a punt return for the Coyotes but also managed 60 yards rushing on 3 carries, but no touchdowns. Austin Cope had 45 yards rushing, but scored on runs of 2 yards and 28 yards. Also getting into the rushing act was Collin Telchik with a nice 32 yard run. Brady Bybee had 3 carries for 8 yards and Luke Burkett joined in with a career high 65 yards on 4 carries and his first career touchdown from 31 yards out. The Coyotes only attempted

4 passes on the evening, but Austin Tyler was able to com-plete both of his attempts to Jared Smith for only 17 yards, one of which was a circus catch.

On defense, the Coyotes completely dominated. Cope had 2 tackles, Davis had 3 tack-les, Telchik had 3 tackles and a sack, Howard had 2 tackles, Luis Andrade had 6 tackles, Smith had 2 tackles and a sack, Tyler had a tackle, Bybee had a tackle, Helio Rosales had 3 extra point kicks and 8 tackles and a sack. Michael Froman had 10 tackles and an extra point reception from Telchik.

Pups End 2009 Season on a High Note With Victory **Over Garden City**

The Borden County Pups, also known as the "Road Warriors" finished their 2009 foot-ball season by traveling for the 8th time in 9 games this season.

The Pups traveled to Garden City to take on a very good, undefeated 7th grade Bearkat football team. This contest started off very sloppy as the Bearkats recovered an onside kick to start the game only to give the ball right back on an interception by Matthew Ham, but just as the Pups taketh away, they giveth back as they fumbled only a few plays later. As a result, the first quarter was a defensive struggle as the Pups could not hang on to the ball and the Bearkats could not get a first down to take advantage of the Pups miscues.

Early in the 2nd quarter, the Pups were able to use the aggressiveness of the Bearkats big linemen against them as they executed a perfect screen pass that resulted in a 34 yard touchdown pass from Matthew Proulx to TJ Basquez. The Pup 2^{nd} team, as has been the case all season long attempted the extra-point play, but the group of Sean Tucker, Ricky Torres, Frank Banman, Michael Tay-lor, Michael McClain, Caden Vaughn, Jaden Huse, Hurrikane Van Kirk and Nathan Hamm had not luck on this try and as a result, with 5:02 left in the 2^{nd} quarter, the Pups had a 6 to 0 lead.

The defense of Basquez, Proulx, Brady Dowds, Zach McMeans, Kurt Shafer, Tristen Benavidez and Matthew Ham continued their dominance as they forced yet another turnover on downs, as they had not given up a first down the entire first half, but unfortunately the Pups turned the ball over again to thwart a nice drive.

Finally, with :33 left in the half, after a nice pass and catch play from Proulx to McMeans set the Pups at the Bearkats 19

yard line, Matthew Ham, followed the nice blocking of Proulx, McMeans, Basquez, Dowds, Benavidez and Shafer to pay dirt from 19 yards out and a 12 to 0 lead. The 2nd unit again failed to convert the extra point. The Bearkat offense got their first and only first down of the half with 7 seconds to go in the opening half, but any hopes of a scoring drive were halted when Proulx stepped in front of a pass to end the half with a nice interception

The Pups would kick the ball off to start the 2nd half and the defense continued their dominance. The Pups came back to the screen play they had success with in the first half when they got the ball and the result was the same as Proulx hit Basquez on a well executed play and another touchdown, this time covering 37 yards resulting in a 18 to 0 lead with 3:27 left in the 3^{rd} quarter. After several more super defensive stops by the first team defense, still only allowing the one first down, the Pups used a series of plays where they alternated their first offense with their 2nd team offense. The Pups pounded the run at the Bearkats, giving the ball to Basquez on 4 straight plays, but on the 5th play, Proulx faked the hand-off to Basquez and calmly hit a wide open Kurt Shafer for a 14 yard touchdown. The 2nd team offense finally had a successful try as Torres scampered in to make the score 25 to 0 with

2:36 left in the game. The Pups 2nd team defense entered the game and with their excitement, a trick play fooled the over eager group and resulted in a Bearkat touchdown to cut the score to 25 to 6. The Pups again alternated plays with their 2^{nd} team,





A Father and Son's Underwater Reunion

Lamesa and later had a career as a football coach in Snyder. He was fifteen months old the last time he saw his father, who was in the Army Air Corps during World War Two. "He was a gunner on a B-24 that was shot down in 1944 during a bombing mission," says Tommy. "The plane went down at Palau, a small island nation in the Pacific about 500 miles east of the Philippines.'

When military authorities reported the plane missing, they said three members of the eleven-man crew had parachuted and were captured by the Japanese. Tommy's mother always thought maybe her husband would come home. She never remarried, even though she had opportunities to do so. In the year 2000, Tommy read a magazine article about an organization called Bent Prop, a group of individuals who voluntarily go to Palau and look for planes with possible military personnel carried as Missing In Action. They spend time looking in national archives and doing extensive research. Tommy contacted Bent Prop and told them about his father, a member of the 307th Bomber Group. In 2004, after a ten-year search, Bent Prop found the plane carrying Tommy's father. The following year, Tommy got certified as a scuba diver and went to Palau to find his dad. The plane was in seventy feet of water. "I got to put my hands on the plane where eight men were still there," says Tommy. "And one of them was my dad. I don't know how to describe this except that I felt like I made contact with my dad. I

Tommy Doyle grew up in said things to him that I had never been able to before. You go down and put your hands on the plane and you know your father is in there somewhere. It's a pretty emotional time."

On April 25th of this year, after months of DNA identification processing, Tommy's Marine Son escorted his grandfather's remains home and had a service for him in Lamesa. He was buried next to his wife 65 years after his plane went down. Some of the Bent Prop people came in and there was a big crowd.

Tommy's dad was the last of the remaining crewmen to be recovered. He was in the nose turret that had come loose and was under the cockpit. A fisherman helped locate the plane. "He told the Bent Prop people that there was an engine not far from where they were looking about forty feet down. They went over there and dropped down right on top of the en-gine. The rest of the plane was just down below.'

The military recovery team found some personal items. They found my dad's dog tags, a wedding ring, a pair of glasses, a billfold and some other odds and ends. One of the greatest things about this entire happening to us is how many people it has touched. We have gotten phone calls, letters and cards from people we don't even know, many of them pilots and plane crews that served in World War Two.

Tommy's Dad was 25 years old when his plane went down in Palau. "He was considered an old man. Other crewmen were 18, 19 and 20 years old.'
