





Messy Closets Not Only Target

for De-cluttering; Look at finances, too

If the mood strikes to clear eas for consumers to focus on rolls around, one oft-overlooked area may need the most attention: personal finances.

As the calendar turns to a new year, one of the things we think about is getting organized at home among the things we own and cleaning out. But there is another important element and that is trying to gear up to deal with our financial papers to become a little better financially organized. Some people may be reluctant even to open their end-of-year investment statements because they know that the numbers will be very much lower than they were 12 months earlier.

Getting financially organized might initially make you feel depressed. But getting a handle on it overall and developing some action steps to make changes may make you feel better. A simple decision on where to put financial pa-pers may be the first step, the financial expert noted.

At a minimum, categorize your incoming mail because January is the month when you will be receiving financial statements, many of which do have tax implications. So develop a system for monitoring your incoming mail right after the first of the year. A basket or a file folder can be used to hold relevant tax return material as it arrives whether it is opened immediately or not.

The beginning of the year is a good time to take a look at how the household income is being spent. Times have been difficult for many people, and oftentimes we feel that there rarely is enough money to make it to the end of the month. That makes it prime time to try to take a look at how we are spending money.

Financial experts note that

out the clutter as the new year are ways to reduce debt and ways to save. Even though we are generally in a low-interestrate environment, that is not true for credit cards. Many consumers have received notices about changes in the terms and conditions of credit card accounts. On December 18, 2008, the Federal Reserve Board approved final rules that would better protect credit card users by prohibiting certain unfair acts or practices and improving the disclosures consumers receive in connection with credit card accounts and other revolving credit plans. So getting a handle on fi-

nances - where the money is coming from and where it is going - and how can we cut some corners is a good 'getting organized' kind of financial task for January.

Financial organization is often easier to approach in January, because people have their minds set on personal improvement such as losing weight, eating right and getting more exercise

We make all kinds of resolutions. For 2011, we should be looking for ways to develop dual strategies to improve our physical health and our financial health. If you are carrying a lot of debt, make yourself a little worksheet that lists who you owe, how much you owe, how much are you paying right now on a monthly basis, and what is the annual percentage rate that is being charged by the lender or credit card issuer. That will help you know where to start reducing debt. This is the time for looking closely at the fine print because maybe the terms and conditions on your credit card have changed, and maybe the charges are costing you more money than you realized.


money. But the American economy does not need us to go into deeper consumer debt to do this. If we continue to do that, then another bubble will burst. People are beginning to think about how their money is being spent and are figuring out ways to economize – to purchase the same item or service for less money. Saving money - no matter how small the amount – is as important as reducing debt.

We can take small steps to begin to save. Household budgets are tight right now, so it really means taking a good look at how money is being spent and where can we squeeze out more savings. Not eating lunch out as often and cooking more at home are two ways that people have changed spending habits. For workers whose funds were invested in the stock market with retirement accounts, the important thing to remember is now would not be the time to stop making regular retirement contributions. Instead, look at this as an opportunity to invest

money to buy more shares than when share prices were higher. The market will come back, it's just that no one knows when that will happen. Unemployment in some

parts of the nation has risen significantly, and experts do not know yet what kind of fall-out there will be in coming months or whether the unemployment rate will continue to increase. Each person needs to be looking at their own sense of job security. We would feel a lot better if we had a little bit of a cash reserve on hand to be able to sustain the early periods of unemployment. We should go back to the old-fashioned notion of having an emergency fund. Try to set aside money for a reserve fund to use if something catastrophic were to happen. Even if only small amounts can be saved, something is better than nothing. Despite the difficulties associated with reducing debt and carving out a part of the budget for savings, consumers have reason for opti-

We should not lose hope. Our economy will recover even if we cannot predict when this will happen. In the meantime, consumers can benefit from the 'natural optimism' that usually accompanies the beginning of every a new year.



Corsicana Cornucopia

Navarro County, has a rich history. It was the site of the first oil field in Texas, discovered in 1894. People used to take Sunday drives to see a gusher. Wolf Brand Chili began in Corsicana; so did the Collin Street Bakery, which sells tons of fruitcake every year. Texas Governor Buford Jester was born in Corsicana. The Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court for a number of years, Robert Calvert, grew up in the Corsicana State Orphans Home. In the 1950's Corsicana had a blind justice, Jim Sewell, who was county judge, later district judge.

Corsicana is also home to one of the strangest stories in Texas. It involves a circus elephant named Black Diamond, who went on a rampage during a circus parade in Corsicana in 1929 and seriously injured his former trainer and killed the trainer's employer. Some say the elephant acted in a jealous rage because he was angry with the woman for taking the trainer away from the circus. Black Diamond was shot and his skull is in a Corsicana trophy room owned by Carmack Watkins, a big game hunter and businessman who witnessed the incident when he was a child. Dr. Tommy Stringer is Vice President of Navarro College in Corsicana. He is a lover of history and has written and broadcast stories about Corsicana in books, magazines and on the local radio station KAND.

'Corsicana dates back to the 1840's," says Dr. Stringer. "The county is named for Jose Antonio Navarro, the Texas patriot who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence

The city of Corsicana, in and served in the Republic of Texas congress. He was never here, by the way. When the county was organized in 1846, the legislature honored him for his contributions to the state. But he never visited his namesake county. Navarro also-named the county seat. When the community was created specifically to be the county seat, Navarro was asked what he wanted to name the settlement. He chose Corsicana for the island of Corsica, which was the birthplace of his father. Napoleon Bonaparte was also born on Corsica.

Corsicana was headquarters for K. Wolens, a chain of department stores across Texas. The city once had a large Jewish population that worshipped in two synagogues. The buildings are now owned by the city. One is a community center. A man known only as Rope Walker paid a visit to Corsicana and stayed there. 'He came to town in the 1880's. He was a seller of cook stoves and had a peg leg. So to draw a crowd, he stretched a tight rope across Beacon Street, the main business street in town. He was going to walk across that thing. He strapped one of these cook stoves to his back. He got part way across and fell. His injuries were serious. People went over to him and asked him if he wanted a priest or minister and he said, and Kale Yarbro; no, I'm Jewish.' So they got one of the Jewish laymen to say some prayers with him just before he died. They never found out who he was. There was no identification on him. He is buried in the Hebrew Cemetery. The marker at his grave simply carries the inscription Rope Walker.

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
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
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
