Two Graduating Seniors of education. the Gail FFA Chapter have reached the end of their successful career in true fashion. Exemplary! **Borden County Receives Top** Rating in the 2010 Accountability **Rating System**

Borden County recently achieved the state's top ranking of Exemplary in the 2010 accountability rating system used by the state.

Those results for school districts statewide were made public on Friday by the Texas

Education Agency.

Borden County ISD repeated its Exemplary ranking this year, after moving up to that in 2009 from being Recognized in 2008.

In order to achieve the state's highest rating of Exemplary, the district is required to achieve a minimum passing rate of 90 percent in every subject on the TAKS (Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills), or meet the standard

The Texas Projection Measure (TPM) provides an indication of how student performance at the end of a school year positions a student to meet the standard in future grades. Exemplary campuses also must obtain a high school completion rate of 95 percent, as well as have an annual dropout rate that is no greater than 1.8 percent or meets Required Improvement.

Borden County ISD Dress Code 2010-2011

School's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following:

Borden County's students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health and safety hazard to themselves or others. Clothing and grooming that in the principal's judgment may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation is prohibited.

The Borden County School prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that

Is lewd, offensive, vulgar, or contains obscene language

Advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited by the school

Refers to satanic, cult, prison wear or gang

The following guidelines will be used to determine appropriate dress:

Dresses, skirts, split skirts and shorts should not be shorter than two inches above the knee. A student will lose the privilege of wearing shorts for the school year upon a third offense. Parents will be notified when the second offense occurs. Shorts must be tailored (hemmed with no frayed edges). No spandex biker shorts or wind shorts are allowed (loose-legged, athletic running shorts) and shorts shall not be too tight.

Wearing of oversized or baggy pants and/or jeans is prohibited at school or at any school-sponsored activity on or off campus. No "saggin, baggin, or draggin." Pants must be an appropriate length and not drag the floor. Boys' pants will be worn at the waist and properly fit the waistline. No excessively wide legged pants will be allowed. No trench coats, dusters, jail attire or para-military attire will be Sideburns shall not be worn

The Borden County allowed. No chains will be allower than the bottom of the school building. lowed on school property or at school sponsored functions.

Shirts and blouses must be buttoned appropriately with midriff and back covered at all times. (Tops must be long enough that skin does not show when arms are lifted.) Clothing shall be designed, constructed, and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or indecent, and that shall promote proper decorum. The opening on any type of shirt shall not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar of a dress shirt.

Tank tops and "see-through chiffon blouses" will not be allowed unless they are worn with a crew neck T-shirt underneath it or a shirt worn over them during all school hours and activities. Tailored shirt shirttails must be tucked in unless you have a crew T-shirt underneath the shirt. (All tailored shirts will be buttoned and tucked into the pants or skirt when representing Borden County in any extracurricular activity.)

Sleeveless blouses are permissible but must be in good taste. Appropriate undergarments must be worn and must not be exposed at any time.

Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. House shoes are not acceptable footwear. No. metal cleats or plates on the soles of shoes shall be worn in

the building.
Hair shall be clean and well groomed at all times while attending school, school functions, and school sponsored activities. It will be styled in a manner that will keep it out of the student's eyes and not obstruct one's vision. No unnatural or bizarre hair colors or haircuts will be permitted. Evebrows must not be notched or shaved in an unnatural manner. Male students' hair may be worn no longer than the top of the collar. In addition: geometric or unusual patterns will not be allowed to be shaved or cut in the hair, and boys may not wear ponytails, rat-tails, or

Students are to be cleanshaven at all times. Mustaches and beards are not allowed.

ear lobe and no wider than one inch at the base.

Boys will not wear piercing jewelry. Girls may not wear exposed piercing jewelry other than earrings. No tongue piercing will be allowed for boys or girls.

Sunglasses may not be worn in the building during school hours or events inside the building unless prescribed by a doctor.

Students may not wear hats, caps, bandanas, or hoods inside the building during the school day unless approved by the school administration. In addition, they may not wear such headwear when participating in basketball games, whether actively participating or sitting on the bench.

Any clothing or grooming not listed above that is determined by the school administration to pose a disruption, interference, or safety concern to the normal school operation or Borden County School Community will be prohibited and addressed as appropriate.

Students may not wear gloves or arm sleeves in the Code of Conduct.

A student who violates the dress code shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in school suspension either for the remainder of the day or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school. Repeat offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action. The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity (for example: cheerleader uniforms may vary from normal requirements according to principal/ sponsor approval). Students who violate these standards may be removed or excluded from the activity for a period determined by the school administration or sponsor and may be subject to other disciplinary action.

Violations of the Borden County Dress Code may be handled through the Student



Back to School Supplies: Ideas for stocking up without breaking the bank

cursion that many parents have come to dread: shopping for back-to-school supplies. Crowded stores and seemingly endless checkout lines are things most families would like to avoid

used to transport items to and from school—and get rid of the past school year's accumu-lation of "stuff." Turn the pack inside out and shake out the crumbs and lint. If necessary, use the vacuum! Check care labels to see if it's okay to toss the items in the washing machine. If not, wipe them down with a disinfectant wipe.

Create a central collection point, such as a basket or a plastic bin, for the wayward pens, pencils, notebooks, and any other reusable supplies that you uncover during the summer months. That way, you'll be able to take inventory before school starts and avoid replenishing supplies you already own.

Shop Smart: No matter how hard you try, some supply shopping is usually necessary. Shopping early is one way to sidestep the crowds. To avoid "buying blind," check with your school district for a list of supplies. Some school districts post lists of required supplies, by grade level, on their websites prior to the first day of school.

According to a survey done by the National Retail Federation, the average family anticipates spending more than \$500 for back-to-school supplies. With a little creativity, there are ways to cut these costs. Here are a few ideas, courtesy of Nancy Bock, Vice President of Education at The Soap and Detergent Association.

· Comparison-shop. Check out newspaper ads, online suppliers and the websites of lo-

With the start of school less cal retailers. Warehouse clubs than one month away, the ex- also offer back-to-school supplies, usually in large quantities. If the price is right, but the quantity is overwhelming, perhaps you can share the costs with another family.

· Avoid the "cool." books adorned with fancy logos and favorite heroes are If you haven't already done logos and favorite heroes are it, gather up the backpacks, usually more expensive (and messenger bags, lunch sometimes have less paper) packs—anything that has been than the plain versions. Involve your child in the process by checking the prices, counting the pages, and having him or her do the math. You may still decide to make the more expensive purchase, but you've also had an opportunity to provide a lesson in comparative shopping.

• Go for garage sales. They can be a good source for items like calculators and vintage lunch boxes.

• Find some freebies. Look online for a Freecycle Network in your area. Freecycle is a grassroots, nonprofit movement of people who are giving and getting stuff for free in their own towns. A volunteer moderates each local group and membership is free. You might just find someone who has office supplies/school supplies to give away. Visit www.freecycle.org for more information. There is even a chapter in Lubbock!

• Keep your eye out for store sales. If you can delay some purchases for several weeks, you may be able to take advantage of clearance sales on school supplies.

When shopping for back-to-school supplies, don't forget to add hand sanitizers or hand wipes to your list so you can tuck them into backpacks and lunch boxes. Good hand hygiene will go a long way toward keeping your kids healthy all through the school year.




'This group was loaded with some serious seasoned young triathletes," said Key. "Not bad for Zoie's first out-


