The pair went undefeated (3-0) in the round-robin district tournament by defeating two teams from Grady High School and a second BC CX Debate Team, senior Brendan Tarleton and freshman Steven Howard. Tarleton and Howard placed third at the meet and will serve as alternates to the state tour-

The UIL State CX Debate Tournament is set for March 15-16 on the campus of the University of Texas in Austin. Approximately 50-55 1A teams from across the state will compete for the illustrious state championship after plac-ing either 1st or 2nd at their respective district meets

2009-Crop Average Price Received by Growers Rising

marketings for the first five months of the 2009 market-ing year totaled 4.673 millionbales according to information released January 29, 2010 by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Ser-

vice. That figure is 1.097 million bales more than the amount marketed through the same period in 2008. USDA estimated December 2009 cotton marketings at 2.536 million bales with an average selling price of 62.8 cents per pound. The 2009 Upland cotton

Weighted Average Price calculated through December 2009 stands at 60.49 cents per pound using figures from the five months of the marketing year.

To date the calculated 2009 Upland cotton Weighted Average Price has climbed to 8.49 cents above the 52-cent

By Shawn Wade threshold where the Upland cotton Counter-cyclical payment begin to drop below the 12.58 cent maximum payment rate. The preliminary mid-month price reported for January 2010 was 63.2 cents per pound.

Based on these numbers it appears that USDA is taking its time to carefully evaluate all available data before deciding whether or not to offer an advance 2009 Upland cotton Counter-cyclical program pay-ment. It is likely that an an-nouncement will not be made until preliminary January marketing data can be weighed against information from the January World Supply and

Outlook report. The 2008 Farm Bill allows partial CCP payments to be is-sued after the completion of 180 days of an applicable crop's marketing year when the crop's effective price falls below its target price. The ef-

fective price equals the direct payment rate plus the higher of either: (1) the national average market price received by pro-ducers during the marketing year; or (2) the national average loan rate for the commodity

Based on provisions of the 2008 Farm Bill, the Upland cotton Counter-cyclical payment rate goes to zero when the Weighted Average Price Re-ceived hits 64.58 cents per pound.

bound. Using marketing data avail-able through the end of Decem-ber, the projected 2009 Upland cotton CC payment rate would be 4.09 cents. Should prelimi-nary January 2010 data match the levels reported for Decem-ber, the projected 2009 Upland cotton CC payment rate would drop to around 3.14 cents per pound.





It's America's favorite fla-vor, but all the options (from 35% chocolate liquor but often dark to white) and news in the headlines still cause some confusion. Here's what you need to know about chocolatefrom bean to bar.

Willy Wonka and his chocolate factory may be fictional, but there's still a mystique about chocolate and how it evolves from a lowly bean into a sweet treat. Here are answers to some commonly asked questions about chocolate:

Where does chocolate come from? Cocoa beans are the star ingredient in chocolate. The beans grow inside cocoa pods on cacao trees, which thrive in warm and wet climates, including South and Central America, Africa, and parts of Asia. After harvesting, the beans are cleaned, roasted, crushed and liquefied before

chocolate can be made. What's the difference be-tween cocoa and chocolate? According to the Chocolate Manufacturers Association (CMA), cocoa powder is made by applying pressure to remove some cocoa butter. Chocolate is made by adding cocoa butter to bring out flavor and make the chocolate more liquid. Cocoa butter, a vegetable fat, comprises about one-quarter of the weight of most chocolate bars.

What's the difference between dark chocolate, milk chocolate, and white chocolate? Milk chocolate is a mixture of cocoa butter, milk, sweeteners, flavorings, and chocolate liquor. Despite its name, chocolate liquor is alcohol free; it's made by grinding the center of the cocoa bean into a liquid after roasting. All milk chocolate made in the United States must contain at least 10 percent chocolate li-quor and 12% whole milk, ac-cording to CMA. Dark chocolate has fewer ingredients and more cocoa than milk chocolate. It's made with chocolate liquor, sweeteners, and cocoa

35% chocolate liquor but often the amount is much higher. White chocolate contains no cocoa solids, which explains its white color. It's made with sugar, cocoa butter, milk, and flavorings. Read the label be-fore you buy. Some white chocolate is made with vegetable oil instead of cocoa butter.

What does "cacao" on chocolate products mean? The phrase "cacao" refers to the total percentage of ingredients, by weight, which comes from the cocoa bean, including chocolate liquor, cocoa butter, and cocoa powder. The label is required in Europe but is vol-untary in the United States. In general, a higher percentage of cacao means a more intense chocolate flavor.


What's new in chocolate? Flavors: Shop high-end chocolatiers and you'll find some pretty unusual pairings of chocolates with exotic ingredients such as wasabi, cumin, ginger, sweet curries, chilies, sea-salted caramel, paprika, and even green tea. And, once a novelty item, organic chocolate has gone mainstream. Flavonoids: The cocoa in chocolate contains flavonoids, which are antioxidants. Some research suggests that diets high in antioxidants may help lower the risk of heart disease. But chocolate is loaded with fat and calories, so if you're looking for a boost of flavonoids, set aside the chocolate bar and try tea, apples, grapes, or red wine instead. It's best to save chocolate for enjoyment-just watch the serving size, and work the calories into your daily allot-



STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF BORDEN

ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Commis-sioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county creates a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by out-

door burning. IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning or outdoor burning of trash, brush or open camp fires is banned in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of the Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081 and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor cooking, campfires in designated fire pits in the city, county or state parks; burning of household trash in barrels with an appropriate cover; nor does it prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Qual-ity for (1) firefighter training (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00



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


