## Rise and Shine Timesavers

## Upper Colorado SWCD Informs Landowners of Election Eligibility

The Upper Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District would like to make it known to eligible landowners on Zone 1 and 2 that they are able to run for election to serve as a director of the District.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be 18 years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.
Zone 1 includes all of Scurry County lying south of U.S. Highway 84 and east of State Highway 208

Zone 2 includes all of Scurry County lying west of State Highway 208 and south of U.S. Highway 84 to the

Colorado River.

mated marketing year-end Counter-cyclical payment rate has now fallen to 2.48 cents per pound.
Producers who received the 1.03 cent 2009 advance Counter-cyclical program payment could see a final payment rate equal to 1.45 cents per pound if there are no significant revisions in the preliminary monthly data already reported
With such a small differ ence between the 2009 CC advance payment amount and the projected final payment rate it is entirely possible for revisions in preliminary data to alter the calculated Weighted Average Price that will determine

Based on provisions of the 2008 Farm Bill, the Upland cotton Counter-cyclical payment rate goes to zero when the Weighted Average Price Received hits 64.58 cents per pound. Accordingly, any increase in the 2009 Weighted Average Price Received above 63.55 cents means the USDA Farm Service Agency would have to seek repayment of some portion of the $2009 \mathrm{ad}-$ some portion of the 2009 ad
