Adversity Spawns Opportunity for Cotton To Aid Current and Future Oil Clean-Up Efforts

By Shawn Wade Through an innovative nonproduct called woven Fibertect, cotton has quickly become a compelling possibility to improve the efficacy of oil clean-up efforts and posi-tioned cotton producers as unlikely beneficiaries of the developing environmental disaster in the Gulf of Mexico.

So far efforts to clean up the millions of gallons of oil that have escaped into the Gulf have highlighted the need for a more effective material to absorb the escaped oil than the containment booms made of synthetic materials used in current recovery operations. This realization is what has opened the door for cotton, which is many times more absorbent that current synthetic alternatives, to become a major player in current and future efforts to clean up the environment.

Manufactured by Hobbs Bonded Fibers, Inc. in Waco, Texas for First Line Technol-ogy of Chantilly, VA, Fibertect is gaining a lot of attention as an alternative to the status quo and allow the product to claim a significant role in current and future oil clean up efforts.

By proving it can signifi- ture of cotton sandwiched cantly outperform current oil reclamation products, Fibertect is poised to quickly move beyond its originally designed

use and greatly expand its range of use in the future. According to Dr. Seshadri Ramkumar, the products inventor, it is the product's flexibility that makes Fibertect a perfect fit for the type of largescale oil reclamation efforts needed in the Gulf of Mexico. In addition, Fibertect used in its original form could also be used as a wipe to assist in the rehabilitation of wildlife impacted by the spilled oil.

Dr. Ramkumar, an Associate Professor at The Institute of Environmental and Human Health (TIEHH) at Texas Tech University, says that the absorbency of cotton makes Fibertect clearly superior to the synthetic materials currently used. And unlike synthetic materials like polypropylene that are currently used in many oil containment booms, Fibertect made from raw cotton and carbon is both reusable and ultimately biodegradable.

Dr. Ramkumar explains that Fibertect's underlying struc-

around an inner layer of activated carbon makes it the perfect medium for soaking up oil floating on the ocean's surface as well as trapping many of the toxic fumes chemicals that are released as the oil breaks down.

When first introduced the buzz around Fibertect was that the innovative, highly absor-bent new product could make cotton a new player in the specialized market for chemical decontamination products to quickly and effectively clean toxic substances from the skin of accident victims or other contaminated surfaces.

With the recognition of its applicability in a broader range scenarios, Fibertect, could of well become the precursor to a whole new market for spe-cialized cotton products.



Vegetables

Vegetable Month which perfectly coincides with the pa-rade of fresh fruits and vegetables now coming into season. Fruits and vegetables are foods that everyone could stand to eat MORE of since they contain an abundance of vitamins, minerals, antioxidants, phyto-chemicals, fiber, and other cancer-preventing substances. Try this four week plan to consumer more of them.

Week 1: Focus on breakfast. Try to eat at least four different types of fruits during the week for breakfast. Bananas and apples are great for those on the go. Oranges add color and flavor to any meal. Berries and peaches are great over cereal or yogurt. Cherries are great to munch while you have tea or coffee. Kiwi fruit really wakes up a fruit salad with its color and flavor.

Week 2: Focus on snacks. Try to include fruits and veg-etables in all your snacks this week. Your midmorning snack can include a vegetable juice such as low-sodium V8 or one of the new fruit and vegetable combination juices found in your grocery store. Read the label to be sure it is 100% fruit or vegetable juice. Take along a piece of whole fruit such as an apple, pear, plum, peach,

June is National Fruit and apricot, banana, cherries or grapes. Include vegetables in all you afternoon snacks. Try cucumber sticks, radish halves, baby carrots, celery sticks filled with peanut butter and raisins, zucchini sticks, yellow squash sticks, broccoli and cauliflower florets. Even if you eat the veggies with dip, you'll still be getting them into your diet

> Week 3: Focus on dinner. Try to include at least 2 or 3 servings of vegetables with every dinner you eat this week. A salad with 1 cup leafy greens and a $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of sliced veggies equals two servings. Baked potatoes filled with steamed veggies, stir fries, chili, and pasta primavera are a few ideas for entrees based on vegetables. Fruits can bee easily incorporated into dinner by serving fruit salsa or putting fruit such as oranges in your salad.

Week 4: Focus on dessert. Make fruit desserts this week. Keep cubed melon, washed berries, bananas, oranges, apples, and more on hand for fresh fruit cups.

Eating five or more servings of fruits and vegetables is a great step towards better health.


