

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

Coyote Baseball Season Gets Underway in Sundown Tourney

The Borden County Coyotes only days after a disappointing loss to end a tremendous basketball season, issued uniforms and prepared a day for their first games of the 2010 baseball season by traveling to Sundown to take part in the inaugural Sundown wood bat baseball tourney.

The Coyotes got off to a slow start in the first game of the tournament, but wound up cruising to a season and tourney opening victory against a shorthanded district opponent the O'Donnell eagles. The Coyotes beat the Eagles 12 to 7 in the opening game of the season. Playing the very next game of the tourney, the Coyotes played another district opponent and again a shorthanded opponent in the Crosbyton Chiefs would be the Coyotes 2nd victory of the season as they jumped out to a quick 9 to 1 lead and cruised to a run ruled victory of 15 to 5 victory

After taking a day off to run track, the Coyotes came back to play two more games on Saturday. Already insuring that the Coyotes would play for the tourney championship win or lose, they made sure they carried their hot bats into the championship game as they made short work of Denver City JV as Borden County cruised to a 17 to 1 lead be-fore ending the game via the 10 run rule at 17 to 4.

The Coyotes would now have to wait some 6 hours before they played the host Sundown Roughnecks in what was thought to be the championship game. But, as the Coyotes had seen in the early part of the 2010 season luck was on their side as Sundown lost for the 2nd time in the tourney while the Coyotes went to eat lunch in Lubbock which guaranteed the Coyotes their first ever tournament championship.

In the final game of the tournament, the fortune that had gone the Coyotes way for three days came to an end as they continued to hit the ball well as they stroked 14 hits, and only gave up 3 hits, but unfor-

The loss, although disappointing did not keep the Coyotes from making history with their 3 and 1 record in the Sundown tournament, the Coyotes



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Weather

With the weather in West number when you are pan-Texas being very unpredictable, we need to concern ourselves with safety and protection. One way to find out if you are in harm's way is by listening to a weather radio. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration weather radio system broadcasts National Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts, and other hazardous information (including natural and man-made disasters)

Since so many of us do not receive local news and weather, a weather radio is a good investment. They usually run around \$30. They can provide up-to-date weather information, and can be set to sound off when a warning is issued. We all know how quickly a severe storm can develop and

the damage it can do. Whether you have a weather radio or not, you should be prepared and have a plan. Keep your plan up-todate and practice frequently so that everyone in your family/ household knows and under-stands the plan. You should have a designated place to go when a tornado or other severe storm is approaching. Each person should be responsible for bringing certain things such as pets, blankets, flashlights, etc. You should even prepare a bucket or container with emergency equipment (flashlight, batteries, blanket, weather radio, bottled water, non-perishable food, etc.). If you are all headed to the same place, and know that you should be there in an emergency, time and lives can be saved. If for some reason you cannot make it to the designated area, have a place designated to meet after the disaster is over.

Other types of preparation are to have emergency phone numbers posted by the telephone for easy access. It is difficult to remember the phone icked. Borden County Emergency numbers are listed below. Another safety step is to install safety features in your home such as a smoke detector, a carbon monoxide detector, and fire extinguishers. It is important to check such safety equipment often. It is even important to have a safety plan when you are driving or traveling. Know your surroundings. Listen to the weather, know where to go or who to call in an emergency







Michele Bond and Brad Grimmett have announced their engagement and upcoming marriage.





battle of World War One occurred during the fall of 1918 in the Argonne Forest in northeastern France. It was the battle that weakened the German forces to the point of surrender. It was a bloody, muddy battle. Men fought in foxholes and food was scarce. Survival was uncertain. In the midst of flying bullets and mortar shells a young marine from central Texas, James Vernon "Pinky"

Wilson took out an envelope that contained a letter from home and scribbled down a few words. Those words became the Aggie War Hymn, the most famous college fight song in the world.

Wilson grew up in the community of Florence, north of Georgetown. He was a junior at A & M in 1917 when he volunteered for the Marine Corps and was soon on the front lines. After the war, he returned to A & M and graduated with the class of 1920.

Pinky was a quiet man who lived a simple life on a farm near Burnet.

When he got older, he moved into town. He never sought publicity and never expected any. I interviewed Pinky in 1980 just weeks before he died. I inquired about the meaning of the opening lines to his famous song, "hullaba-loo, kaneck, kaneck." He said thousands of people had asked him that and he never told them what they meant.

Pinky is buried in the Post Mountain Cemetery in Burnet. The funeral director who was in charge of the service is Bill Wilcox, a tenacious man who could sell snow to Laplanders. Bill always has a story or joke to tell and has a laugh that can be heard for miles. He said every time he would pass Pinky's grave and modest headstone he felt that the writer

Bill Wilcox doesn't know the meaning of the word NO. It never fazes him. Bill spent a ton of money having a bronze statue made of Pinky in his World War One uniform. Some effort was made to have it erected somewhere on the A & M campus. The answer was a resounding NO. But today the statue stands in front of the Corps of Cadets Center on the A & M campus. It was placed there on October 11, 2008. Former President George H. W. Bush and the King of West Texas Aggies Clayton Williams have helped on the project. So have dozens of

other people. Bill Wilcox gets people to do things. He is like Tom Sawyer getting other people to paint his fence. Bill is the Pied iper of Burnet.

People follow him anywhere and everywhere. He is amazing. He's the type of fellow most folks like to be around.

Tatum Treadwell, a Borden County first grader, took sixth in tumbling, twelfth in the double mini trampoline and nineteenth on the trampoline.




