

# USDA's FSA Reminds Producers to File Annual Report of Acreage

Agency (FSA) in Garza and Borden County today reminded producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

"Producers must file their reports accurately and timely for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said Ashley.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program and newer programs authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill. Programs include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), Average Crop Revenue Elec-tion Program (ACRE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Tree Assistance Program (TAP), and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm Raised Fish Program (ELAP).

(Post, TX), April 23, 2010 ered timely filed when com--Victor Ashley, Executive Di-rector of USDA's Farm Service crop reporting deadline, which crop reporting deadline, which is May 3<sup>rd</sup> for fall-seeded crops like wheat or July 15<sup>th</sup> for spring-seeded crops like cotton, grain sorghum and forage sorghum. Prevented acreage must be reported within 15 cal-endar days after the final planting date. Failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop. Producers should contact their county FSA office if they are uncertain about reporting deadlines. Late-filed provisions may

be available to producers who are unable to meet the report-ing deadline as required. Re-ports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to be accepted and


may be charged late fees.



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




## Conservation Range Tour on Historic Spade Ranch Set for May 6

On May 6, 2010 the Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative (GLCI), Big Country Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Borden, Garza, Howard, Mitchell, Scurry counties, and the historic Mitchell County Spade Ranch will host a range tour for all of those interested in learning about agricultural industry improvements and conservation practices for rangeland.

The goal of this tour and educational field day is to cover a

variety of rangeland conservation topics. Registration for this tour is free and open to all who wish to attend. A noon meal will be served and transportation to the ranch will be provided.

Plant identification, wildlife management, forage production, chemical prickly pear and mesquite control will all be covered onsite at the Spade Ranch during the morning session of the tour. Five CEU's for TDA pesticide license holders will be given; one in laws and regulations, one in Integrated Pest Management and three in general.

Participants will return to the Colorado City Civic Center for a catered lunch which will be followed by an indoor afternoon session. 

"Everything in my house has to do with chickens. My sister and I travel a lot together and everywhere we go we try to get a chicken.


