Texas AgriLife Extension Sets Profitability Workshop for Feb. 9 in Lubbock

LUBBOCK - Will it make money? That's the question Texas AgriLife Extension Service economists will address during an alternative crops profitability workshop set from 9 a.m.- 4 p.m. Feb. 9 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

The center is located on Farm-to-Market Road 1294, half a mile east of Interstate 27, just north of the Lubbock airport.

Dr. Jackie Smith, AgriLife Extension economist at Lubbock, said the workshop's primary objective is to provide the tools, data and skills needed to evaluate the potential profitability of alternative crops for the 2010 crop year.

crops for the 2010 crop year. "During the workshop, we will demonstrate spreadsheet budgets that are specifically designed to assist producers in estimating their own costs, so they can quickly compare the profitability of any alternative crops they may be considering," Smith said. Each participant will receive a handout of the printed presentations and a set of the spreadsheet crop budgets. They also will get a CD containing an Excel file with the budgets and break-even tables, along with supporting files and Web addresses. "By the end of the workshop

"By the end of the workshop we want all the participants to be comfortable with the budgets, so they can use them on their own computers with data more specific to their farm," Smith said.

The workshop will also include crop input cost estimates and an outlook for crop prices.

Individual registration is \$20 by check to be paid at the door. The fee includes all educational materials, lunch and refreshments.

Taylor Richey led all scorers with 14 points and 5 rebounds.







Legal Notice

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF BORDEN*

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county creates a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning. IT IS HEREBY ORDERED

by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning or outdoor burning of trash, brush or open camp fires is banned in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of the Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081 and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor cooking, campfires in designated fire pits in the city, county or state parks; burning of household trash in barrels with an appropriate cover; nor does it prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for (1) firefighter training (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.



Doug Baum, That Camel Guy

Doug Baum got a job at the mas is a busy time for Doug, Waco zoo some years ago and fell in love with big animals, especially camels. He grew up playing drums and guitar in a neighborhood rock band, then played some gigs in clubs. Realizing that the chances

of making a decent living with his music were slim to none, he decided to see if he could earn money with camels, a much more unlikely source of income. He bought a couple of the strange animals, then bought a couple more. Now he has eleven. He keeps them near his residence at Valley Mills. People passing by on the highway do a double take when they see camels in the pasture.

Doug is an enterprising per-son and comes up with all sorts of ways to provide income with his camels. "Every dollar I make is somehow derived from the camels," says Doug. He gives lectures at schools all over Texas and beyond, teaching students not only about camels, but also about the people who use them in Egypt and elsewhere. "The two camels I take to schools are the closest ones to the gate when I load up," he says. While he's waiting for students to assemble outside, Doug combs his camels' hair, gathering about 100 pounds a year. He gives a lot of it away to weavers.

His camels have been in movies and commercials. "When a production company comes to Texas looking for a camel, I usually get that call.

My camels are well trained and I've got all the necessary equipment.

If a camel looks like it belongs in India, I can accommo-date the filmmakers." Christ-

providing camels for up to three dozen manger scenes or productions where camels have to hit a certain mark at a certain time.

Doug calls his company the Texas Camel Corps. In 2001 he went to the Middle East to learn about camels. He ended up getting acquainted with families and came home with a renewed sense of the importance of learning about other places. He started taking small groups of people over there. "It is hands down the thing I love doing the most. The itinerary includes multiple days out ion the Sinai desert, camping and living among the Bedouin as they have for thou-sands of years. We move from site to site each day on camels, doing from eight to ten miles a We split that up, doing half in the morning, then completing the trek in the late afternoon, taking time in the middle of the day for lunch or hiking trips to archeological sites.

He takes as few as four or as many as ten and will go whenever a group is ready. During the 13-day journey, Doug takes them to the Sphinx and pyramids of Giza, a historic mosque, a monastery and a medieval market bazaar that dates back to 1382. Some people go to Petra in Jordan (a day trip from Sinai by van, ferry or bus).

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


