The Borden County Coyotes entered Friday nights' game in a position they have not been in for a few years. They were underdogs going into a game as they traveled to Meadow to battle the #5 team in Division I six-man football the Meadow Broncos. The Coyotes entered the contest as the #9 ranked team and were 12 point underdogs.

The early going of this con-test looked as though the many that predicted that Borden County would come up on the short end of this exciting match-up would be correct as the Meadow Broncos stopped the Coyotes on their first drive and then easily traveled 52 yards to pay dirt scoring on a 4th down halfback pass to take a quick 8 to 0 lead following the successful PAT.

The Coyotes answered on their next drive as Austin Fields set sail on a nice 55 yard touchdown run after breaking several tackles following a nice block by senior Derek Tatum. Tanner Richey took the high snap on the extra point attempt and flipped a nice pass to class mate Matthew Roberson for the point to cut the deficit to 8 to 7. The Broncos again wasted little time as they drove down the field and scored on a 3 yard plunge and with another successful kick lead this top ten

He's an acrobatic skydiver, a world-class athlete, a marathon runner, long distance biker, scuba diver, skier and a member of the college wres-tling hall of fame. He's also climbed Mount Everent avail climbed Mount Everest as well as the second and third high-est peaks in the world.

These accomplishments would be considered excep-tional for anyone. But Erik has been totally blind since the age of 13. How many people with sight would consider any one of Erik's accomplishments impossible?

Something is only impos-sible if you believe it is. All of the following were at one time considered impossible: electric lights, flying, radio, TV, space flight, SCUBA diving, computers, etc. Yet today we take these, and many other things, for granted.

Unfortunately, it's all too common for people to fail to attempt something under the guise that it's impossible. There are many justifications for declaring something impossible: "I don't have enough money," "I'm not smart enough," "I'm too old," "I'm too young," "I don't know the right people," "I don't have enough education," etc., etc.,

etc. In 1830, he was born in a small town in N.Y. After finishing the eighth grade he set out on his own. At age 14, he made his way to Ohio where he landed a job as a store clerk earning \$5 a month. Five years later, he was a store manager earning \$400 a month. A short time later, he worked his way up to an executive position.

He went on to invest his en-tire net worth of \$50,000 in a salt business. Within two years, the business failed. He lost his entire investment as well as another \$50,000. Undaunted, he started again, from scratch, and did so well he was able to pay off all his debts within several years.

Later, investing in the fledg-ling oil industry, he applied the lessons he learned in the salt business and went on to become a co-founder of Standard oil. Then, in the 1880's, Henry Flagler started developing the transportation and infrastructure systems in Florida, a sparsely populated state con-sidered by many to be worthless swampland.

In 1813, a 4-year-old French boy was completely blind as the result of an accident. At that time, blindness robbed an

Turnovers Cost Pups Win in Home Opener

Just when it looked like the fense again forced the another improve to 2-0 on the season and easily win their home opener, the turnover bug attacked Borden County as the visiting Meadow Broncos came to town and literally stole the game from Pups.

The Broncos, in a coin flip mishap by the Pups, were allowed to receive the ball at the beginning of each half, and they used each opportunity to their advantage as they scored on both of these possessions. After the first score by the Broncos, the Pup defense of Ricky Torres, Frank Banman, Sean Tucker, Caden Vaughn, Nathan Ham, and Jaden Huse and then subs, Riley Herridge, Joel Andrade, Hurrikane Richter, Merik Valentine and oth-ers completely shut the Bronco offense down for the remainder of the first half.

After scoring their initial score, the Pups 2nd team or 7th grade defense of Thomas Harrison, Tate Wheatley, Colby Pennell, Flint Roberts, Valentine, and Nathan Souder or Andrade stuffed the point after attempt to keep the Broncos early advantage at 6 to 0. Then the Pups offense got things rolling as Torres followed some nice blocks by Tucker, Banman, Ham, Herridge, Vaughn, Huse and Richter on a quick drive of their own to tie the score at 6. The 2nd team offense just missed an opportunity to grab the lead on a pass from Harrison to Valentine, but the momentum had definitely shifted.

After a quick defensive stop, the Pups were back at it and a nice Pass and catch play from Herridge to Banman set Borden County up in good position and as a result, Torres was able to give the Pups their first lead of the game midway through the 2nd quarter at 12 to 6. Another defensive stop allowed the Pups to regain possession and they wasted little time as Torres got loose again on a nice 34 yard run to push the advantage to 18 to 6. The 2^{nd} team offense again came up just short on the extra-point try. Just before half, the de-

Borden County Pups would turnover on downs with under a minute left in the half. A couple of plays later it ap-peared that Borden County would add to their lead as Torres set sail on a beautiful run, before he was stopped just inside the Bronco 20 yard line, several Bronco players held him up and then one of them literally stole the ball out of his arms and raced the other direction untouched for a momentum changing Bronco touchdown with 5 seconds left in the half. This made the halftime score 18 to 12 instead of 24 to 6, a big swing.

As stated earlier, a coin flip mistake gave the Broncos the ball to begin both halves so with their second half opening drive score and a conversion score against the 7th grade defense, the Bronco re-gained the lead. It looked as if the Pups regained the lead as Tucker hit Torres on a nice 40 yard pass and catch, but a phantom holding call took the points off the board and moved the Pups back ten yards. Borden County was unable to get a first down on the first play of the 4th quarter and were forced to give the ball back to the Broncos. The Broncos continued their hot streak as they busted a long run that Torres ran down just outside the 10 yard line, but in the process Torres cramped up and was forced to the sidelines for the remainder of the game. After the Broncos scored again to take a 26 to 18 lead, the Pups still had hopes of regaining that early game magic, but back to back turnovers by the boys on consecutive plays sealed their fate as the Broncos capitalized on one of the two to build a 32 to 18 lead. Pennell sacked the quarterback on the extra point try to keep the score at 32. The team offense got their opportunity and a nice pass and catch play from Harrison to Souder had the young Pups on the move. A nice run by Wheatley also made for a nice gain for Borden County, but time ran out and as a result, the Pups were saddled with a disappointing 32 to 18 loss in their hom'e opener.

During halftime, the 7th grade group of Harrison, Wheatley, Andrade, Souder, Valentine, Roberts, Pennell, Rhaedan Bland, Robert Jor-dan, and Samual Raborn did battle against the younger Broncos. The Pups moved the ball nicely, but came up just short of scoring during their 10 play portion. The Broncos managed a score on their 9th play to win the halftime scrimmage 1 to 0.

These young men did a su-per job in the game and scrim-mage, Ricky Torres had 125 yards and 3 scores on 8 carries and also had a 15 yard reception and 13 tackles. Sean Tucker had 15 yards on 3 car-

ries and had the nice touchdown pass to Torres called back and was in on 6 tackles. Frank Banman had 7 tackles and an interception and caught two passes for 40 yards. Joel had 2 tackles, Harrison had 4 tackles and was 1 of 2 passing for 14 yards, Ham had 5 tackles, Vaughn had 2 tackles, Wheatley had 1 tackle and 2 carries for 15 yards, Herridge was 3 of 4 passing for 55 yards. Souder had one catch for 14 yards.

jump in front of a Bronco pass at 31 to 32 and give the ball back to Th Borden County.

The Coyotes drove the ball inside the 20 and Fields did the rest as he broke a couple of tackles to scamper in from 17 yards to give the boys their first lead of the game and with an-other Rosales kick, Borden County had a 23 to 16 lead. The Coyotes looked to have the Broncos stopped again but a penalty gave the Broncos an automatic first down and then on a 4th and 15 play, starting safety Richey was forced to the sideline and a coaching error put a young man in a position that he was not accustomed to playing and with the coaching error, a valiant effort by the young man came up short and a Bronco receiver managed to come away with the ball in the tussle in the end zone for a Bronco touchdown with 57 seconds left in the half. The third consecutive extra point kick gave the Broncos the lead again at 24 to 23. The Coyote looked poised to answer the score in the waning moments of the contest, but a big pen-alty nullified a run by Valen-tine that appeared to give Borden County a first down just outside the 10 yard line. As a result, the Coyotes were unable to come away with any points before half and trailed 24 to 23 at half.

The Broncos took the 2nd half kick-off and quickly moved the ball down field and extended their lead to 32 to 23 with only a couple of minutes gone in the quarter. But, that would be all that the Coyote defense would allow for almost all of the remainder of this classic contest. Borden County could not do much with the ball, but a great de-fensive series by Zach Telchik breaking up two passes in a row and the rest of the Coyote defenders gave the ball back to the Coyotes. On the ensuing offensive possession, the Coyotes found something that began to work and following some nice runs by Richey, Fields and Tony Soto the playaction pass from Valentine to Shafer was wide open and with one nifty move, Shafer had the Coyotes in the end zone from 26 yards out and the Rosales state. 
