

# **USDA Reminds Producers** to Apply for 2011 Livestock Disaster Assistance

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Victor Ashley, reminds eligible ranchers and livestock producers of the Jan. 30, 2012 deadline for applying for benefits under the provisions of the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) for losses incurred dur-ing the 2011 crop year. In addition to the counties that became eligible earlier in the year, the following counties triggered after April 1, 2011.

The following counties met the LFP trigger requirements for native and improved grasses: Blanco, Borden, Brooks, Burnet, Cameron, Childress, Coleman, Collin, Collingsworth, Comal, Concho, Cooke, Cottle, Dawson, Dewitt, Dickens, Donley, Duval, Eastland,

(POST, TX), April 12, 2011 Fisher, Fort Bend, Gaines, Garza-Borden County USDA Garza, Gonzales, Grayson, Hall, Hays, Hidalgo, Jackson, Jim Hogg, Jones, Kenedy, Kent, Lampasas, Lavaca, Lynn, McCulloch, McMullen, Menard, Mitchell, Montague, Motley, Nolan, San Saba, Scurry, Starr, Terry, Throckmorton, travis, Webb, Wharton, Willacy, Yoakum and Zapata.

McMullen, McMullen, Menard, Mitchell, Montague, Motley, Nolan, San Saba, Scurry, Starr, Terry, Throckmorton, Travis, Webb, Wharton, Willacy, Yoakum and Zapata. "We anticipate more coun-ties may become eligible be-

ties may become eligible between now and the end of September, so livestock producers should stay tuned,"

said Ashley.
LFP provides payments to eligible livestock producers that have suffered livestock grazing losses due to qualifying drought or fire. Fire losses apply only to federally managed rangeland. Eligible livestock under LFP include beef cattle, alpacas, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equipe, goats, llamas emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep and swine. For losses due to drought, qualifying drought ratings are determined using the U.S. Drought Monitor located at http://www.drought.unl.edu/dm/monitor.html.

"It is imperative that livestock producers meet this deadline for disaster assistance as there are no late file provisions for LFP," said Ashley. "To ensure a smooth

### School Bus Safety is Everyone's Business

For 23 million students nationwide, the school day be-gins and ends with a trip on a caught on handrails and in school bus. The greatest risk is not riding the bus, but approaching or leaving the bus. Even though we are near the end of the school year, it is still very important for students and adults be aware of school bus safety. We often let ourselves become lax after a period of

Every school bus is surrounded by a danger zone. This danger zone consists of the 10 feet in front of the bus, and on all other sides of the bus. Following a few simple school bus safety tips will ensure that all children are safe around the danger zones of a school bus.

1. Children should arrive

at the bus stop at least five minutes early to prevent running up to the bus stop when the bus

is approaching.

2. As the bus approaches, stand at least 6 feet away from the curb, or edge of the road.

3. Wait for the bus driver to signal before entering the bus.

Use hand rails to avoid falls.

5. Tie loose strings together

6. When crossing in front of the bus, wait for the driver to signal before crossing.

Be sure the driver can see you at all times. Just because a child can see the driver, does not mean the driver can see the child.

Always look left-rightleft before crossing the street, road, or highway.

9. NEVER walk behind the school bus.

10. If you drop something, notify the driver immediately. Never try to pick it up without telling the driver.

School bus safety is everyone's business. Parents should take time to be sure children know and obey the rules of school bus safety. For more information on school bus safety, contact Julie at the extension office (756-4336).



## **Locals Compete in THSRA** Regional Finals in San Angelo




